Reported:—That some Females of improper character who had lately come into the Workhouse had been very disorderly in their conduct. That excited a spirit of insubordination amongst the other paupers of those character, and that in consequence of which they were obliged to confine Bridget Connaughton for 24 hours in the cell and today to order informations to be sworn before the Magistrate against 4 others named:—Ellen Kelly, Mary Gill, Honor Flanagan & Bridget Sheehan for assaulting one of the handswomen in a serious manner.

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon, as follows:

The Master in conjunction with the Matron and Assistant Master beg leave to represent to the Six Guardians that the present Scale of Rations allowed them is insufficient. And they respectfully solicit a more liberal supply. They receive at present but 6 oz. Meat, 2 lb. Bread & 4 pints of Milk daily. They trust the Guardians will be good enough to increase the allowance to 8 lbs. Meat, 3 lbs. of Bread & a pint of Milk. That they will also allow them 1/4 lb. of Tea & 2 lbs. Sugar each, weekly. As far as they have any knowledge of the regulations in other Unions, the Officers of them are much better provided with Rations than they are. They therefore hope the Guardians will consider that both the number and the general condition of the paupers under their care entitle them to be placed on a comfortable & respectable footing as the Officers of any other first class Workhouse.

The Master report the necessity of providing a second Refactory Ward so as to have one for the males & another for the females.

Ordered, That the allowance of meat to be increased to 8 lbs per day for each of these Officers & a pint of Milk.

Ordered, That a refactory cell be provided for the females in the back probationary Yard.

The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon, as follows: (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year).

Resolved, That Orders be advertised for to be considered on Saturday the 22<sup>nd</sup> inst, for the thorough completion of the sewerage and drains of the Workhouse by properly sinking the cesspools which we have already commenced, and vaulting in the reservoir according to the Plans of Mr. Wilkinson.

Resolved, That Orders from competent person be advertised for in Galway Indictor & General Advertiser, 2 Pcts each, for raising the Shirt Wards of the Workhouse, according to the Plans and Specifications of Mr. Wilkinson, Commissioners Architect, — Clerk to write to the Architects Office to request the Plans and Specifications may be immediately sent down and tenders to be opened and Contractor declared on Saturday 29<sup>th</sup> July inst.

Resolved, That hand bills be printed & circulated calling for tenders from persons willing to contract for the Boarding of the floor of the Schoolroom at present occupied by the female children, which we consider necessary to have immediately done, as the present clay floor is unsuited either for health or cleanliness.

Resolved, — That advertisements be inserted in Indictor & General Advertiser for a properly qualified Schoolmaster, who must in every respect be competent to undertake the charge of the Workhouse School, according to the System of the National Board, Salary from £25 to £30 per annum with rations & apartments, And that the Clerk write by next post to the Secretaries of the National Board stating the impossibility of our being able to procure a suitable teacher in this district and to request they would recommend a teacher to the Vice Guardians.

Resolved, That we consider it expedient to close up the present door of the Clerks Office opening on the body, and to open the door from the Boardroom instead, and we also resolve to close up the door opened by the late Board from the Boardroom into the probationary "Sleeping Ward" and to construct a press in the space now taken up by the door.

Resolved, That it is of essential importance, not only to the health of the House but for the safe keeping of the clothing of paupers admitted, that a proper store be constructed in the front probationary yard for the reception of the paupers clothing, and the Clerk is

directed to write to request the Commissioners will draw a plan and specification the same as that in course of being carried at Emmerstony from the plans of Mr. Wilkinson.

Resolved, That as the general regularity & discipline of the Workhouse has been of late much improved still that much requires to be done to enforce order and the constant employment of the female paupers, we therefore direct that Mary Anne Glynn a pauper inmate be appointed unpaid boardmistress over the knitting and spinning rooms, & that she be held accountable for all flax, wool and yarn, served out to the workwomen by the Master, and that she be required to keep those two rooms in clean proper order and not to permit other paupers to frequent those Workrooms.

Resolved, — That from the number of children now under instruction in the female Schoolroom, we consider it advisable to appoint two unpaid Workwomen from amongst the pauper inmates to assist the Schoolmistress in keeping the room clean orderly, & attend to the sewing & other work done in the Schoolroom; and we direct that Bridget Farrell & Ellen All be employed as such.

Resolved, That we consider it highly objectionable to have the children of the female Schoolbat all employed in the old clothes store, which from the filth of the sass kept there and the want of ventilation is most dangerous to their health, we therefore direct the Master in future to appoint some one law worthy female pauper to have the charge of that store and to select the bundles for the paupers being discharged.

