The medical officer reports the Sanatory condition of the Workhouse inmates continues pretty much in the same satisfactory state as at last report, and the only death that occurred arose from Pulmonary consumption admitted to the house in the last stage of that disease, as regard Fever there has been a marked increase, It is however satisfactory to observe that of the eleven cases admitted during the week seven were from the Town and Country.

The Master reports that a sufficient quantity of new and skim milk had been supplied last week and the Contractors inform him that in future they will be in a position to supply the amt. required each week

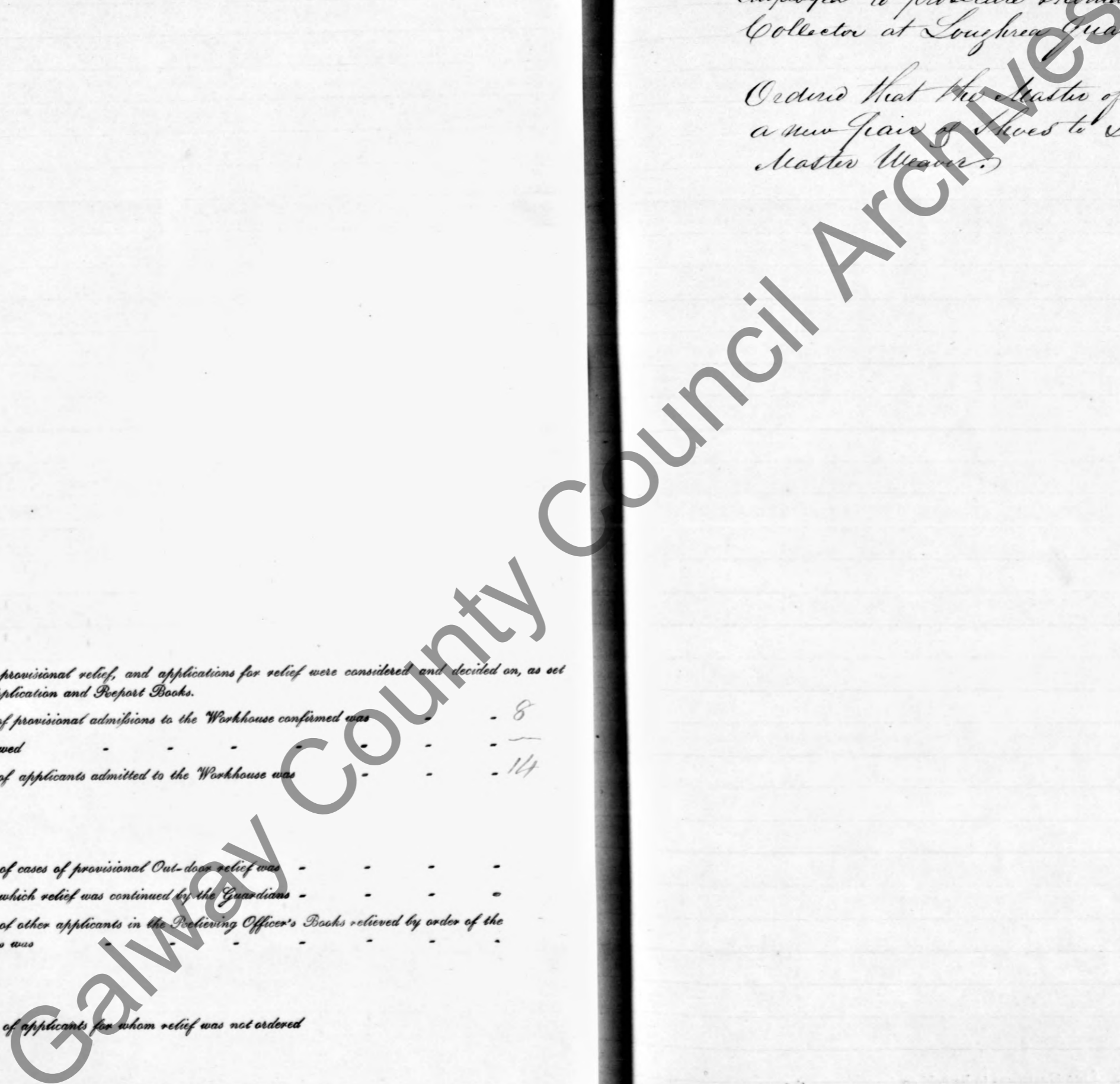

Mr Slater is aware of this engagement on my part. I have to state that altho the charges were clearly proved against Quin, the Jury chiefly I believe owing to the character received were of opinion he was not guilty.

