Gentlemen.

I have to report that Matthy Stacey aged 6 died of effusion on the chest on 15 inst. Peter Cornwell aged 73 who had been suffering from spasmodic asthma died suddenly on the same day, I should suppose from the rupture of a blood vessel in the lung.

If some decisive step be not immediately ^{taken} to check the spread of Dysentery in the workhouse, I cannot say where it will stop, it is really melancholy to go through the way, & to witness its extent without making an effort to

check its progress or mitigate its severity, It is painful to me to make those reports, seeing that those hitherto made have not been attended to, but a sense of public duty & the responsibility that attaches to my situation compels me ever more to draw your attention to a state of things that ought at any risk or sacrifice to be remedied. The measures I would respectfully submit are as follows:-

- 1st a proper and regular supply of fuel through the House which is deplorably defective.
- 2^{dly} The same observation relative to clothing & that each pint of soup should be made from at least 1/2 lb of meat, & that 2oz of this be added to each pint.
- 3^{dly} That two large wards on each side of the House well aired & ventilated with a proper female attendant to each be appropriated for the reception of those Dysenteric Cases, with all suitable accommodation. At present they are all scattered through the House lying in filth and dirt, without a single person to attend them a circumstance in itself sufficient to propagate the disease.

These are the suggestions I feel called upon to make at present. I have every hope if they be strictly carried into operation that we shall have to congratulate ourselves on the speedy subsidence of the disease. I think I cannot do better than conclude this report by quoting a paragraph from the writings of the late Dr. Keegan on this disease. He observes, little benefit can be expected from mere prescription, unless a Hospital be suited to the disease, which contains well prepared food to be paid to comfort with the supply of the patient, food to the cleanliness of his person to the shadowiness of the ward to the purity of the air which he breathes & lastly, when those

To The Guardians of the Gt Union
Gentlemen

As you are assembled to day for the purpose of devising means to extricate the Union from its embarrassments, and to provide funds for the adequate support & maintenance of the workhouse, I feel I should not be discharging my duty as its Medical Officer, if I did not again call your attention to the medical department of the institution which I regret to say is in a most deplorable condition, Fever and Dysentery have increased to an alarming extent, and though our mortality has not been so great as in other houses, it is still considerably over what I have no hesitation in saying it would be, under more favorable circumstances.

There are at this moment sixty in the Infirmary or Fever Hospital over forty in Dysentery & Diarrhea besides about seventy lying in the upper stories in the centre building, both male & female side, in fevers

the all sorts and other cutaneous infectious diseases, forming an aggregate of considerably more than a fourth of the entire inmates. In fact the whole house is in one mass of disease and infection without accommodation classification clothing bedding or proper attendants. In my opinion it would be much safer & more charitable to close the House altogether than keep it open in its present state, the truth is the time has arrived, when serious change must be made in the Establishment or else the whole of its inmates, officers & all will be swept away by one common pestilence.

The remedies I would suggest are
1st The immediate erection of fever wards or temporary sheds, as in the Galway House.

2^{dly} The enlargement of the present Infirmary by raising the Idiot Wards on each side, & attaching them to it, and also by taking down the lath partition which separates the two centre wards up stairs from the passage that divides the male and female side, of the Infirmary, it would afford considerable accommodation & thorough ventilation at a very trifling cost.

3^{rdly} a sufficient supply of clothing
bleeding to meet the increasing
demand nearly one half of the
present inmates are wearing
their filthy rags full of vermin
and contagion,

4^{thly} proper responsible wardens
& women, maids to report accurately
the health of the Paupers under their
superintendance & to preserve cleanliness

5^{thly} proper intelligent nurses, fairly
remunerated for their labour & risk
of life in attending such cases,
as Dysentery & Typhus, fever.

These are the several most urgent
matters I would beg this day to bring
under your consideration, there
are other matters of detail that
can be considered on a future
occasion, but those I have
enumerated ought with a due
regard to human life be carried
into immediate execution, -

I feel fully the difficult
position the Guardians are placed
in I should regret extremely to add
to their embarrassment, but the
responsibility that attaches to
my situation & the amount of

magnitude of disease I have to
contend with, leave me no alternative
than to place before the Board a plain
Statement of facts with the remedies
I would propose.

 In consequence of several Complaints made to me that the Paupers did not get the supply of Milk they were entitled to by the Dietary of the House, & enquired of the Master as to the facts of the case, when he informed me that there was a deficient supply last week to the amt of 386 lbs of Milk and the week before of 206.—this is a very serious matter in the present state of the House & as want that cannot be permitted without great injury to the inmates in general, but particularly to those afflicted with Fever and Dysentery.
