Resolved — The Government Inspector, Mr. Clifford, and the Guardians have examined the sample of potatoes supplied by Messrs McKenzie & Co, and unanimously reject them as being rotten and diseased. They therefore decline to accept the tender.

A resolution of the Corporation of Waterford, with reference to the claims of the Christian Brothers to a share of the grant voted in aid of primary education in Ireland, was adopted.

Resolved — The Board of Guardians have read with satisfaction the announcement made by the Chief Secretary of the intention of the Government to take immediate steps for providing employment for the small farmers and labouring population of the West of Ireland. The Board desire to draw attention to their resolution of 19th January last on this subject, and to again respectfully urge on the Government the absolute necessity which exists for providing employment for the labourers & small farmers in the town and district of Gort, who are now in great distress owing to the want of work and the inability — which the Guardians fear is likely to continue — of the farmers to provide it, through the fall in the price of agricultural produce.

A large number of such persons living in the town & neighbourhood of Gort are now quite idle, and a considerable proportion unable to provide the barest necessaries of life without the out door relief which the Guardians have been obliged to afford, together with the contributions of the inhabitants of the Town who have generously formed a relief Committee to provide fuel &c. The Poor Rates on the Gort Electoral Division for the current year are £17 in the £ and the Board think they will be further increased next year owing to the necessary distribution of out relief.
