

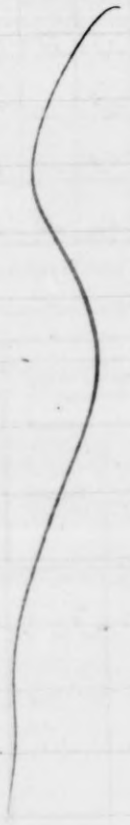

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The Master regrets to have to inform the Board that a Cyclopharyng patient named Patrick Glynn admitted to the Infirmary on the 7th inst committed suicide about 4 or 5 pm. on the 10th by cutting his throat with his razor which he had retained. The Medical Officers had no apprehension that he was likely to commit such an act. The poor man had been quietly walking about the ward immediately before, and two other men were sitting at the fire at the time, but the act had been so noiselessly committed behind a screen that these men were unfortunately late in interfering or giving timely alarm. The following was the verdict of the Jury:—

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon, as follows:—

"He finds that the said Patrick Glynn of Tubber committed suicide on the 10th of January 1896 at Gort Hospital whilst suffering from insanity due to depression of spirits."

Ordered— The Medical Officer attending an outside case which he believes to be of unsound mind, or dangerous in any way, is requested to inform the Medical Officers of the Workhouse of the fact.

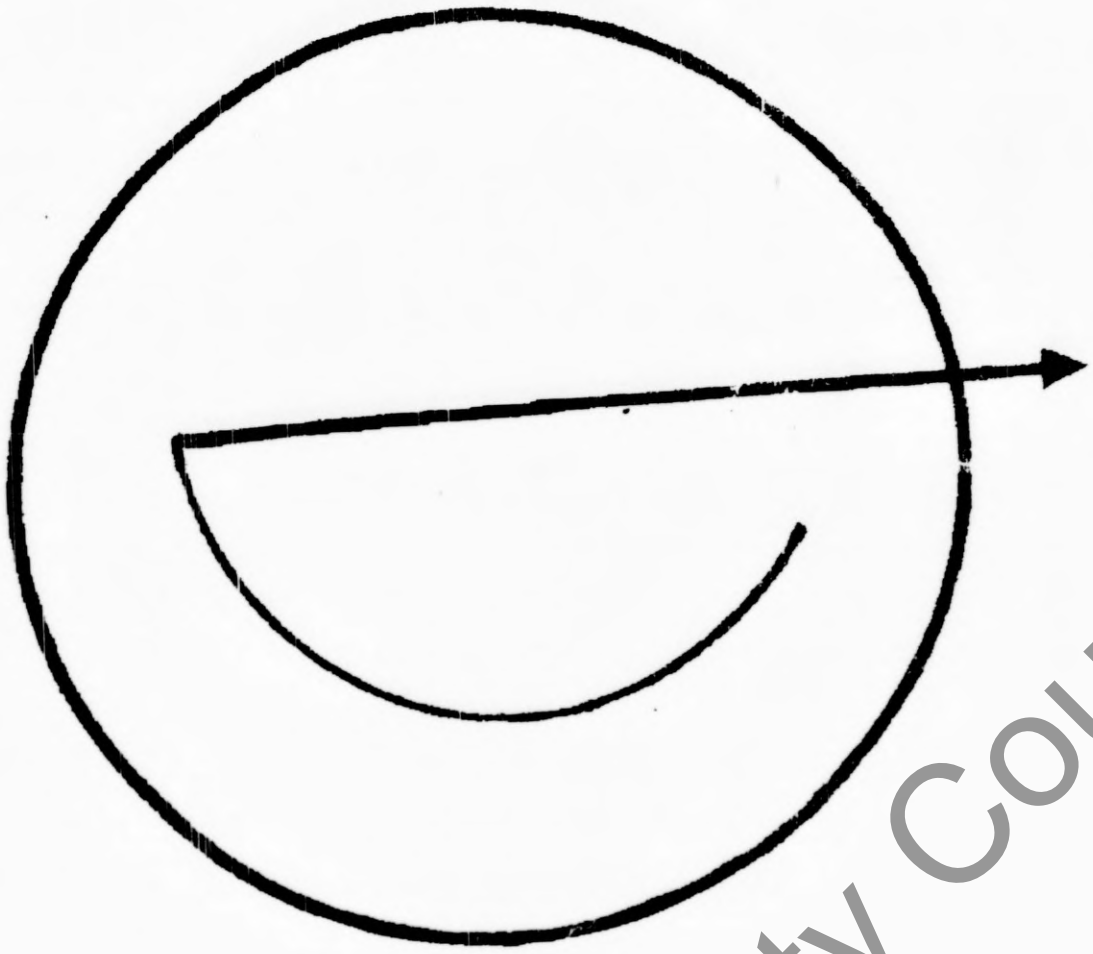
