 he directed should any solitary cases occur in their districts to send them forthwith to the Cholera Hospital at Kilmorra

The Vice Guardians feeling that it would not be prudent to close the Cholera Hospital at Kilmorra suddenly, (there being still a few cases in it) have determined to continue the services of Doctor Hyne, for one week from Monday next, and have engaged the services of Mr Taaffe for the sum of Ten Shillings & Six Pence per week for the same period to compound the prescriptions at the Hospital, after which day it is expected the Hospital will be finally closed.

The Vice Guardians regret to observe, by an Entry in the Visitors Book as well as by a Report from Dr. Nolan that the Rev. Michl. Kelly P.P. of Millerton visited the Hospital on Fairy Hill at a late hour on the evening of Thursday last the 31<sup>st</sup> Ultimo, and also sorry to learn that he made use of abusive, and ungentlemanly language towards the Porter of the Workhouse, who very properly refused him access to the Body of the House. — The Vice Guardians are desirous at all times of the Morning to open the Workhouse to the inspection of respectable Visitors at proper hours; but they cannot permit any person (however respectable he may be) to visit the House at unreasonable hours; nor will they allow the Officers of the Workhouse to be unwarrantably interfered with in the discharge of their duties.

The Vice Guardians have therefore directed the Porter of the Workhouse, the Porter of the Hospital, and the other Officers of the Workhouse to refuse Mr. Kelly admission to any part of the Workhouse in future, and have determined, in the event of Mr. Kelly's attempting to violate this order, or interfere in any way in the Management of the



Affairs of the Union; that they will at Once lay before Mr. Kelly's Diocesan the Right Rev. D<sup>n</sup> French a full, and explicit Statement of his Conduct.

In reference to the letter of the Poor Law Commission<sup>rs</sup> requiring a report from the medical officer respecting a new form of disease which has appeared amongst the Poor in this Union, the following report was received. —

Gentlemen

With reference to this new form of disease appearing amongst the recipients of out relief, and which the Poor Law Commissioners request should report upon, I have to observe it was very prevalent about three weeks or a month ago and consisted of a high degree of Cuticular Inflammation in the face hands and feet producing in most cases an enormous swelling in the face, the features becoming completely obliterated, and the Eyes completely closed, from serous effusion into the subcutaneous tissue, the swelling in the back of the hands was also very considerable. In almost every case that came under my observation, the person so attacked had been in the habit of eating two descriptions of herbs, one called the Wild Cabbage or mustard seed in Swiss "Carrotkeerack" the latter plant is described as of a very watery nature and quite devoid of anything like Nutrient. I consider those vegetables may be the predisposing cause of the disease giving rise to a degree of gastric irritation which renders the skin more easily acted upon by the heat of the sun which I look upon as the exciting cause of the disease. In no instance have I known this disease to arise in a person who had been using those herbs, but not exposed to the action of a hot sun, the party attacked likewise bear out this opinion, the disease being entirely confined to those parts of the body that are devoid of covering, the disease speedily yields to mild alterative aperients, and tepid emollient applications, with an improved Dietary disappearing usually in five or six days, leaving on the forehead tip of the nose and back of the hands, a brownish scar in the centre of which (in severe cases) there exist large white pustules, containing a quantity of thick purulent matter, many of the persons labouring under this disorder state that they have been attacked at night as if their face were stung with nettles, and the next morning to see their own expression their face "was as big as a pot"
