The medical officer reports that since Monday last there have been 77 cases, and 21 deaths in the workhouse Cholera Hospital, there are a good many convalescents, and he hopes to have some discharges this evening or tomorrow.

The usual cases in the Hospital are going on pretty much in the same way, except that the Epidemic influence of Cholera has increased the mortality amongst the Dysenteric patients.

He reports that Mr Hall is going on favourably and he hopes in his next report to be able to pronounce him out of danger.

It was ordered that fires be kept in the day rooms of the several workhouses, that flannel vests be provided for the men on outdoor work, and that the Dietary under the sealed order, be put into use immediately.

The following Orders of the Poor Law Commissioners were laid before the Board, and directions given thereon, as follows:
 Order of Poor Law Commissioners 30 March appointing Saml Maskey G. P.L.O. to act as Vice Guardian during the illness of Mr Hall.

Mr James Jordan was appointed Sanitary officer to abate nuisances, shave houses, cleanse and white wash, and was agreed to pay him a salary of one pound per week until further orders.

The Vice Guardians have taken from Mrs Susan McCook Riverview house near Govt for a Cholera Hospital at the rate of £12 per month for six months certain and £10 per month for each month it may be required after six. The Guardians not having been able to obtain a house on any terms elsewhere were obliged to submit to Mrs McCook ~~terms~~ she having in the first instance designed to give her house for a less period than 12 months certain. The house when cholera ceases is to be available for any other purpose on the application of the Master Matron. The Vice Guardians agreed to allow them one quart of Tea & 1/2 lb of Sugar to each per week.

I beg to call your attention to a case of great distress in the Gort Union Village of Aran Parish of Ballindereen the object is a poor woman named Kitty Wain, an old servant of the late Mr Kealy and 40 years in the parish she had been discharged last November from service after the demise of Mr Kealy and has been since sheltered in the house of another person residing there. I have recommended her as a fit object for relief, as also did Mr Arthur M'George, and she has been refused by Mr Leonard Keatinge officer for no other reason in my opinion, but that the application was not made through the Rev Mr Kelly, to whom we had written by this poor woman for the amt of an acct due to us, this poor woman is now under death bed for want of food and I am determined to refer the case to the poor Law Commissioners and the Freeman's Journal, and how I shall have the pleasure of doing next week in Dublin I have now made the case known to you, and imperitantly demand the dismissal of Keatinge and also an investigation into the matter the poor woman may be dead by this time.