Ordered, — That the Clerk write a copy of these three resolutions and send them to the Master, — A serious disposition to riot amongst some of the male paupers having manifested itself on the night of Thursday at being searched on coming into the Auxiliary Workhouse which was followed up on Friday the 14<sup>th</sup>, when the琅 leaders were administered by the Vice Guardians, and the porter having reported that he apprehended personal injury & a breach of the peace from Joshua Glynn and others who were armed (as he stated) with a pitchfork & stonehammers determined to commit disorder, and having offered to swear informations of the peace against Glynn, which was prepared for him by one of the Vice Guardians, and for the purpose of swearing which the Porter went to the residence of several Magistrates on last evening, — And having this day entered the Boardroom in a very insulting manner & refused to swear any information, having used abusive language to the Vice Guardians & otherwise having conducted himself in a highly improper manner, — It was resolved to suspend Peter Kelly to the Porter.

from his office until the pleasure of the Commissioners be known. A letter from the Porter being now handed in a copy of which is embodied. Dated— "I beg leave to resign my valuable situation of Porter in this Establishment when it is the pleasure of the Board." It was resolved that having already suspended Peter Whyte from his Office and deeming his conduct <sup>most</sup> most ~~contrary~~ <sup>unconventional</sup> to our rules we refuse to accept of his resignation until the Commissioners are pleased to issue their instructions in reference to the case.

A letter being received from Mr. Forder a pauper inmate applying to be sent out to the American Colonies as an Ensign, it was resolved that as Mr. Forder's conduct whilst in the House has been so orderly and he having discharged the duty of Wardswoman over the Brewery Auxiliary Workhouse with so much fidelity, we consent to transmit him to Canada at the expense of the Union, under the 18<sup>th</sup> Section of the Irish Poor Relief amended Act.

The walls recommended by Mr. Wilkinson to be entered upon for the preservation of the exposed parts of the Building from the weather and for which he recd a sum of £180 on the 15<sup>th</sup> April last, having been commenced. We direct that the wages of such of the Workmen as are employed by the Clerk of Works by "day labor" be paid each week out of Petty Cash when their Bills are approved by the Board.

Relieving Officer, Farn., having reported that he had received several communications & certificates from a Person named Darby Scanlon recommending persons, on the Estate to which it appears he is agent, for Out Door Relief, and that he has subsequently complained that the persons so relieved on his certificates do not being in possession of land, appeared on the Relief List. It was resolved that in future the Relieving Officers shall not place any person on their application Books without visiting the residence of the applicant & making themselves thoroughly acquainted with the circumstances of the Paupers whether they have land or not, as no reliance can be placed on the statements of interested parties.

No communication having been received from the Commissioners in reference to the application of Thomas Somers to be continued in his situation as Relieving Officer for the District of Killulta. We direct that Mr. Jno. Finn the Relieving Officer for Clonkeen shall take charge

of the District of Killulta, until we are able to select a properly qualified person in the district to undertake the duty.

Resolved that Mr. Stanton Out Door Warderman be directed to dispose of all fruit and vegetables growing in the garden of the Auxiliary Workhouse and return the proceeds to the Clerk.

Resolved, that in consequence of Mr. Hayes having brought up the Returns and Books of his department which were in arrear, we dispense with the services of Mr. John Murphy as assistant Clerk from last Wednesday.

At a Meeting of the Vice Guardians held in the Boardroom on Wednesday the 19<sup>th</sup> day of July 1848.

The applications from persons applying for the situation of Wardmaster (8 in number) were then severally considered and the candidates called up and examined, and after a strict enquiry John Flanagan was appointed at a salary of £8. per annum & a suit of clothes.

A letter being received from Mrs. Horan, Head nurse, complaining of the insufficient quantity of meat (only 32 lbs per week allowed her) and stating that she was obliged to procure her dinner for 3 days each week herself. It was resolved that Mrs. Horan's allowance of rations be in all respects the same as the other Officers, namely— 1lb meat per day, 1 pint of Milk & 2 lbs of Bread.

A report from the Master to the following effect being read. "I have to report that there was 145 quarts of the new Milk which was received last week unaccounted for." It was resolved that having repeatedly given directions on the subject of the waste permitted in this article of consumption and feeling that such a deficiency could not have occurred unless from the want of proper attention on the part of the Female officers, — We hereby order that the amount of the

cost of the deficiency be charged to the account of the Nation and assistant nation respectively and that a copy of this resolution be furnished these officers by the Clerk.

The following following necessaries on the Master's application were ordered, viz: — 5 pieces of Throning, 12 bushes for dusting, 1 water tub, 1 beam scale & weights, 14 pieces lining calico for Nations.

The master having reported that the cocoa supplied this week was of a very inferior quality. It was resolved, that the Master write to the Contractor to the effect that the Vice Guardian will order a supply from some other party unless he delivers the article of proper quality.

M. Burke, Post Collector having reported that there was a break of late this morning at Dining occupied by Mr. Johnson the man who has so often applied for rent of his house there, occupied as a soup-kitchen by the late Relief Committee, and as he could not prove any goods on or about the premises to satisfy the demand, he had effected an entrance into an outhouse and had seized on two large Boilers which he had removed to pound, and would sell for the rate. It was ordered, that as these boilers were required in Dungreen and as Johnson refused to deliver them until his rent was paid for 33 weeks, the House was occupied by the Boilers, that W. Read, Relieving Officer be authorized to attend the sale and purchase the Boilers for the Union.
