 The Medical Officer reports the health of the Workhouse generally continues generally satisfactory. If the members in Infirmary and Fever Hospital appear large with expense to the members in the House, it is owing to the fact that the admissions to both Hospitals, are principally made up of Custom Cases. In connection with this Circumstance he has hoped there is not a sufficient number of Hospital attendants, and if you could become arrangements made to secure it would be very advisable with a due regard to the sick.

Resolved that in pursuance of the Medical Officers report suggesting that the Asst Nurses (Helpers), in consequence of the severe duties of these persons sitting up at night be allowed additional salaries consisting of 2s each for Sugar and two pounds of Bread each per week while so employed. and the same for the women in attendance on lying in women.

Letter from Poor L. Commrs dated 11<sup>th</sup> December N<sup>o</sup> 3368/53 requesting of the Guardians to assist in the lodgement of the Small Sum, retained by Collector Staunton Hayles.

Letter from same 12<sup>th</sup> December N<sup>o</sup> 3368/1855 requesting that the Guardians, do require an explanation in writing from the Master as to how the burial of the Pauper took place in the Cemetery without his knowledge.

Having been called on to explain how the pauper Boy was buried in the ground used as a Cemetery by the God Union after 25<sup>th</sup> March 1854. They do state that they were not informed that the Cemetery was about to be surrendered. It was by accident only heard of it, and on the 27<sup>th</sup> March or thereabouts by a report requested to be inserted when I would visit the bodies of any Pauper that would die in the Workhouse. There was no order made in it

think the New employes taking the dead got the key out of the office when it was usually placed, and buried the Boy in question, but as soon as I heard all the circumstances of the case I put a stop at once to all further interments. *Mich<sup>d</sup> M<sup>r</sup> Hem*

C.
