verbal one to the Porter, as he is informed that the girl spent that day and the following one at the races of Port and has not since returned. He conceives this to be a very improper interference in his department. If it were only a mere act of courtesy towards himself he would not trouble the Board with it—but where it is considered that the whole responsibility of the sick their due care and attendance is thrown on the Med. Officer and that if his authority be interfered with or superseded in this way, he can no longer discharge his duties efficiently to the sick or enforce that discipline order and regularity which is so essential to the proper working of the Hospital under discharge. He is sure the Board will consider he discharges only an important duty when he acts for its support in the exercise of the responsible duties attached to his office and that it will take the necessary steps to prevent the recurrence of such transactions.
