The New Guardian having communicated with Dr. Hayes, Med. Officer of the temporary Town Hospital at Kilbarra and with Dr. Nolan Med. Officer of the Workhouse and attached adjoining thereto which has been recently placed under the Central Board of Health in reference to the order given the Committee of Health respecting the New Guardians to appoint Medical Officers for the temporary Town Hospital at Cork and at Kilbarra and an arrangement was made with Dr. Hayes for the continuation of his services as Medical Officer of the temporary Hospital at Kilbarra for the same amount of remuneration as he previously received, namely 3/- per day. Dr. Hayes at the same time stating that although he agreed to that amount originally as too low, still as he had accepted it when paid out of the general Reserve of the Country he would now refuse it when drawn from the County funds as an impoverished Union.

The New Guardians were unsuccessful in concluding an agreement with Dr. Nolan for the continuation of his services as Med. Off. of the temporary Hospital near the Workhouse at Cork, he having declined to accept payment at the rate of £45. a year ~~is added~~ for the performance of that duty which the New Guardians considered fair remuneration in addition to his salary of £45 a year as Med. Off. of the Workhouse. The ~~Examiner~~ of the ~~Examiner~~ of the Board of Health and the Schools forming the Workhouse Hospital being placed together with one staff, one range of Officers and requiring little extra labour except attending on the patients which include those who fall sick in the Workhouse and whom the Medical Officer of the House would in ordinary cases be required to attend. Dr. Nolan stated that the school having been placed under the Board of Health and the payment being but temporary he considered he was entitled to the same amount of remuneration as was allowed him by the Board of Health without reference to his salary as Medical Officer of the Workhouse.

It further appeared that Smith had continued to supply Meal for a member of the family of a woman named Mary Kinane, after the party had been discharged.

It also appeared that when through mistake he had omitted giving the name of Anne Dermody,

than on Out-relief, to the storekeepers, whereby the person who applied for meal on her behalf was refused, on discovering the omission he neglected for three days sending her the weeks rates out, although expressly directed to do so by the Vice-Guardians.

Further complaint of having supplied Out-relief improperly having been made the Vice-Guardians deferred hearing their report until they had ascertained into all the cases, and the latter charges having been investigated on the 27th instant were ascertained to be unfounded.

The Vice-Guardians informed Gurnell that they were ready to receive any explanation he may think proper to offer respecting the three charges which were proved and ought to be produced a letter of explanation which however from some cause he subsequently withdrew promising to forward his explanation day his statement before the Vice-Guardians at the Meeting on the following day.

No such document having been laid before the Vice-Guardians on this day it was ordered

That the above facts be reported to the free court, and that they be informed that unless such can give some reasonable explanation of his neglect the Vice-Guardians are of opinion that he ought to resign his situation.
