The Tenders for raising the Idiot Wards and erecting two clothes stores were opened. The tenders only were up to half past 12 o'clock put in, namely Mr. O'Brien from Limerick & Mr. Kiland from Cork. & Mr. Kiland being the lowest was accepted at £150. after the contractor had been declared for nearly an hour, four other tenders were put in and after being endorsed "late" by the Clerk were returned to the parties unopened.

Resolved, That as it is of the utmost consequence to procure in time funds for the Ordinary expenditure of the Union, concurring with the repayment of advances from the Relief Commissioners, where required, we hereby resolve to strike and declare a Rate on each of the Electoral Divisions of this Union, on Saturday the 26<sup>th</sup> Inst.

Ordered, That the several rate collectors be directed to increase their exertions to get in as much as possible of the Arrears during the ensuing week and to close their accounts and return the balance sheet with Arrears &c. on Saturday next, in order that same may be carried forward to the new rate then to be declared.

Ordered, That the Clerk write to Mr. O'Brien the contractor for finishing the new Pools to request that no further time may be allowed to elapse without finishing them.

On visiting the workhouse this morning 28<sup>th</sup> Aug., we were surprised to find that the directions so frequently given by us to Mr. O'Brien the contractor for improving the sewerage of the house had not been attended to, such conduct on the part of any contractor is highly reprehensible the more particularly when, as in the present instance our directions referred to matters connected with the sanitary condition of the house, and hence determined to mark our disapprobation of such dereliction of duty, by resolving that unless the work be immediately proceeded with & perfect'd we must disqualify Mr. O'Brien from becoming for the future contractor for any work to be done on the concurs.
