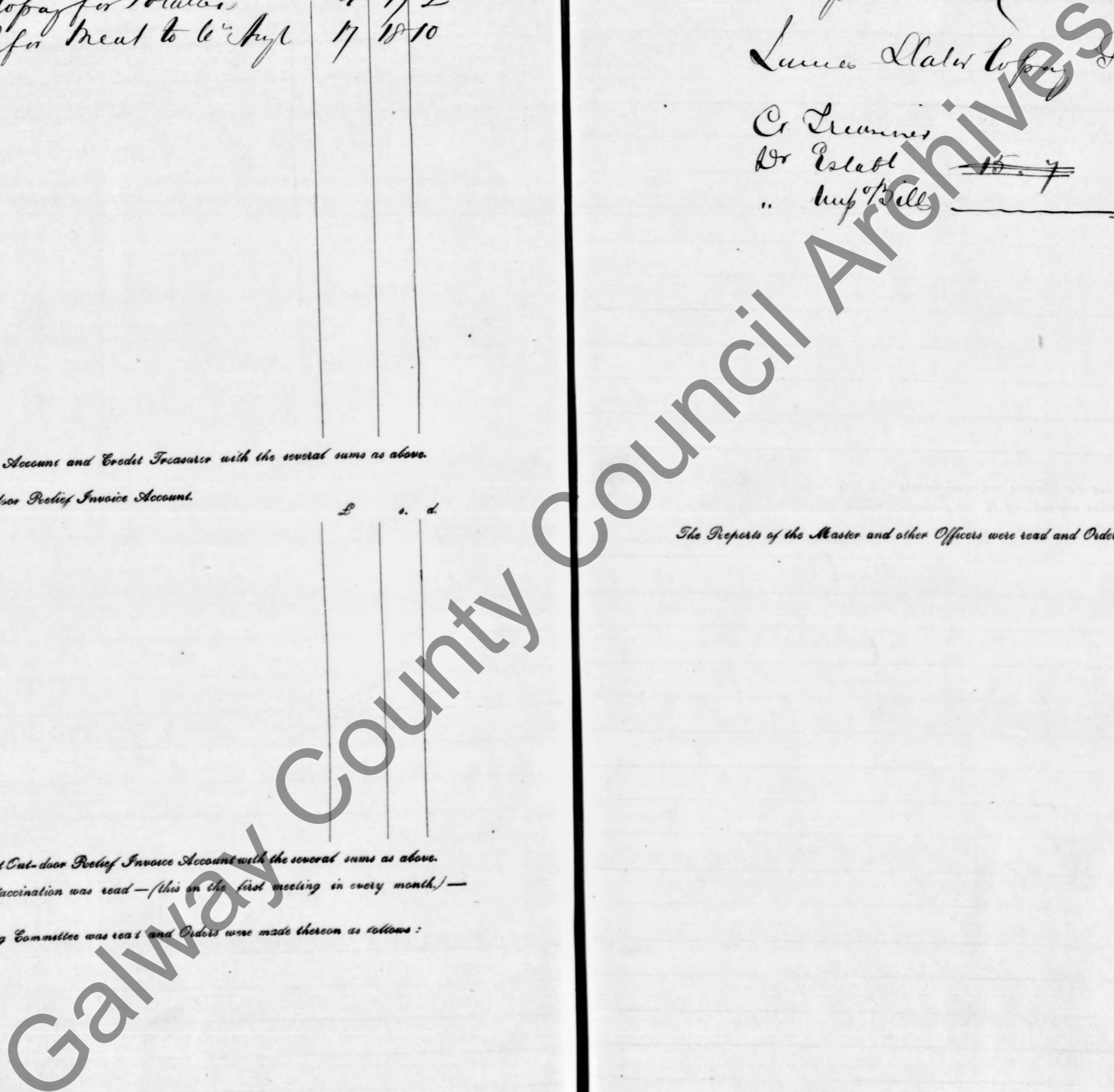

I believe these alterations were made in consequence of a difference between the Porter (who had charge of the Prisoner during the Master's illness) and the Hospital nurse, who denies having received the quantities which the Porter states he issued to her. The other portions of the Prisoner Account appear all correct.

The alterations in the Relief list are made by entering days for paupers who were discharged from the list by me, during the late Master's illness. I have corrected the list, the other Books, are all right.