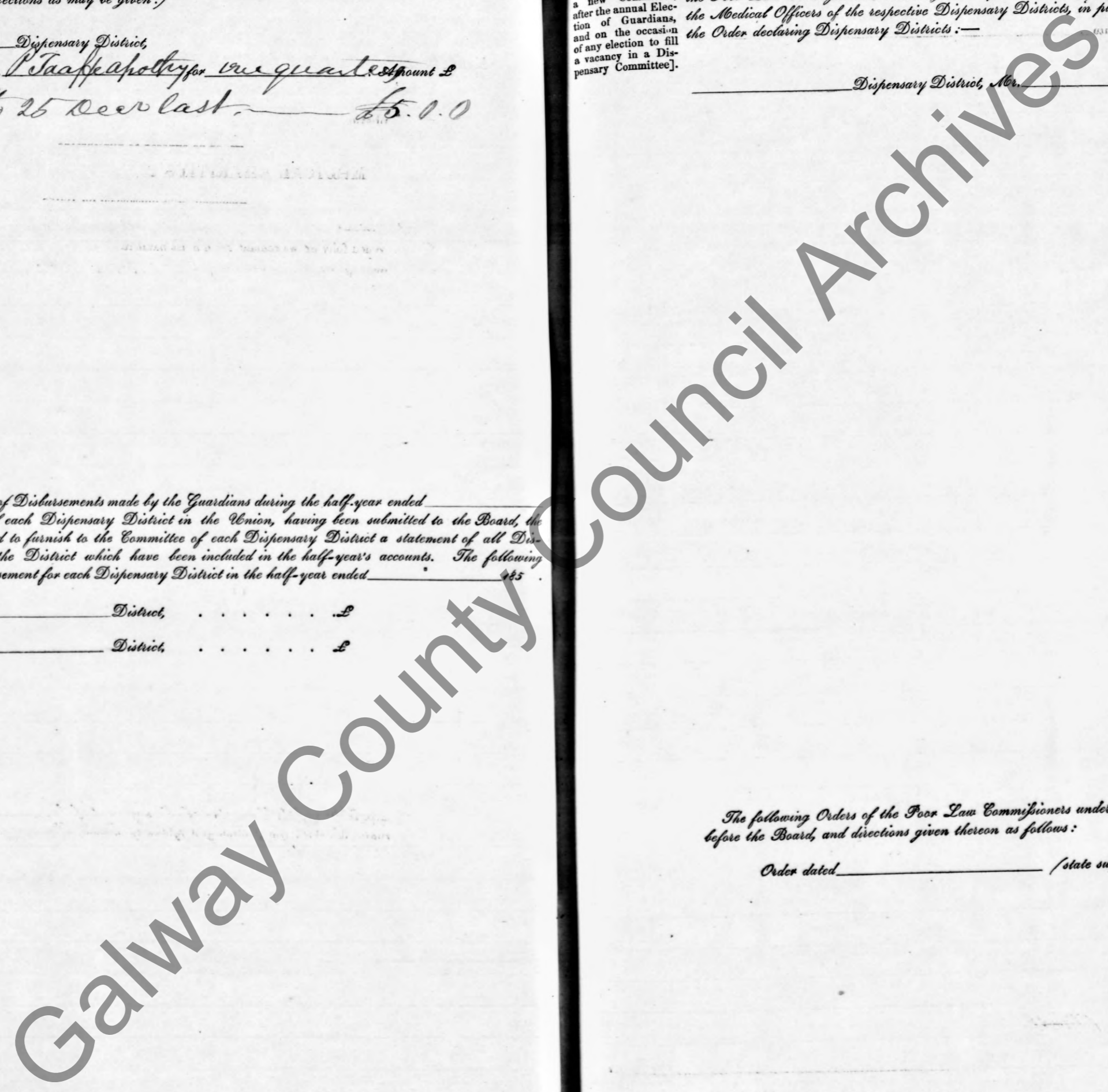
