He recommends a Store be erected at the end of each of the Probationary Yards, properly ventilated, and arrangements for airing by Stoves and fumigating, that the clothing of each family be in a net that could be made with the house, attached to a tub a piece of lead upon it the register number could be stamped, the bundles suspended upon hooks and not touching. In one of the Stores he suggests a boiler for the old clothes, to be hoisted in as they are received and in the second Store a drying room in which they could be also fumigated previous to deposit in Store.
