Master.—I beg to state that from the very considerable accumulation of agricultural and other working implements the erection of a detached or house has become indispensably necessary for their safe preservation having no place in the House where we can stow away such things at present.—The Chimneys of the Workhouse and of the Auxiliary Houses require sweeping very much, but as there are no machines to be had in the town or neighbourhood, I am unable to have them done, except by climbing Boys whom I hesitate to employ, as a late Act has made doing so illegal.—In conformity with reference made to the Medical Officer by the Chairman, to devise a punishment for the nursing Women. He has suggested cropping the hair as the most eligible he can imagine, and the Board's directions as to the carrying out of this are desired.—The experience of every officer in the house, with respect to this class is, that they are harder to manage than any other; Their exceedingly filthy habits, and in many instances cruelly unkind treatment of the children, cannot be sufficiently checked for want of an adequate punishment. I consider that they are even encouraged by the impunity they fancy they have as Nurses.

The General Management of the Workhouse is much improved, but there is much required still to be done to reduce it to perfect order, and discipline. There is more system required at the female side of the House as to the daily employment of the able women, of whose idleness we have had often to complain.— We are also of opinion that it is not admissible longer to permit the Matrons son to have the liberty of residing continually in the House, such a course being directly contrary to the Orders of the Commissioners.— October 9<sup>th</sup> 1848.

Richard Bourke Esq. P.S. Inspector, has entered the following Observations. 5<sup>th</sup> October 1848. viz:—

The general appearance of the House & its inmates is highly satisfactory and the improvement in the management of the Girls School & the Hospital very remarkable. The establishment in all its Branches is assuming a character of order & cleanliness very creditable to all concerned. I have <sup>not</sup> visited the Auxiliary Houses upon this occasion.

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon, as follows:

The Medical Officer.— The state of the Hospital under my charge during the past week does not call on me for any particular remarks. The same forms of Disease namely, Dysentery & Measles alluded to in former report still exist & to the same extent. The epidemic of sore eyes is on the decline and none of the Paupers have suffered permanent injury from it.

The Head Nurse.— I respectfully beg to report.— at present 80% last evening John Murphy went thro' the Hospital with his face blackened. His clothing & voice entirely changed, several persons were very much frightened. The Master.— I beg to report that on yesterday evening immediately after dark there was considerable noise & confusion among the female paupers about the dining hall & the passages. I was obliged to send the Assistant Master to restore order. It was some time before he succeeded in doing so. It appears Mr John Murphy entered the Hospital with his face blackened & wearing some Pauper clothing and proceeded into the male shed, thereby frightening the paupers and causing much disturbance in the wards.

Ordered. That the Master prohibit John Murphy from frequenting the Workhouse in future.

October 14<sup>th</sup> 1848.

On visiting the Workhouse this evening at half past 7 P.M., we were much surprised to find that the female Paupers had not as yet been served with dinner nor was there a sufficient quantity of Bread baked to give to them. We are now confirmed in the opinion that the Matron is not competent to discharge the duty which now devolves upon her, nor does she understand the management of, or pay that attention to the Bake-house department which is indispensably necessary and without which it is hopeless to expect the arrangements we have made for the management of the Workhouse can succeed. We do not wish in any way to injure the Matron's prospects, but we cannot nevertheless permit the affairs of the Workhouse to get into disorder and unless the Matron sends in her resignation before Saturday next, we shall be under the necessity of suspending her from her office.

October 18<sup>th</sup> 1848. We regret to be obliged again today to enter a complaint in consequence of the state of the house stairs & passages. It is evident they are suffered to remain in this filthy state for some purpose, and we see no use in speaking to the Matron further about it.
