⁹ The Medical Officer report with reference to the duties letter of the Poor Law Commissioners respecting the duties of Joseph O'Doughlin and the nature of the duty to be assigned to him in case his services were to be continued and this letter having been referred home to refer upon, I have to state that this officer hitherto and up to this time has discharged the duties of Infirmary Fees Hospital and Dispensary Notes, as well as Hospital Clerk, maintaining due order and regularity in the Hospital department, and making up the daily returns of the sick in the Infirmary and Fever Hospital diet, admissions, and discharges, &c & together with the duty of preventing the ingress or losses except to Hospital officers, not connected with the sick.

I need scarcely observe that the time of the Hospital nurse is sufficiently occupied in the distribution of medicines, distribution of diet, and the general supervision of the requirements of the sick, as also the superintendance of the clothing and washing arrangements of the patients in the Infirmary and Fever Hospital. As regards future duties, I cannot conceive there is any change called for, the present arrangement appears to me to have worked well, that I am clearly of opinion that without a competent person being always on the spot capable of controlling the duties of Hospital Clerk and Porter, the Hospital Works and returns cannot be accurately kept up, or due order and regularity properly enforced. The medical officer duty should, as much as possible be strictly professional.

The following Orders of the Poor Law Commissioners were laid before the Board, and directions given thereon, as follows:

The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect, / or Orders made on them respectively, as follows:—

Letter from Poor Law Commissioners, 29 April 1852 acknowledging receipt of Resolution calling for a revision of the State aid towards the liabilities of the Electoral divisions of Gort Kinvarra, Ballycarbhan and Killeasacanty, the Commissioners do not admit that the rates which have been made on the Electoral divisions named are the highest rates which could be collected, and the Commissioners request that the Guardians will take steps to put in course of Collection new Rates sufficient to pay the expenditure of each of the Electoral divisions of the Union to the 29 Sept next. The Commissioners request an estimate of the amount which is required up to that date based upon the balances on the 15 March last. The Commissioners could not recommend any grant to the Electoral divisions it being the duty of the Guardians to provide for their requirements by levying new Rates.

Circular from same 30 April 1852 giving Instructions regarding duties to be performed under the Medical Charities act, and stating that considering the great extent of the District and the amount of the population therein the Commissioners deem the amounts of Salary proposed for the medical officers to be inadequate, and they request the Guardians, to reconsider the salaries with a view to the salaries being fixed at amounts commensurate with the duties required to be performed by the medical officers.

Resolved that taking into account the extent of Medical Relief necessary in this Union and which we know from our local information that the salaries of our medical men are ample and also taking into consideration the fact of our giving to each of the medical men an apothecary at £20 per annum, we adhere to our former Resolution of the 9 Decr 1851.

Letter from same 3 May relative to the appointment of an apothecary to each of the Dispensary Districts in the Union and in reference thereto, the Commissioners will take the necessary steps for carrying the Medical Charities act into operation in the Union as soon as possible.
