The Inspector estimates that a sum of £3,550 will be required to meet liabilities for the remainder of the year to 29 Sep, while the assets will only make about £3,090 and of this sum it is feared at least £300 will prove to be uncollectible.

It is also pointed out that the 1st instalment of Seed Loan amounting to £340.13.4 will be due on the 1st Aug^t and that only £35.10.0 had been collected.

The Inspector reports favourably as to the observance of cleanliness, the condition of the grounds and the discharge of their duties by the Officers of the Institution. Stock has not been taken since 13 Sep 95.

The Local Gov^t Board expect to find no steps have been taken with a view to the appointment of a night nurse. This question was postponed in view of the expenditure proposed to be incurred in the providing of bathrooms and water closets but the latter alterations have not been carried out. Major Rutledge Fair reports

that 25 iron bedsteads with wire mattresses have recently been supplied, but in consequence of the inferior quality the mattresses are already beginning to give way; and he recommends that 24 additional bedsteads of a more durable quality be provided and he thinks they should be purchased for about £1:3:0 each.

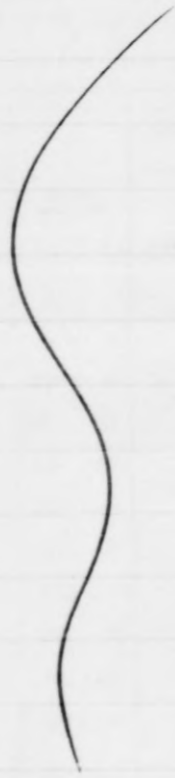
