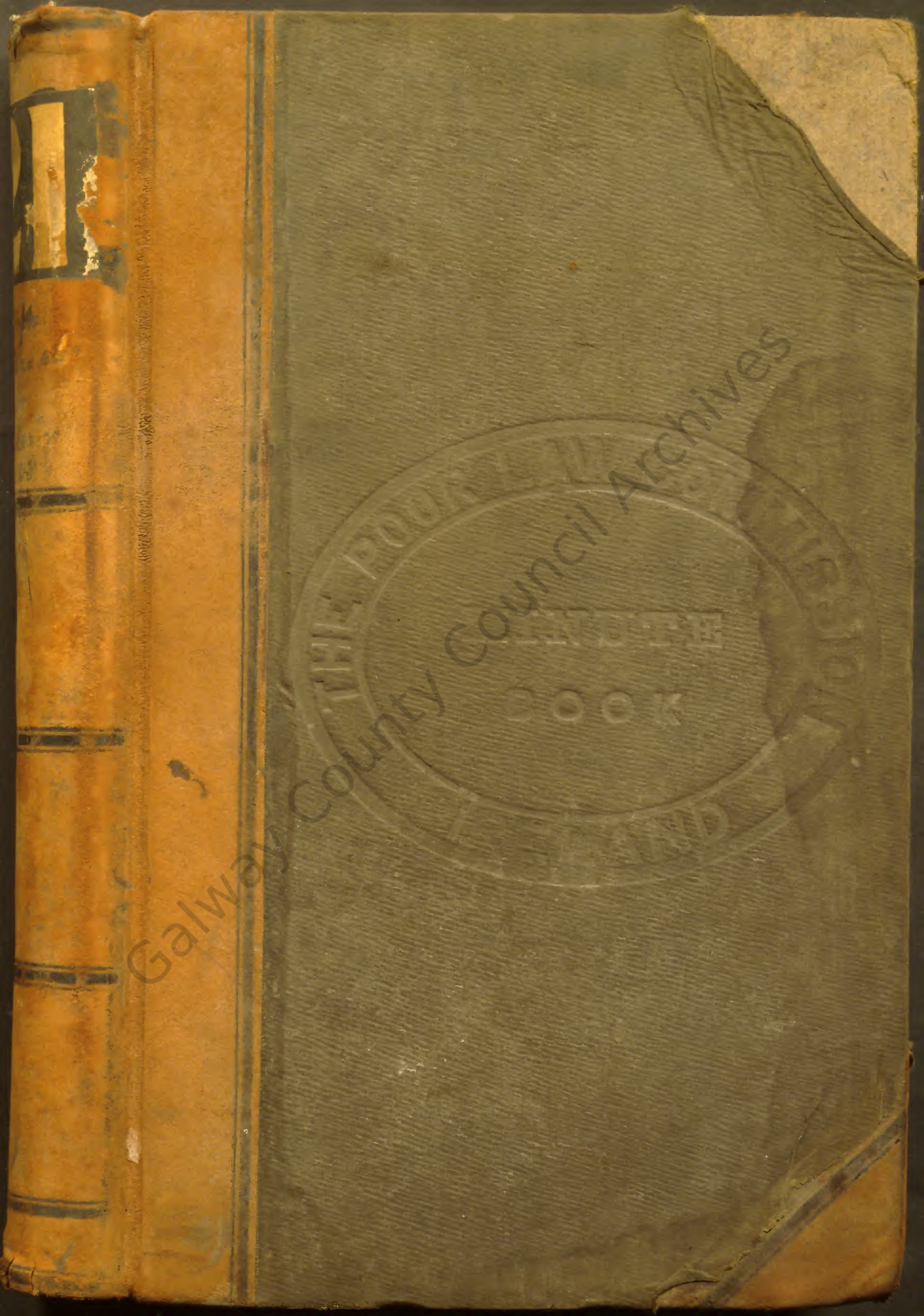

