The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon, as follows:
The Medical Officer reports the number in the Infirmary this morning as 220 and in the Fever Hospital 30, deaths in the former during the week in the former 4 and in the latter one, this mortality with one exception occurred amongst children under nine years of age, and who in addition to the immediate cause of death, (Dysentery or Diarrhoea) were labouring under great Constitutional Debility, the general ^{health} of the House as regards Dysentery & Diarrhoea is highly satisfactory

The following Orders of the Poor Law Commissioners were laid before the Board, and directions given thereon, as follows:

The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect, (or Orders made on them respectively, as follows:)

Letter from Poor Law Commissioners 24 Oct
relating to a resolution of the Board of
Guardians on the 14th Inst regarding the
payment of Annuities under 13th & 14th Acts
Cap 14, with reference to the two principal
charges the advances for labour rate & for
Temporary Relief in 1847. The Commissioners
observe that the amt of each separate
advance under those acts was acknowledged
in the case of Temporary Relief advances,
by the Relief Committee and subsequently
by the Clerk of the Union and the separate
advances for Labour rate was notified
to the Secretary of the Grand Jury.
The Commissioners presume that if any
valid objection had existed to the amounts
ascertained and charged on account of
the two last named advances such
objection would have been stated by
the parties interested therein during the
period preceding the passing of the
Annuities act. and the Commissioners

do not feel called upon to apply to the
Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury
to communicate to the Guardians any
detailed information respecting the mode
of expenditure of the advances.

The Commissioners enclose a statement
showing the total amt charged under each
head against each Electoral division of the Union.

The Board of Guardians beg to acknowledge
the receipt of the above letter enclosing
what the Commissioners call a detailed
account of the Government advances,
the items in which are so glaringly wrong
that it is quite useless to the Guardians
for instance in the Electoral division of
Kaiwara where it is notorious that the
largest amount of labour rate
was expended is only charged £1429,
whereas the Electoral division of
Wiltaton where the expenditure was
very low the charge is £2016. If the
Commissioners will explain this error
it would be very satisfactory, large
sums of this labour rate has been paid
to the Barony Collectors for which the
Guardians can see no credit given

It having been reported by the medical officer on last Board day that the skin milk supplied to children from 5 to 15 years of age is much relished by them, and in a sanitary point of view has not been found to disagree with them
It was

Resolved that the master extend the supply of skin milk instead of new milk to all healthy pauper inmates of the workhouse over 15 years of age, the Board having found it impossible to procure a sufficient supply of pure new milk.

John Slater new Rate Collector being about to emigrate to Australia sent in his resignation which was accepted and the Clerk ordered to advertise by hand bills for a Collector or Collectors in his stead to be taken into consideration on this day week.

The Board finding that the Board of Guardians of Corrofin Union are indebted to this Union with the sum of £525 to the 29 day of September last past, It was ordered that an application be made to the Poor Law Commissioners requesting they will direct the Corrofin Board to discharge the amount due to this Union up to the 29 Sept. last as this Board understand the Corrofin Board have a rate made for some time, part of which was estimated to meet the expenses of their paupers in this house.

Resolved that no Rate collector get the books but those who agree to pay all expenses except those incurred in the Dublin county without the consent of this Board.

Resolved that £10 be given to the
Master to purchase old clothes for
some paupers who are anxious
to leave the house and who have been
lunatics for some years.

The Board adjourned to Thursday
the 28th inst for general business.
