Ordered — That the Coals supplied by Mr Hayes be paid for at the rate of 26 $\frac{1}{2}$  per ton, the Guardians agreeing to take the present delivery, inclusive of any slack therein.

Ordered — That the Master be authorised to let out ~~the~~ Spraying Machines on hire at 7 $\frac{1}{2}$  for any time not exceeding three days; or, to sell the new machines at 28 $\frac{1}{2}$  and the old ones at 14 $\frac{1}{2}$  each, cash down.

The Master to have any Machines out of order put in repair.

Dr Moran reported that Relieving Officer Hardeman was seriously ill.

Resolved:—

That Mr. Thomas Hardeman be appointed temporary Relieving Officer for Gort District for a fortnight during his Father's illness at the same rate of remuneration as that paid to his Father.

An inmate named Mich. Molau was allowed a pair of boots, not to exceed 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ , on leaving the Workhouse.

The Schoolmistress was allowed three weeks leave of absence (during the children's holidays) the Matron taking charge.

Ordered — That a list of all persons now in receipt of out door relief be printed according to Form 30 and a copy be sent to each member of the Board.

Miss Christina Lee (Wardmaid), was granted 3 weeks leave of absence, during which the Nuns will arrange for the discharge of her duties.

Ordered — That the Porter be allowed the usual remuneration for superintending the delivery of Coals at the Workhouse, viz £3.

Ordered — That Mary Kelly be discharged from the Workhouse; that Mr Hardeman be requested not to send in this or similar cases without the most urgent necessity.

Ordered — Request Mr Kennedy to auction the meadows on the Workhouse graveyard.

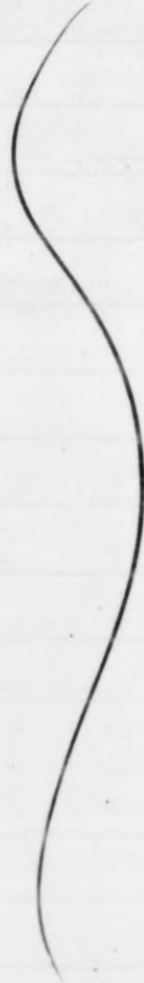
