Letter from National Board of Education 27 Sep 1851 forwarding an Extract from their Inspectors Report stating that "the Teachers of the Workhouse Schools are of a medium order, Fair progress has been made in both departments since last inspection. The answering in Geography Grammar and Arithmetic was, in general satisfactory."

Letter from Board of Ordnance 5 Oct 1851 stating that among other property they purchased an unoccupied house at Gort that the Barrack Master found a number of Squatters had got into it, that the Commr^s of the Encumbered Estates Court issued their injunction to give the possession of said house to the Board of Ordnance, that the persons purporting not being tenants do not come within the provisions of the 11 & 12 Vic Chap 47.
