The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect, / or Orders made on them respectively, as follows:—

Letter from Poor Law Commissioners, 14 May forwarding copy of a Constabulary report regarding the eviction of Rose Walsh with her seven children from a holding in the Townland of Normangrove, it appearing that the notice to be served by the Eviction Act in such case, was not served and the Commissioners request the attention of the Board of Guardians to the 6<sup>th</sup> Section of the Act 11 & 12 Vic Cap 47 which provides for recovery of a penalty in case of non-service of the requisite notice.

Resolved that our Solicitor Mr Nolan be directed to proceed against Mr Charles Higgins of Normangrove under the 6<sup>th</sup> Sec<sup>n</sup> of the Eviction Act 11 & 12 Vic Cap 47 he having failed to serve the necessary notice agreeably to that Act on the relieving Officer of the Killinny District Electoral Division in the case of Rose Walsh of the Townland of Normangrove in that Electoral Division.

Letter from same 15 May 1852 observing that the Collectors are still in the habit of retaining money in their hands, from week to week and recommending the Board of Guardians to have a summons issued under the 102<sup>d</sup> Sec of the Irish Poor Relief Act against any Collector who shall appear to retain any balance in his hands.

Letter from Mr Octavius O'Brien Solicitor stating that Messrs Barnatye has instructed him to proceed upon the Law measures already taken against the Union which were suspended upon an arrangement made which the Guardians have failed to carry out.

Resolved that the Clerk write to Mr O'Brien in reply to his application on behalf of Messrs Barnatye, today, that the Board is at present unable to meet the demand of Mr Barnatye on the Union but that they expect in a very few days that the Annities lodged to the credit of this Union in the Bank will be handed back to the Board to meet their liabilities, and that if Mr O'Brien stays proceedings until then the Messrs Barnatye will be among the first that the Board will then settle with.

Mr Bells having sent in an Estimate of repairs required at her house now about to be given up the same was referred to the following Committee to report thereon by next Board day viz. James Lohiff Pat Glynn Tobias Koscingrave with the assistance of Mr Briscoe

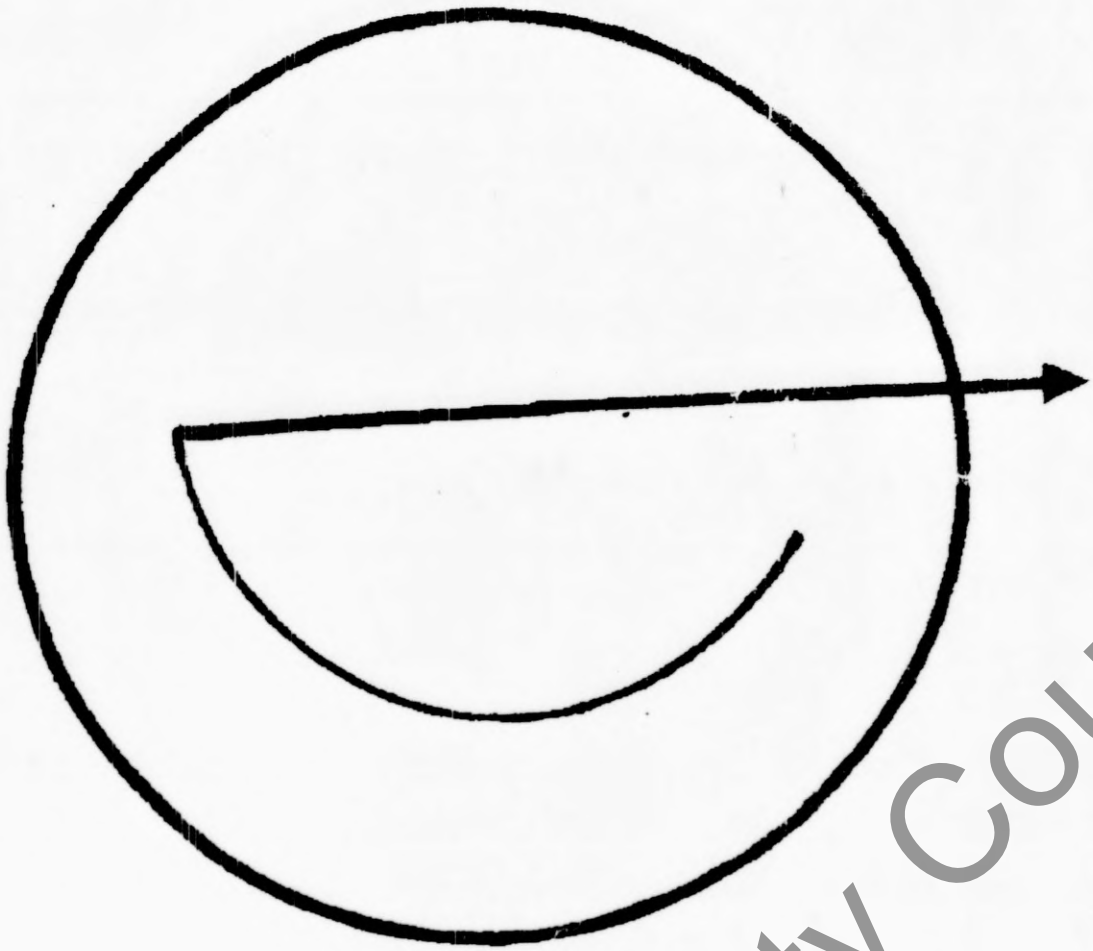