The Board will recollect that thought under their notice, two attempts of fraud previous, to that for which he absconded. One being yds of sugar entered by him as received from Mary Molony and the other 29th Box of Soap alleged to have been received from John Halloran. These articles were not delivered from the parties and were accordingly deducted from their Bills.

I have reason to believe that these reports and the late use of fraud and forgery, caused a bad feeling towards me, and I am certain he made the alterations in the Books to cause confusion in the Accounts, when I was keeping them, as he made use of threats before he absconded, and thereby placed me in a difficulty. The Prisoner Check or the abstract of the Relief list are not affected by the alterations.

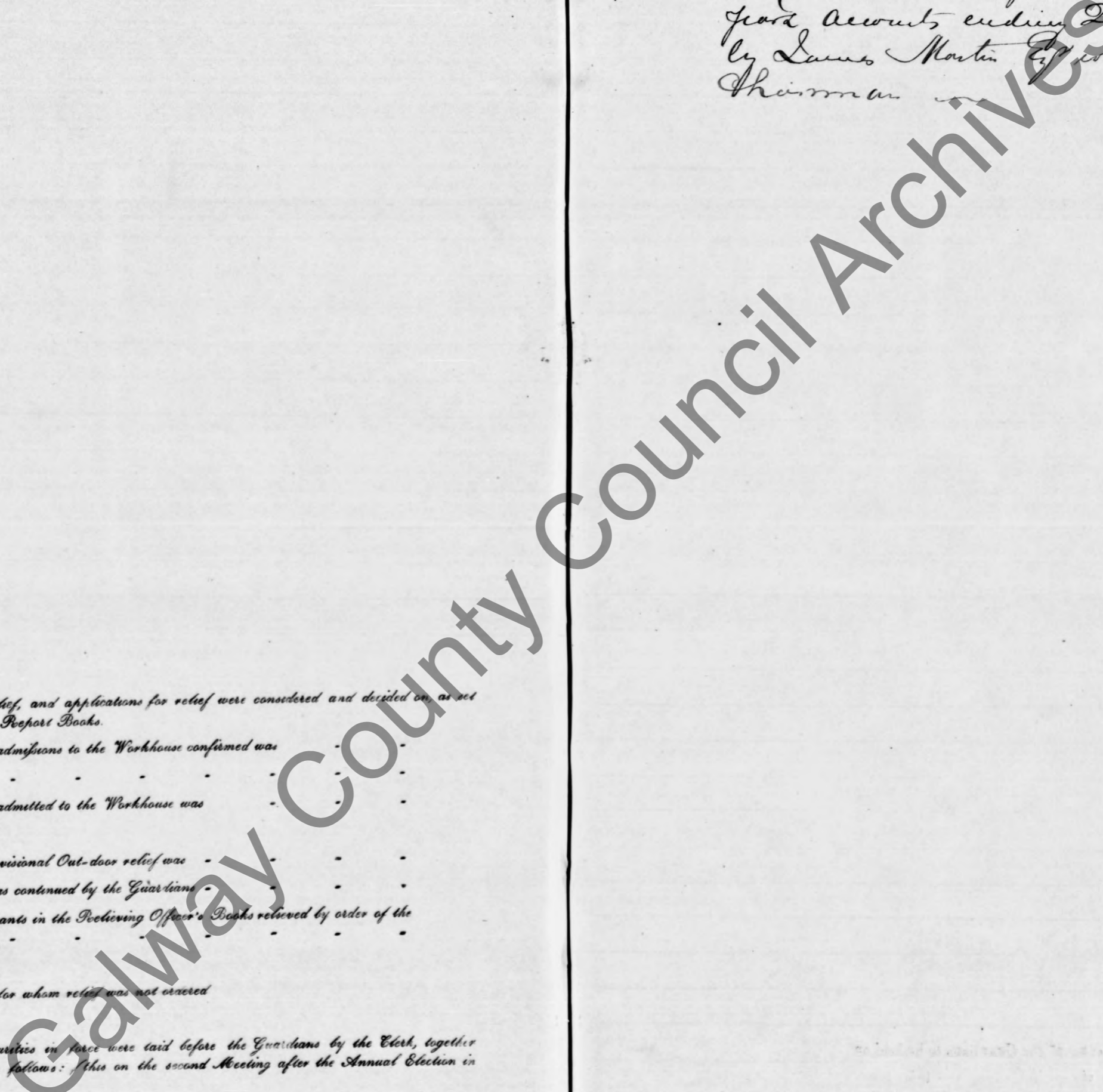
