Ophthalmia still continues to prevail amongst the children although not generally in an aggravated form as I remarked in my last report, it prevails principally amongst the boys located at Fairyhill with some few cases from the main House and Girls Auxiliary. I think it would be important as a preventive measure to have the day rooms painted green and to have some green field in which the children could be daily exercised. The dormitories should be ~~freely~~ well ventilated and more overrodding permitted.

The sheds at Fairy hill being white washed inside and outside with a constant glare of strong light and nothing to relieve the eye must have an injurious tendency as regards this disease.—


