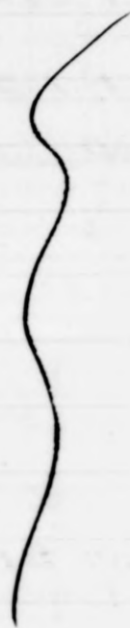

Letter from Local Govt. Board dated 1st inst stating that unless Collectors Corbett & Hoagell close their accounts satisfactorily within the time allowed them, they will be obliged to consider whether they can any longer permit these Officers to retain their positions.

Resolved - "The Guardians have had the state of the collection in Messrs Corbett & Hoagell's Districts under consideration today, and lists of all the persons in arrears have been laid before them. They regret to find the collection so backward, but on comparison with former years and bearing in mind the great difficulties in collecting in these Districts

the Board are disposed to give them another opportunity of closing their accounts before proceeding against the sureties. They therefore extend the time to the 5th Dec. on which date they propose striking the new Rate. The Guardians are aware each of the Collectors has a large number of decrees for Rates which they are unable to execute at the present time."

Read letter from the Treasurer calling attention to the fact that the Income ac is overdrawn by £739. 15. 3 and requesting to be informed when the Guardians will be in a position to have the amount paid, and also when the new Rate will be struck. This he trusts will be adequate to keep the account Credits.

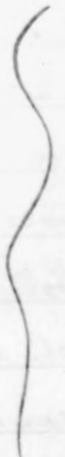

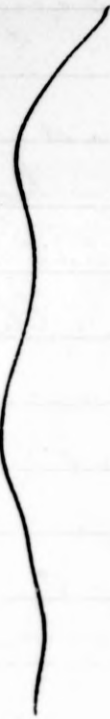
