The Medical Officer reports as regards the Bread at present in use being a Compound of Barley & Indian Meal. He is of opinion in the event of your not being able to procure Rye Meal as hitherto, it will be better to make the Bread of Barley meal altogether, there has been a deficiency in the supply of Milk to the Hospital for the last two days to the amount of about fourteen Gallons. The Sanitary Condition of the Establishment continues very satisfactory, and with respect to its mortality and that of the Fever Hospital. He has the pleasure to state there have been but three deaths during the last seven weeks.
