Resolved that in consequence of the great pressure made upon us within the last few days by applications for relief principally by the families of holders of more than the 1/4 of the Ratable were we are decidedly of opinion that the available workhouse accommodation will be exhausted in a short time and that we apply to the Com^{rs} for Liberty to procure additional accommodation by hiring a house in addition to those already taken in the Town

Resolved that as it appears the Meal supplied by Mr Kelly Cashier for our Poor Relief to Killulla and Goulburn District has lately been very inferior to the Sample that the Clerk be directed to write to Mr Kelly to the effect that unless he delivers the article of Meal and good quality the Relief officer will be instructed to purchase a supply elsewhere and charge Mr Kelly the difference

Resolved that in consequence of Mr J. Coffey the ^{late} Clerk of the Union having been & hence called upon by the Commissioners immediately to resign and having also been requested by the new Guardians to State explicitly the course he intended to pursue, which he had declined to do, and as such inconvenience to the public Service must inevitably ensue by having the letters and Records of the Union taken possession of, by an irresponsible person as Mr Coffey at present is, being not only practically

under suspicion, but ^{having} ~~been~~ ^{perpetrated} his Security; We deem it our duty to serve a formal Notice on the Post Master, to Retain all official Letters addressed to the Clerk until further notice And that a strong representation be made to the Poor Law Commissioners, on the Venetians Course of proceeding adopted by Mr Coffey

The three Guardians then proceeded to open the several Tenders, and decided on them as follows: The Tender of James O'Brien for fitting up and enclosing the Altar in the Workhouse Chapel was accepted at 12 Pounds.

The Tenders for completion of the Works about to be commenced at the Workhouse under direction of Mr. Caspary, were postponed until the attendance of that gentleman.

The Election of Assistant Master was then proceeded with, three applicants were in attendance and after a short contest, Martin Hoade was elected at a Salary of 25 £ per annum, Rations and Apartments.

No Application for the office of Mistress having been received, it was ordered that Mrs. Murphy the Mistress should be continued in her Situation, until the decision of the Commissioners be received as to whether she shall be permitted to withdraw her resignation.

Resolved that having every reason to be satisfied with the Conduct of Catherine Moran the School Mistress and considering that the Children in the female School have made an extraordinary progress in writing and general instruction, since we took charge of the Union, and as the Salary of 8 £ per annum is in our opinion wholly inadequate for a teacher of these thorough Clafs, we order that her Salary be increased to 15 pounds per annum from the 25 of June next—Subject to the approval of the Poor Law Commissioners.

Resolved that in consequence of the Desmission of the Late Clerk by Sealed order, we advertise in the Salary of 80 Pounds per annum, Election to be held on Candidates to attend the Board on Saturday July 1st 1848.

Resolved that as some of the rate payers in the Union have expressed a wish to have the Curated

Resolved That in consequence of the great pressure now being made on us for admittance to the Workhouse We direct that the room at the Brewery Auxiliary Workhouse, at present used as a boys workshop, be fitted up for a Dormitory, and that we request the house belonging to Mrs Conner in Breda Street and report thereon to the Comm^{tee} with a view to having it taken and fitted up for an auxiliary work house

Only one application for the office of School Master having been received it was resolved to defer the appointment until Saturday June 24th 1848

The Tenders for Supply of Turf were considered too high and the consideration of this contract was deferred until Wednesday 21st inst fresh tenders to be invited in the mean time

They receive at present but 2 loaves of Bread and 4 pint of Milk daily, and they trust the Guardians will be good enough to increase the allowance to 1 lb of Meat 3 lbs of Bread and a pint of Milk, and that they will also allow them a lb of Tea and 2 lbs sugar each, weekly. So far as they have any knowledge of the regulations in other Unions, the officers of them are much better provided with Rations than they are, they therefore hope the Guardians will consider, that both the Numbers and the general condition of the paupers under their care, entitle them to be placed on as comfortable and respectable a footing as the officers of any other first class Workhouse.

The Master reports the necessity of providing a second refractory ward, and desires to have one for the Males and another for the Females.

Ordered, — That the allowance of Meal be increased to 1 lb per day for each of these officers and a pint of Milk ordered — That a refractory cell be procured for the Females in the back probationary yard.
