On Minutes of last day being read and before the Chairman attached his signature, the Master objected to the accuracy of the Minute as regards the statement of his offer to pay for the deficit found in the Wine store, which he denied having made

The Clerk having stated that such a proposal was distinctly made by the Master on the occasion of the Guardians having visited the store and found the stock deficient, and no member of the Board who was present at the last meeting being this day present, the Chairman signed the book adding after his signature but Master objects to accuracy of Minute as regards statement concerning payment for wine

An entry by the Clerk on the face of the Provision Account was read as follows 5³/₄ of Indian Meal since last week's account and 2¹/₂ of oatmeal in the above account are overcharged and still unaccounted for, the particulars of the supply of milk by the Contractors are not stated this or last week

The Master was directed to give credit in his current account for weekly overcharged, and to insert the required particulars of Contractors supply of milk

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon as follows:

The Master reported that the repairs to the roofing of the house are urgently required — The men, infirm ward needs some repairing

An inmate having furiously assaulted another and taken his discharge has been summoned to appear at next Petty Sessions
Straw is much needed for bedding, as is also turf to light the coal fires etc.

The Clerk was directed to procure tenders for the execution of the repairs to the roofing as also a supply of straw & turf, the services of a Carpenter was ordered for one day to execute the repairs necessary in the men, infirm ward

The Master's punishment book contains entries of two offences, since last meeting, of violent assaults having been committed by inmates upon other paupers

In the case of one a remark appears in the book that "This woman had her discharge taken on the 10th inst. Summons are issued for her appearance next Petty Sessions." — The entry was marked approved of but the Guardians thought the practice of appealing to the Petty Sessions Court for the punishment of offences against discipline, committed in this house, notwithstanding the powers placed in the hands of the Master and the more extensive powers possessed by the Guardians themselves, to inflict punishments for offences committed in the Workhouse, to be very objectionable
They therefore ordered that for the future the Master shall submit all cases of offences in the Workhouse which he may deem beyond his power to deal with for the consideration of the Board before instituting any criminal proceedings —

The Provision Receipt and Consumption accounts for the weeks ended 14th & 21st June are not certified by me in consequence of a statement of deliveries of Coal received from the Contractor Mr Martin Sinnans giving particulars of Coal supplied together with the dates of delivery to the latter date which I have compared with the entries of deliveries in the Porter's book and find to correspond as to dates, the Weekly receipts shown by the Provision account do not however agree with these deliveries, the quantities being understated in the latter account by one ton in each of the two weeks ended 17th & 24th May and overstated by three tons in the week ended 14th June, and the gross quantity shown by the Provision account as received from Mr Sinnans and debited to the Union (18 tons) being on the 21st June (as well as on the 14th) one ton in excess of the quantity appearing as supplied by the Contractor's statement (17 tons)

5th & 6th oatmeal and 5th of Indian meal have been overcharged in the Consumption side of the Provision account for week ended 21st June but I have made the necessary deductions and alterations in the calculations so as to correct that portion of the account

The Guardians compared the entries in the Provision account with the Contractor's statement and found the discrepancies reported by the Clerk to exist in the Provision account and as the Master was unable to give any satisfactory explanation of the cause of their existence and admitted that he had not carried out the order given him in October last "to see all coal intended for delivery at the Workhouse first weighed at the public Scales and then to accompany same to the Workhouse" but received the coal from the carrier without any docket denoting the weight at time of delivery, and as no correct register of these deliveries appeared to have been kept by the Master, the Guardians could not approve of his explanation

They directed that the ton of coal overcharged in the Provision account shall be deducted from the total of the next weekly supply



Referring to recent inquiry into facts connected with alleged irregularities in the accounts of the Workhouse Master, the proceedings of the inquiry were arranged under three headings, first as to the errors of calculation by which it appears that various small errors were detected by the Clerk in the Master's Provision account for the three first weeks of May and the items altered by him in red ink but these alterations had not been embodied by him in the totals, but suffered to remain as before and become portions of the Union accounts, neither had they been reported to the Board.

The Commissioners think the Master was blameable for making these miscalculations, but the Clerk is done so in allowing their continuance without correction or report.

The next subject of inquiry refers to the consumption of coal, the Commission observe the Master has stated on oath that the consumption took place in due proportion throughout the various departments of the Workhouse and according to his statement the Clerk's calculations were erroneous, and his inferences fallacious.

