Place a sheet of one-sided carbon paper, face downwards, between the first and second leaves, and then the sheet of black board after the Duplicate. Write upon the first leaf with a Duplicator or Manifold Slip Pen, and two copies will be the result.

In the case of a Triplicate Book, a sheet of two-sided carbon paper is placed between the 2nd and 3rd leaves, and then proceed as above.

A CARBO-PLATE can also be supplied to take the place of the black board. This is a plate which grips the carbon, and at the same time provides an extra hard plate, made of aluminium, which gives an extra clear copy, and enables the carbon paper and support to be placed in position for writing and withdrawn without touching the carbon with the hands.
