In compliance with the directions of the Board in reference to the Commissioners' letter requesting I may be called on to state in writing the cause of the agricultural class not being still in existence, I beg to refer to the reports of the Inspector of the Education Commissioners, in which the agricultural department of this school has been removed from their list, and it will be seen therefore that the cause of such having been done was entirely beyond my control. I may here state that at no period within the last three months has the number of boys of the class between 9 and 15 years amounted to more than 13, the average for such period being only ten, and the indispensable condition of the Inspector required that a class of at least 12 boys should be kept up who would not only be able to understand the practical instructions given them, but to read intelligibly so as to study and comprehend the theory laid down in the Commissioners' agricultural class-book, and with the numbers available I need not say such was impossible. I may add that the practical training of the boys has never been neglected by me, and with what effect, both as regards the Reports of the Master and other Officers read, and Orders made thereon, as follows:

The Guardians having entered upon the consideration of the resolutions of the Committee of Management of the Athenry Dispensary District inserted on minutes of the 18th Decr set "That the salary of the Medical attendant Dr. Egan be increased from £70 to £90 of annum," and having had having referred to their minutes of 20th September 1854 when the Medical District of the Union underwent a change by which an additional district was created to which was added the distant portions of the Athenry district, and one of its deputy abolished, and while the duties of the Medical Officer were thus considerably diminished the salary was at the same time increased from £65 to £70 of annum

The Guardians therefore do not think they would now be justified in complying with the suggestions contained in the resolution of the Athenry Committee to increase Dr. Egan's salary having upon the occasion referred to, made what appeared to them a fair and satisfactory arrangement of the districts as well as the salaries of the Medical Officer
