Possession of the three plots of ground lying between the new cemetery the lake, and the lands heretofore attached to the Workhouse having been given on the part of the Maq of Clannicoude to Dr Brodie on Friday last, on the understanding that the outgoing tenant should be paid the sum of £11.5.0 the Clerk is directed to draw a cheque for that amount in favor of John Monin.

The occupier of the plot marked D on the map sent to the Comm^r, who holds as tenant at will under the Maq of Clannicoude having asked Dr Brodie £6 for his good will of the holding refer the matter to Mr Dickey the Agent to the property.

Mr Barry having obtained formal possession of the former School House at Monivea with the Offices, Dispensary House and Gardens attached on Saturday last, and stipulated with Mr Evans in the presence of Mr Lynch that the annual rent previously fixed at £55 per annum should commence from the 1st Jan^r now instant and be payable in equal half yearly gales on every 1st July and 1st January during the tenancy, further agreeing that the bargain should be binding on the T. Guardians and their successors for only one year certain, the Clerk to instruct the Solicitor on the sanction of the

Commissioners being received to prepare the necessary legal deeds.

Direct the Clerk of Works to have two boilers lately in use in the Sumpah & Downing District and the spare hot plate in the Workhouse, &c in the kitchen at Monivea in addition to the hot plates already there.

Direct the Master to prepare beds bedding & changes of linen with other necessaries for 200 boys who can be accommodated there pending the completion of the changes and repairs necessary to make the entire premises available. 2^d to select two steady pauper wardens to assist the Schoolmaster in the supervision of the house. 3rd to select from the older female paupers a sufficient number to do the work of the kitchen and laundry there. 4th to provide a cart and barrel to supply the house with water.

The Clerk is directed to advertise for tenders for turf and straw deliverable at Monivea. He is also directed to advertise as usual in the Galway Paper, and locally by handbill for supplies to the 25th March next of the following articles, Oat Meal, Indian Meal Barley Meal, Rye Meal, Bread and Straw. Tenders to be lodged with the Clerk on or before Monday 15th inst which will be considered on Tuesday 16th January. Advertising at same time for a Baker capable of making bread and baking on hot plates or in an oven salary not to exceed £5 a week.

Dr Lynch having this day represented to the T. Guardians that he deemed it of much importance in the present sanitary condition of the Workhouse to employ the able bodied males as much as possible in works which would keep the entire system in action it is resolved to commence the preparation of the lands now exceeding 12 acres for the growth of the different vegetables suitable for the Workhouse purposes with the least possible delay.

It being deemed of essential importance that there should be such a division of labour between the T. Guardians as will best tend to the effective working of the Union affairs it has been arranged with the concurrence of Mr Deane that the duty of superintending this department as well as the general industrial indoor and outdoor occupation of the able bodied should be undertaken by Mr Barry he proposes to lay out at once all the works necessary for the thorough drainage of the grounds, to construct a road round the lands in order to facilitate the carriage of manure, to quarry

stones for a boundary wall, to provide for subsoiling all the land when thorough drained bearing in mind the importance in a sanitary point of view of promoting vegetation about the house as early as practicable. As the improved implements the use of which it is extremely desirable to introduce cannot be procured in country towns. Mr Barry will proceed to Dublin to purchase them and make arrangements for seeds and plants, leaving this on Sunday and returning on Tuesday night. It being desirable to economize space as much as possible in the Workrooms. Mr Barry directed the Wheelwright to make a floor spinning wheel with double spindles at which two women can spin together. If the model be approved of it will be taken at 10/- each. The manufacture of wooden soled shoes in the house being resolved upon. Mr Barry will purchase 20 pairs of soles in Dublin as patterns. The last Matron was called before the Board when the Commissioner's letter No 69329 was read for her in the presence of the Master and Matron, she was severely reprimanded but the Guardians having reason to believe she is steadily improving in her conduct do not deem it necessary to press for further punishment. Her Matron who was acting on trial, having tendered her resignation, her appointment not having been sanctioned, there was no bond, therefore advertising in the General Advertiser and Galway Indic平ator for a Matron at a salary of £30 per Ann, an appointment to be made on Wednesday the 17th instant.

