Resolved that one clerk be ordered in reply to Mr Hancock's denial of having used most offensive language to one of the members of our Board, to state that the Board are in a situation to support their allegation by oath of competent witnesses if necessary, and with respect to the witness in fourth charge, whom Mr Hancock refused to hear, that Dr Nolan although very ill had left his house, and attended in the Board room at Mr Hancock's investigation, and on being tendered in evidence by the Master was refused by Mr Hancock, who stated as his reason that he Dr Nolan was his Mr Hancock's witness and that he would not examine him, a like proof of this can be given if necessary.

That Mary Joy also tendered by Master was refused by Mr Hancock, was a very competent witness, she had been for some months in the employment of Mr Hunt one of our Board, and is at present living as childmaid with a family in the neighbourhood, she is about 17 or 18 years of age, and further Mr Hancock brought forward another girl about same age, Honor Harrabil who he had expected would have made evidence against the Master.

That in reference to Mary W Cook alias Cunnelly tendered for examination by


Master, and who ^{Mr} Hancock, understood perfectly to speak English. The Matron on being referred to, stated she was well acquainted with her, and that she could not give her evidence in the English language.

That under all these circumstances this Board trust the Commissioners will see the Justice and propriety of withdrawing their dismission of their Master, until they shall have sent an Assistant Commissioner, unconnected with this locality, to hold an open fair and candid investigation of any charges to be brought before him in presence of this Board against Mr Fallon, and that a copy of such charges shall be forwarded to Mr Fallon, to give him an opportunity of producing rebutting evidence if he can.

That in asking such investigation this Board assure the Commissioners, they are not actuated by any motive other than Justice to themselves and their officers.