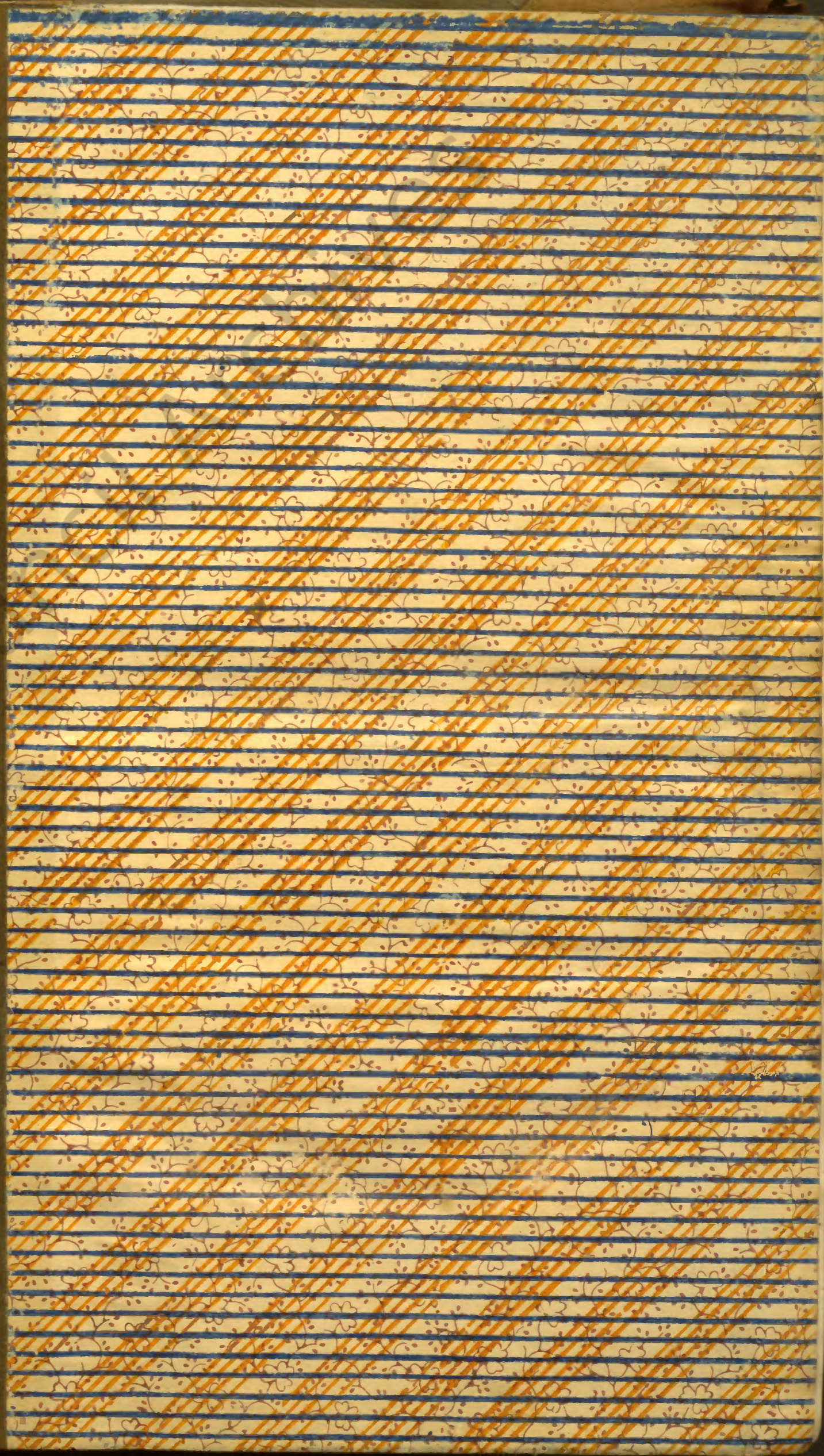
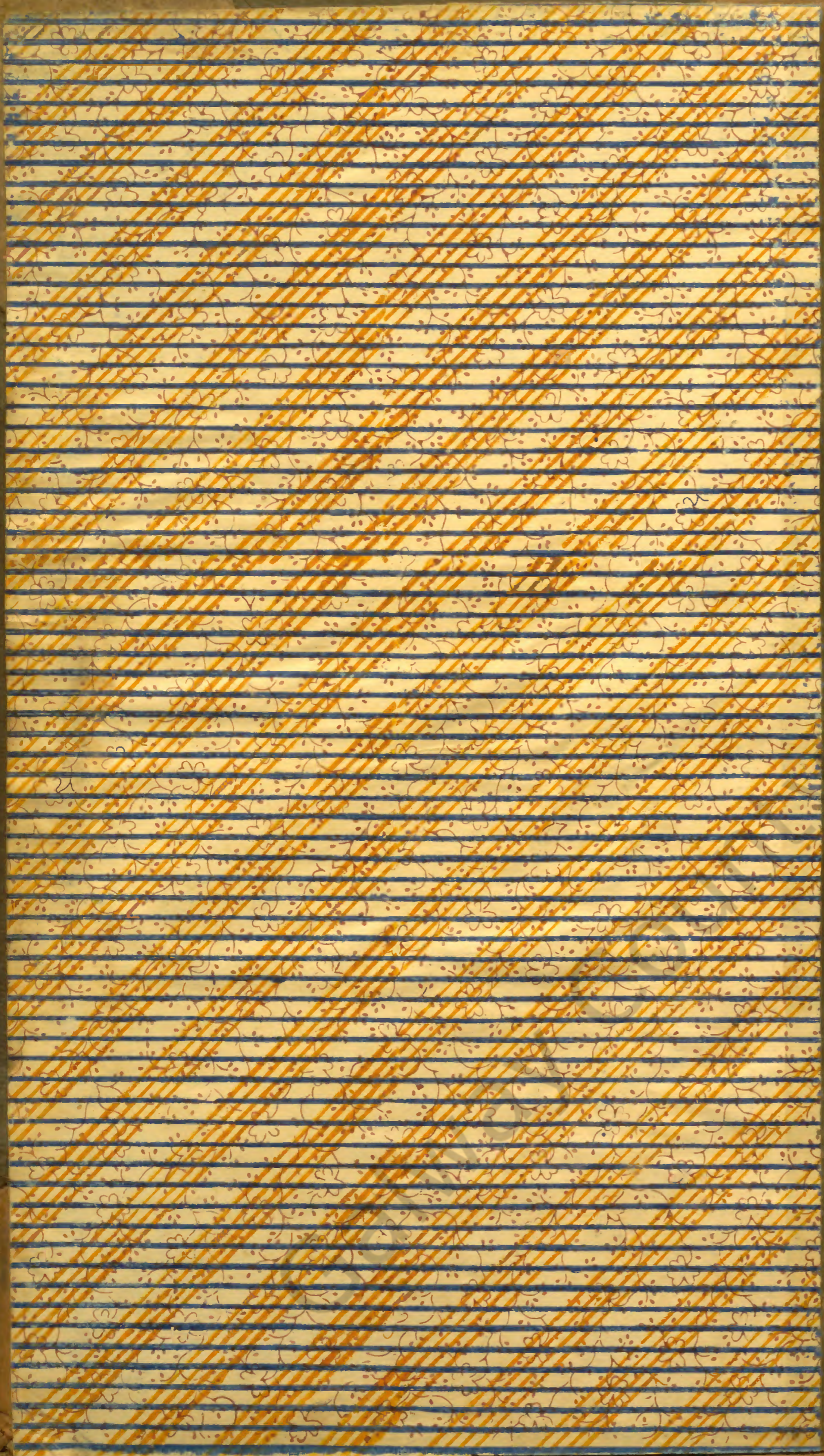

