Ordered that as often as this occurs the Master provide Butter and supply 2g in lieu of each p. of Milk. The extra cost to be charged to Contractors.

He also requests a supply of vegetables.

The half ton of Turnips ordered weekly.

The Medical Officer reports that at the last meeting of the Board of Guardians, the Chairman drew his attention to the dilatory of the Hospital with a view to its reduction.

He finds both in the Male and Female Department some patients labouring under Chronic Diseases in many instances of an incurable

The following Orders of the Poor Law Commissioners were laid before the Board, and directions given thereon, as follows.

Patients who have been a long time on the Hospital books. Those Patients, have been allowed to remain not being in a state of health to use the diet of the house. To remedy this defect he would suggest the establishment of the following scale of dietary. Breakfast 1 lb 12 oz, Tea about 1/2 pint Milk as at present with exception of milk. Dinner 3/4 lb to Bread with one pint Milk. He requests that some vegetable may be provided for Soup for the healthy inmates.

Yours to April 1858

Guillemont In Compliance of your order of last Board day regarding the deficiency in the weight of Bread. I beg to say it occurred on one day in consequence of the bread being baked three days before delivery. on the second occasion when I ordered some Loaves of bread of full weight to be supplied.

The Union had not suffered by the first as I ordered the deficiency to be sent to make up the weight. I never heard a complaint of the kind before although supplying the Workhouse for 15 or 16 years and promised that never occur again.

My Comention in reply to the letter of the Clerk requiring an explanation as regards the deficiency made in the Memorandum of 18th Sept 57. The Store in the absence of the Master who has been in Galway on the day the Commission visited the house the bread was 14 lb 1/2 at the time. I sent to the Contractor for to make up the deficiency. I admit I was wrong in making the weight as if the Bread full weight. but having sent for the difference I expected to make it as I had a good deal.

Sir /

We forward for the information of the Board of Guardians of the Govt Union, the following extracts from a report of the District Inspector, on the state of the Govt Workhouse National School, examined by him on the 25th Ultimo.

"The Teacher John Burke is earnest and systematic in the discharge of his duties. The course of instruction is as extended as could be expected when the very limited amount of time (three hours on five days of the week) devoted to literary instruction is taken into account.

"The proficiency of the children in some branches, such as Reading, Writing and Spelling, is very fair. In those branches which require previous preparation, on the part of the scholars, Grammar and Geography for instance, the answering was unsatisfactory. No opportunity is afforded to the pupils for preparing lessons or tasks, from the text books before or after school hours. I am happy to state that the penmanship of the 3rd Class (from oral dictation as well as from headlines), is very creditable, both with respect to the form of the letters, and the spelling of the words. It would increase the usefulness of the school in instruction (both theoretical and practical), were systematic given to the male pupils in agriculture, and the farm subject to the inspection of the Agricultural Inspector.

A supply of pencil holders is needed in the school.
