It was resolved that as Cholera has now manifested itself in this Union two cases having occurred in the Town of Gerbuth in course of the week and one yesterday in the Union Workhouse, medical officer should be at once appointed to undertake the treatment of cholera cases, the three Guardians therefore agreed to avail themselves of the services of the only two qualified medical Practitioners at present in Gerl Dr Mulvihill & Dr Nolan who therefore appointed at a salary of one guinea per diem each (then duties commencing tomorrow) to attend to cholera patients in the three Guardians shall have communicated

the Arrangement to the Commissioners
and obtained a reply from them with
respect to the maximum amount of
remuneration which the Poor Law Board &
the Central Board of Health deem
sufficient for such medical officers.
The Vice Guardians have as yet made
no arrangement with respect to the
appointment of an apothecary for
the Cholera Hospital and will take
informed what salary should be given
to obtain the services of such an
officer.

Hospital have appropriated one of
the sheds now erected for a Workhouse
Hospital and capable of containing
100 patients to the reception of cholera
patients both from the Workhouse & the
Town of Gort and its vicinity which
shed will be made available further
purpose in the course of time
the selection of nurses was entrusted to the
Medical Officer subject to the approval of the Guardian,
Eliza Costock Superintendent of Bakery but
after resignation, as she is going to America
her resignation was accepted,
ordered that Mrs Boland Wardwoman be placed
in charge of the Bakery for the present and
that Alicia Barrer be put in charge of the
female apartments under the superintendence
of the matron.

The Medical Officer reports that since Monday last there have been 77 cases, and 21 deaths in the Workhouse Cholera Hospital, there are a good many convalescents and he hopes to have some discharge this evening or tomorrow, -

The usual cases in the Hospital are going on pretty much in the same way except that the Epidemic influence of Cholera has increased the mortality amongst the Dysenteric patients.

He reports that Mr Hall is going on favourably and he hopes in his next report to be able to pronounce him out of danger.

It was ordered that fires be kept in the day rooms of the several workhouses, that flannel bests be provided for the men on outdoor work, and that the Dietay under the sealed order, be put into use immediately. -

The Vice Guardian have taken from Mrs Susan McCook Riverview house near Govt for a cholera Hospital at the rate of £12 per month for six months certain and £10 per month for each month it may be required after six. — the Guardian not having been able to obtain a house on any terms elsewhere were obliged to submit to Mrs McCook's terms — she having in the first instance declined to give her house for a less period than 12 months certain, the house when cholera ceases to be available for any other purpose on the application of the Master Almshouse the Vice Guardian agreed to allow them one gall of Tea & 1/2 lb of sugar to each per week.
