Resolved, That in the present Condition of the Union it would  
not be advisable to strike a heavier rate than 3<sup>d</sup> in the £ against  
any One Electoral Division, The Vice guardians have come to this  
Conclusion because the present rate has borne very heavily against  
some of the poorest Divisions, and to place another heavy rate  
against those Divisions whilst a large amount of the present rate  
is outstanding would render it very difficult for the Collectors to realize  
both the new rate and the arrears, and the Vice guardians further  
consider that in those Divisions which do not require a 3<sup>d</sup> rate for the  
expenditure & liabilities up to the 25<sup>th</sup> March next it would not be  
expedient to levy upon them a higher rate than 3<sup>d</sup> for that  
expenditure, and the repayment of the Treasury advances, in consequence  
of the large extent of land which has been thrown into pasturage  
and the great facility thereby afforded for collecting rates during the  
Spring and Summer Months. Acting upon this Opinion, the Vice  
guardians now agree to strike a rate of 3<sup>d</sup> in the £ against the  
Several Electoral Divisions of the Union with the exception of  
Kilchreest & Kilconneraw, 2<sup>d</sup> in the £ will suffice for the former and  
2<sup>d</sup> in the £ for the latter.
