The Medical officer reports the number in the workhouse Hospital this morning is 324 and in the Fever Hospital 55 deaths in the former during the week 11 in the Fever Hospital 1 and in the Nursery 2, as regards, one of those deaths, in the Nursery, an infant only 3 hours old, a coroners Inquest has been held & stands adjourned to Friday next.

He reports that the supply of water furnished to the Hospital for washing purposes is wholly inadequate.

It would be desirable to have some common Timber provided to erect seats in the yards of the female auxiliary House, which during their hours of recreation the children might occupy, this fine weather prevent the day rooms from being unduly crowded.

The sanitary condition of the House continues satisfactory