The Relieving Officer at Clonkeen having entered in his Account a lesser quantity than was charged by the Contractor, Ordered that a reduction of 2/- be made in his bill.

Dr Lynch having recommended that the School boys should have some warmer clothing, direct the master to supply each with a flannel belt to go round the body.

The Master has reported that he visited the Bridget Auxiliary Workhouse at 9 p.m. last night and found the unpaid Wardman Dermody, (who was placed in charge during the illness of Mrs. Hayes, the paid Wardwoman, lately appointed) absent, and also the woman employed in the Kitchen. He (the master) went to an adjoining house and there found those parties in a room where a fiddler was playing, the parties were brought before us, we ordered that Dermody should be immediately removed from the Bridget House, and that the Master should lodge informations against the woman, she having assaulted him when he ordered her to be confined in the reformatory cell.

Having failed in procuring possession of the premises opposite the Brewery Auxiliary Workhouse, which we proposed should be used as Dayrooms. And which Miss Mahony agreed to set aside conditionally, on her being able to remove the present occupiers, we have directed the Master to transfer the men who at present occupy Lynch's House & a portion of the Main Building to the Brewery and a portion of the women now located in the Brewery be sent to Lynch's.

The Medical Officer.—Dysentery being still extremely prevalent in the Workhouse and the use of Fish soup having seemed to me to increase rather than diminish the tendency of that disease amongst the paupers, I would respectfully suggest that the use of Fish soup as an article of diet should be discontinued and a soup made according to the accompanying form substituted. —

Ordered.—On the recommendation of the Medical Officer the use of Fish soup as a portion of the dietary was discontinued and a soup made from peas, oatmeal, vegetables and a small portion of meat substituted the cost of Fish soup sufficient for 300 rations, as latterly used was 15/- Pea soup for the same number cost 7/- and is considered more nutritious and conducive to health by the Medical Officer.

Requiring Repayment on account of advances made by Treasury the New Guardians beg to note that there are sufficient funds in the Treasurer's hands to pay the sums required from the Electoral Divisions coming within the regulations specified, but they beg to represent that if the instalments be now paid the funds of the Union will be insufficient for its requirements up to the 25 March next, the Balance now on hand, & the probable collectable portion of the outstanding rate, will barely suffice to meet the liabilities & expenditure to the 25th March next.

Referring to the Commissioners letter N^o 1332. date 19 Jany, the New Guardians beg to note for the information of the Commissioners, that the Tools at present in the Establishment for Adult Male Labourers consist of 99 Pickaxes, 96 Wheelbarrows, 36 Handbarrows, 18 Crowbars, 151 Stone Hammers, 23 Sledges, 2 Pitchforks, 36 Spades, & 30 Shovels. There are 12 acres of land fit for immediate cultivation and the intention was to drain, dig and subsoil the whole by spade labour solely. The only tool purchased as yet are 16 short handled 8 inch Spades, cost £1.12.10. four dozen more at 2/- per dozen less five per cent for Cash, are wanted.

If the boys of 16 & under and the elder schoolboys are to be trained to trench, dig, drill and all other Spade husbandry this number will be wholly insufficient, as yet the land is unprepared for any species of cropping. No other expense whatever has been incurred for this purpose.

Mulligan & Thos. Loughrane, Carpenter to build up the Open Shut in one door & from London frames, they finding Materials for $2\frac{1}{2}$ £, the entire Repairs will be completed for less than the original estimate.

The Schoolmaster, in Charge, having sent for the Revd John Hughes, R.C.C., to administer the rites of the Church to one of the boys believed to be in danger of death & the Revd Gentleman not having attended, Mr. Barry deemed it prudent to wait Dublin when Mr. Hughes said he would be always ready to attend the Sick but that as he lived seven miles from the house he should get timely notice of his spiritual services being required. He is the only Clergyman in the Parish & said he could make no arrangement as to Communion until he consulted his Parish Priest who is at present in Rome & his Bishop. He said the boys could attend the Chapel of Monivis, about half a mile from the house, on Sundays & Holidays for Divine Service, and that he would apportion a particular part of the Building for their accommodation, Mr. Barry directed the Schoolmaster to send before nine o'clock in the morning forth the Revd Gentleman whenever he may be wanted, except in extremely urgent cases.
