Potatoes should be added to the soup in the proportion of one stone of potatoes for every eight persons, the soup as at present made contains very little fresh vegetable ingredients, in the next place Dr. Lynch advises the substitution of equal parts of Indian and oat meal for Rye and barley meal in making the brown bread, the prolonged use of rye as an article of diet being inadvisable.

The Mayten Report

Two women named Ellen Staunton and Margaret Murray who were admitted on the 18th inst. the one to the women's day room and the other being a prostitute to the refractory ward which is a ward in the women's hospital set apart as such, attempted to set fire to the hospital on the 19th inst. Ellen Staunton tho' a blind woman having taken a coal of fire from the nursery with the pretended object of putting a fire in the day room, carried it into the prison in the women's yard and passed it through the iron bar separating the two prisons to Margaret Murray who was failed in her attempt to do harm by my having immediately discovered it in her possession, — On the following day Margaret Murray forcibly entered a sick ward in the hospital and took away fire with a like intent which however I immediately discovered and removed, — in addition to these acts they expressed their intention of setting the hospital on fire.

In order to assist the Board in arriving at the cause of this wickedness I may state that it was found necessary some short time since by consent of the Board to separate the inmates of the refractory

The Report of the Board and the Officers and Orders made thereon, as follows

Ward in consequence of their repeated quarrels amongst themselves, for which one of them was committed to goal and owing to the padlocks securing the windows of the ward being found broken and it being reported that some of them escaped from the house by that means and went into town by night, and their separation had the effect of inducing all of them to take their discharge, Margaret Murray was consequently the only occupant of the refractory ward at the time of the attempted incendiarism, except a woman since admitted who had no share in the previous quarrels, and Margaret Murray appears to have been aided by Ellen Staunton who is a violent and wicked character they being both natives of the town of Athenry and for some time associated in their movements, being admitted together on the 3rd 4th 11th 16th and 18th and discharged on the 4th 5th 12th 17th & 21st instants, — They have been prosecuted at petty Sessions and returned for trial at the Quarter Sessions of Loughrea on the 30th inst.

On Thursday last Ellen Sully one of the prostitutes of the town assailed Ellen Sully one of the pauper wretches returning from the Court House using threats to her if she prosecuted the parties for the fire and pelted her with stones up to the Workhouse gate, I hope the Board will be kind enough to allow summonses to issue in this case as it would otherwise be dangerous for the parties to prosecute.

I beg to remark for the information of the Board

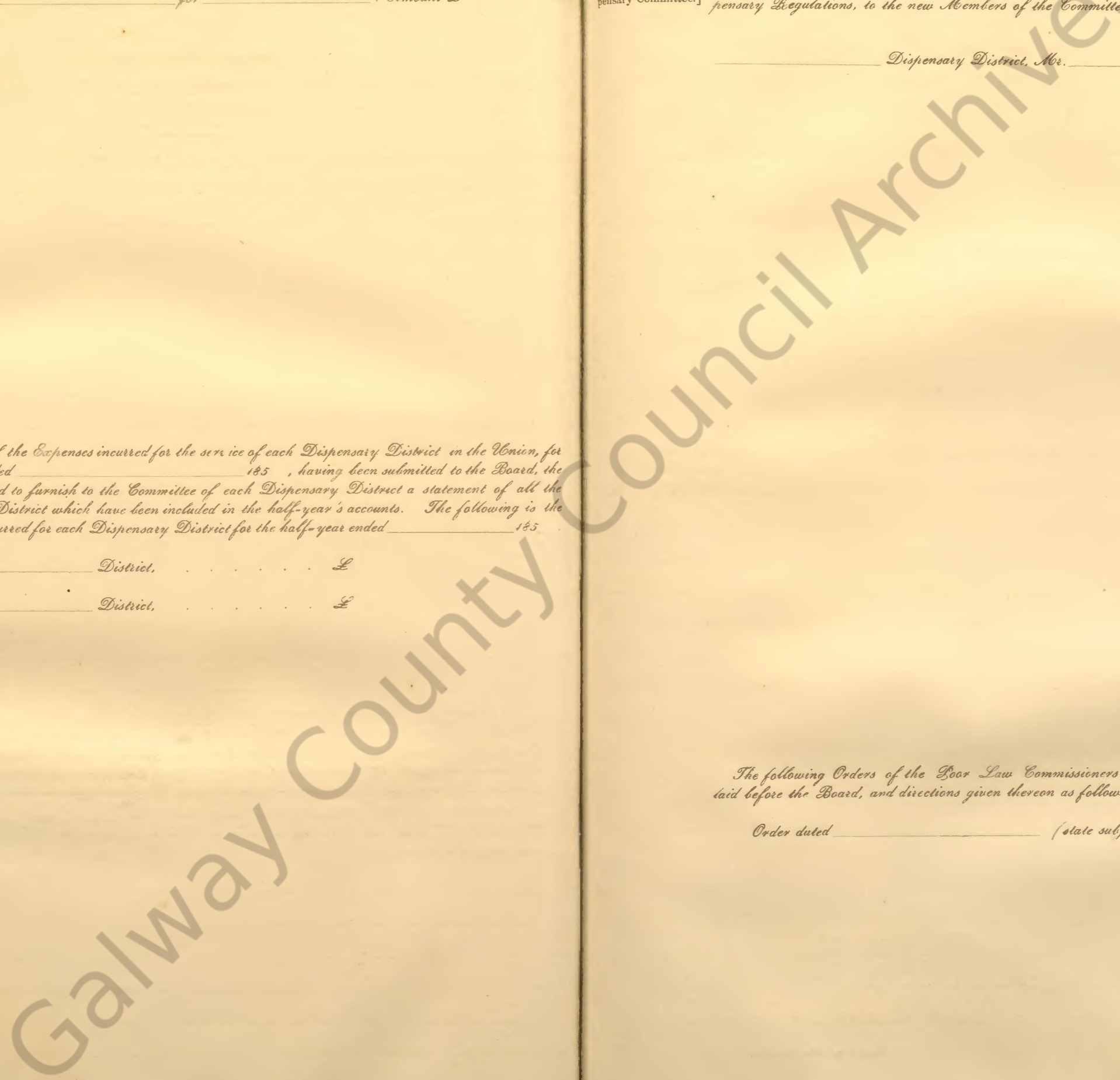
