The medical officer reports eleven deaths, in the Workhouse Hospital three in the Fever Hospital and in the Nursery. of General decline three in the Workhouse Hospital this morning 197 and in the Fever Hospital 40. As regards the mortality most of the Cases were labouring under complications of disease with a degree of constitutional debility which rendered medical treatment of little avail, the Health of the inmates general continues in a Satisfactory state;—

Resolved that our Solicitor do prepare warrants with a view to the several Judgments obtained by the different Creditors of this Union against the Govt Board of Guardians, being satisfied on Record pursuant to the directions of the Commissioners, as conveyed in their letter to Capt O'Brien of the 5 Inst. and that our Clerk do furnish Mr Nolan with the particular names of the Creditors

Resolved that no larger sum than six pence in the pound be paid to the collectors for a future rate.

Resolved that the Master give a written Requisition daily to each contractor for the quantity of milk required for the following day & that each contractor shall get  $\frac{1}{3}$  of the delivered
