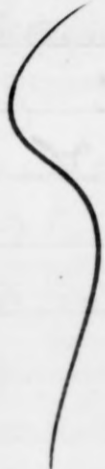

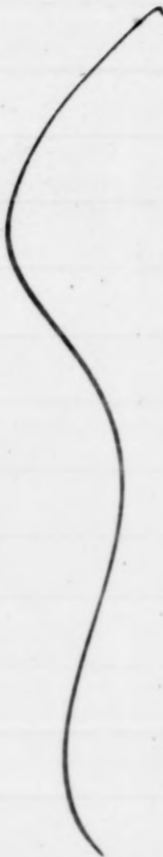

After making necessary payments today the Bank balance will be about £20 to credit.

— An instalment of £500 will be, probably, received from the County Council by the end of this month, but against that, the Board will owe Officers, contractors, & others about £700 on the 30<sup>th</sup> Sep. The deficiency will then be some £200, and this deficit will be increasing periodically until at the end of the financial year (31<sup>st</sup> March) it will amount to £800.

The Medical Officer reported that since last  
meeting the Night Nurse went home on a matter  
of family urgency, with his consent and approval  
there being no bad cases in Hospital. She remains  
away for three weeks, and in the meantime the  
Hospital Nurses are doing her duty.

"Approved"

The Medical Officer reported as follows:-

"I beg to bring under your notice the matter  
of the water supply to the Workhouse. During the present  
dry season the supply has been barely sufficient  
for all purposes, and it will be entirely insufficient  
when the baths & water-closets now in course of  
construction are completed. An additional quantity  
will then be required for the baths & for flushing  
the closets, otherwise, these will remain useless  
or even dangerous to health. This supply, when  
obtained, will require additional power to pump  
it through the Workhouse buildings & premises.  
Hitherto the pumping has been done by the hand power  
of the pauper inmates, and likely they will not  
be equal to the work on a larger scale.

The supply is at present obtained from a large  
well just inside the outer boundary wall, &  
on the outer side of this wall two or three yards  
distant from the well there is a recess which  
is used as a public convenience where filth  
and nuisance is deposited, & which may possibly  
percolate into the well. Furthermore, on the other  
side there is an open sewer 40 or 50 yards distant  
from the well. This sewer is not concreted and is on  
a higher level by about 6 feet than the water in  
the well. This sewer may possibly be a source of  
contamination to the water. It is a continuation  
of a sluggish drain from the adjoining fields  
(not included in the Workhouse farm), which dries  
up in Summer time, and this drain is apparently  
used for depositing therein the offal of dead animals.  
This condition of things demands a remedy as  
the Engineer may direct & report. The well is not  
a

a running spring. The water apparently comes by percolation through the earth, and hence within a certain area on all sides of it no topdressing should be put on fields such as the refuse from Closets, Stables or farm yards. However, I have to state the water was lately examined by the Analyst to the Workhouse, and it was not stated to be unfit for drinking purposes. Still in a matter of such great importance the water supply and its surroundings should be above suspicion of being to any extent impure or polluted".

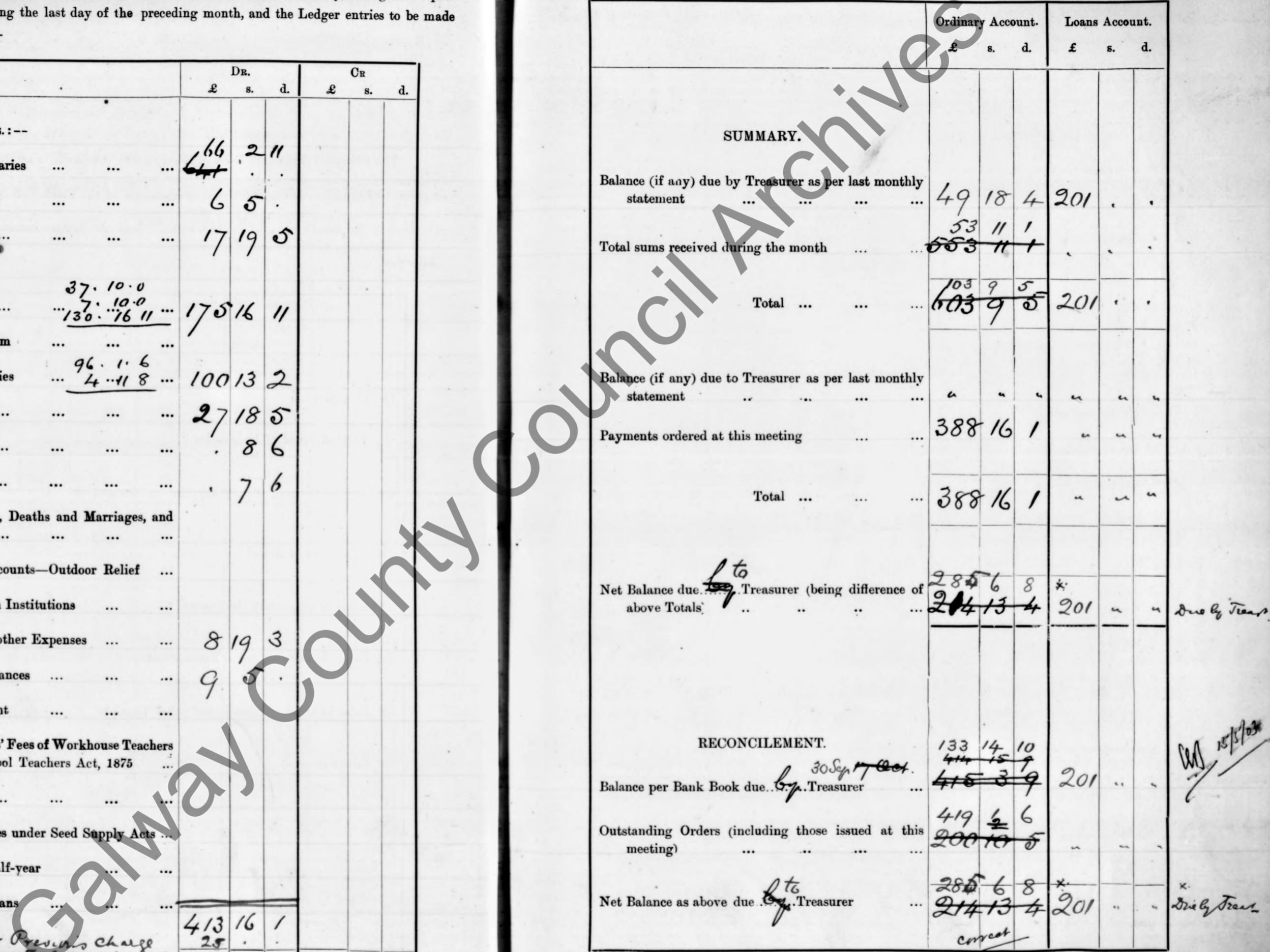
