On the recommendation of the Medical Officer an inmate named Michael Connell, was ordered to be sent to the Orthopaedic Hospital for treatment and cost charged to Killenaranna S.D.

On the recommendation of the Medical Officer potatoes were ordered to be used in the dietary of the inmates generally according to scale. The potatoes to be purchased by the Master at cost not to exceed 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ per stone. Any additional milk required to be procured from Contractors if they can supply, if not to be purchased elsewhere at cheapest rate.

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon, as follows:—

The Master reported that the face of a child named John Deech aged about 5 years was burned on the evening of the 14th inst, owing to his having gone too near the fire and his bib ignited. The woman in charge had absented herself for a few minutes at the time, but fortunately the workmistress in the next room (workroom) came at once to his rescue. He is now much better and the Medical Officer states he will soon be quite well again. The Master has given instructions and made arrangements to guard as far as possible the life occurring again. — The Schoolmistress to carry out the Master's orders — "The Schoolmistress to carry out the Master's instructions carefully."

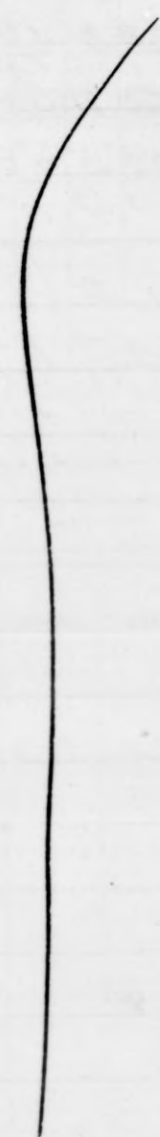

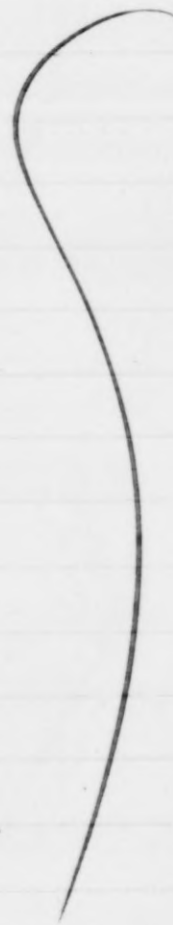

Stating that it appears from the half-yearly report of their Inspector Maggi Rutledge Esq. that debts amounting to £1408 including an overdraft of £1164 have been allowed to accumulate in a great measure due to the delatory manner in which the Collectors discharge their duties. New bathrooms & water closets were long since ~~ordered~~ furnished but the Guardians have as yet taken no steps to proceed with the work and the Board trust these much needed works will be carried out with as little delay as possible.

The Inspector points out that additional iron bedsteads with wire woven and fibre mattresses previously recommended have not been supplied. A few gutters & downpipes require repair and serious leaks exist in the roof of the main building and external & internal painting should be carried out.

Some months ago the Guardians transferred the patients in the Maternity ward to an apartment deficient in space light & ventilation. The ward vacated is now occupied by a wardswoman who is employed exclusively in the main building. This arrangement is highly objectionable and the Maternity ward should be at once restored to its original use and a door should be given the Infirmary to the ward so that the night nurse who is a trained midwife may have access to the patients without being obliged to pass through the yards.
