Letter from Poor Law Commissioners, No 11,78. 18 Jan'y 1858 Referring to Master's Report of Misconduct by certain paupers, one of whom was ordered to be prosecuted the others to be discharged from the House. The Commissioners, refer the Guardians to articles 38 to 58 of Workhouse Regulations, with respect to the punishment of paupers for Misbehaviour and to the 58 secⁿ of the Irish Poor Relief Act under which punishment is provided by imprisonment in the Gaol or House of Correction.

The Commissioners state that Mr McNamee's qualifications as Master of the Workhouse are not such as to command respect and enforce discipline in the Management of the Workhouse, and the Commissioners request ^{the Guardians} to take the steps for the appointment of a person of more mature years and experience as Workhouse Master, the Commissioners ^{say they} state that the Matron should also be cautioned that a recurrence of such events must lead to a consideration as to her

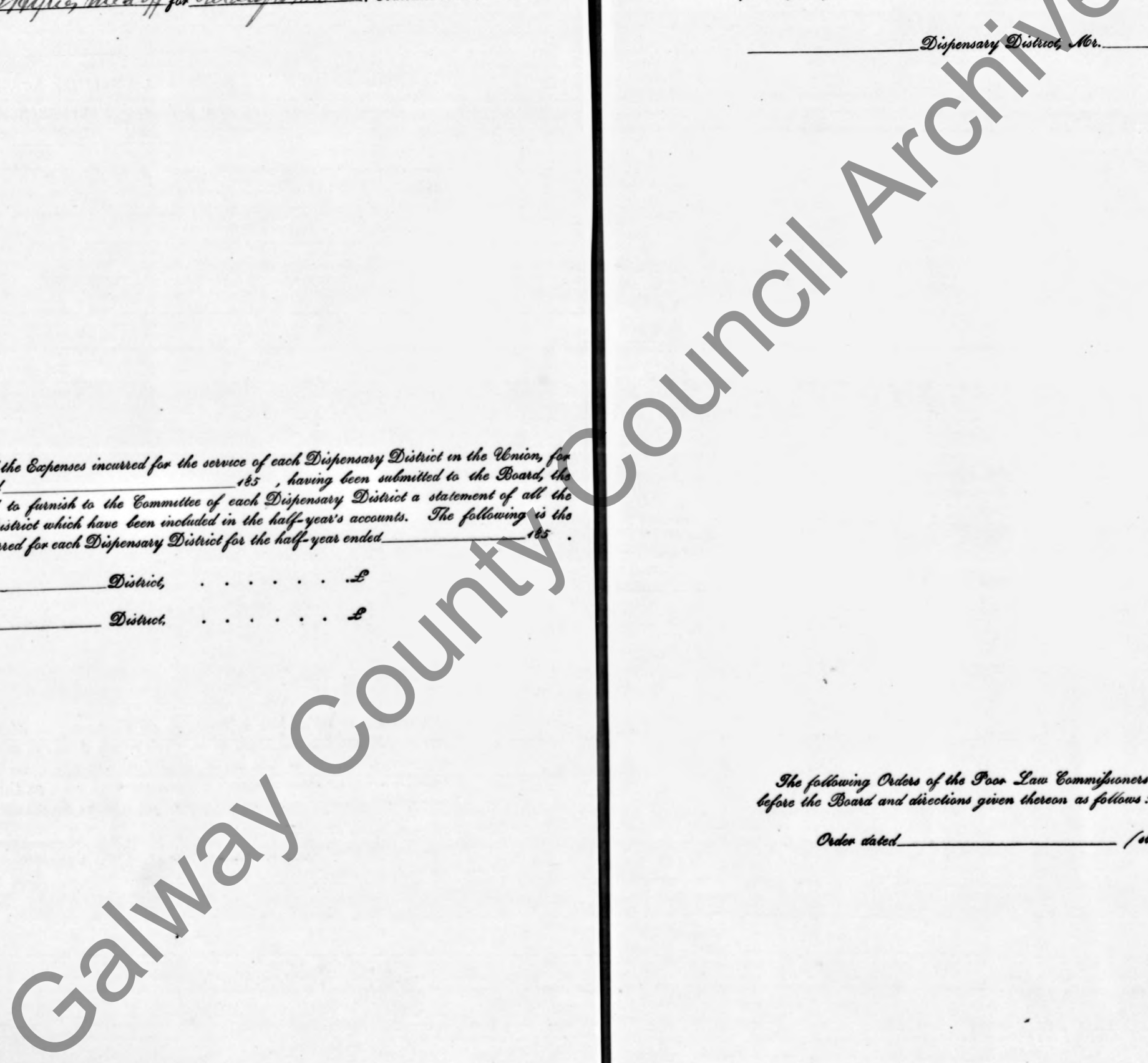

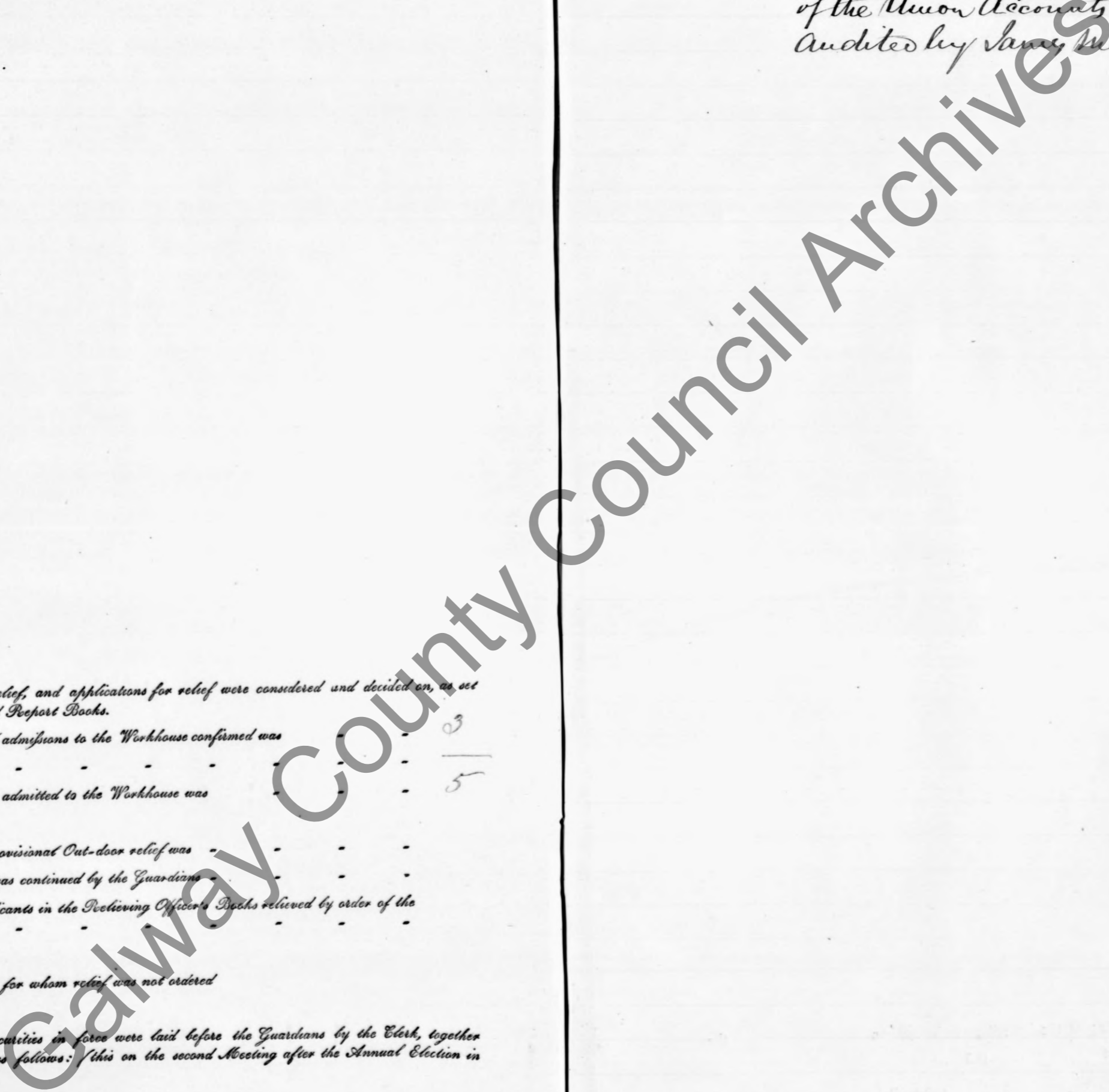