Calling attention to the backward state of the collection altho' the period allowed the collector was then nearly expired, and recommending the guardians to urge the collector to a more active discharge of their duty

The Clerk stated that he had already written to the collector informing him of the Commissioners observations and requesting a speedy close of their collection

Letter N<sup>o</sup> 15723 dated 16<sup>th</sup> June

Informing the guardians that Dr Brodie poor Law Inspector in his report of his periodical inspection describes the infirmary yards, male side, to be in a very unsatisfactory state also the yard walls the coping of which require repairs - the clothing of the female children appeared ragged and dirty and it seems necessary that the special attention of the Guardians and Schoolmistress should be drawn to it

The Commissioners suggest that in case straw cannot readily be procured, cocoa fibre be used as a substitute

The Master's attention was called to Dr Brodie's observations on the state of the infirmary yards - it was stated that the uncleanness of the girls clothing was owing to their being then engaged in assisting to spread manure on the farms, and were draped in some old clothing that their new and clean clothing might not be soiled

Advertisements were issued inviting tenders, on this day for outstrow and for the repairing of the yard wall, but no tenders were received, and the Clerk was directed to ascertain the price for which cocoa nut fibre can be obtained from some of the Public houses and to re-advertise for the repairs of the yard wall

Letter from the Commissioners of Education intimating that premiums of £2 had been awarded to the Master and £1 to the schoolmaster for their agricultural training of the boys

The tender of Walter Shanker to supply one half of the muck for twelve months from the 29<sup>th</sup> inst, and Sarah Redige the one fourth for a like period at 5<sup>th</sup> of fallow, was accepted

Patrick Kelly's tender to supply 60 boxes of turf @ 9<sup>th</sup> of box and Michael Mann's tender to supply 70 boxes @ 8<sup>th</sup> of box was accepted

The guardians approved of Frank Flaherty's proposal to take the grass field opposite the Workhouse gate until the first of November next @ a rent of £1.5.0

Patrick Verry having tendered to cement the ridge tiles, &c for a sum of £4 the guardians directed that unless he accept £3, the work be re-advertised for