The last portion refers to the deficiency in the Wine store amounting to about six bottles in a stock of ninety six, to this the Master had no explanation to offer and could only suggest probable causes, for it such as that each bottle did not contain the quantity with which he was debited, or that there may be a loss in decanting the Wine in small measures.

The Commissioners state that a loss of six bottles or thereabouts has taken place for which the Master has not as yet given any sufficient explanation - if the Guardians consider the Master appropriated the Wine to his own use or allowed it to be taken by others he is in the Commissioners opinion unworthy of further confidence but if they think the deficiency occurred through his carelessness only, a different view may be taken of his conduct.

The Commissioners finally allude to the existence of personal differences between the Clerk and Master such a state of things must be embarrassing to the Guardians and prejudicial to the administration of the affairs of the Union and they suggest that both these officers be cautioned that unless they cooperate their services must be dispensed with.

The Guardians learned from the Medical Officers that the distribution of the Wine in small quantities is made by the Hospital Steward to whom the issue of the days supply is made in one quantity by the Master, when such daily supply exceeds five measures a bottle being given in lieu of five measures and therefore if a loss occurs in that way a great portion of it falls on the patients and not on the Master's store, they had from the store some of the empty bottles as well as an unopened bottle of Wine which they measured and found to be slightly deficient of the full quantity of five measures.

They were therefore of opinion that the Master was entitled to some allowance but from the cause stated they did not find him discharged from all responsibility as to the deficiency and they accordingly directed that the Master make good three bottles of the missing wine.

The Commissioners letter was read by the Clerk in presence of the Master and the sentiments of the Commissioners regarding their personal differences was imperceptible on both by the Chairman.

Resolved, that on occasions of future inquiries being held by the Commissioners Inspector, they be requested to cause sufficient previous notice to be given of the day of holding the inquiry to enable the Guardians to be summoned to attend the same.

Letter N^o 74460 dated 4th July

Referring to recent inspection of the Workhouse made by their Inspector Mr. Spence who states he has no reason for being dissatisfied with its general management but that one of the patients in Hospital complained of the insufficiency of the fire in their ward, which he thought was not sufficient on the day he visited, some other inmates among whom was a blind girl complained of inability to eat the brown bread which it appears is the general diet in the Workhouse and Mr. Spence states he considers this description of food not to be satisfactory as the main article of Workhouse diet the bread being represented as of Indian meal and to be dry & hard and when used in conjunction with Indian meal stirabout for breakfast calculated to render the diet too unvaried to be conducive to health.

Mr South also alludes to the present state of the Workhouse school to the desirability of having an infant class formed and plain needle work taught and of providing school requisites which the Commission understand have been suggested by the District Inspector of Schools - the point of the external wood and iron work of the Workhouse should be renewed

Referring thereto the Guardians beg to state that the material of which the bread is made is not accurately described the bread being of equal parts of oat and Indian Meal and having a portion of the bread before them which they tasted they are of opinion it is a sweet and wholesome food and being used with oatmeal soup at dinner made in the proportion of nine pints of soup to each lb of oatmeal, nearly double the quantity prescribed by No 1 of Commissioners rules Article 13 and seasoned with such vegetables as are from time to time available and to which is added on three days of each week an ounce to every eight gallons of soup, the Guardians think that no change is necessary in the existing dietary - the blind girl referred to is one of the most healthy as well as the most industrious of the Workhouse inmates

The Provision Check covering this quantity being made out on the 17th I had actually debited myself with 10 tons from the commencement being the actual quantity delivered to that date whereas the ton supplied on the 16th being one of the three accounted for by the Station should not be taken into the Provision receipt and Consumption account until the week ending 31st on the week ending 21st however
The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read and Orders made thereon as follows

I had charged myself with three tons, the actual quantity delivered to my own knowledge on the 16th, 17th and 21st but the ton delivered on the 16th appears to be accounted for by the Station in the three tons of 14th June

My usual course at the close of a contract of this sort being to check all the receipts, I had on the 27th June procured the Weigh Masters docket and intended to compare same with Porter's book with my own account when I should myself discover this error of the Station, and either state same to the Board or correct it in the Provision Check of the 28th but on that day the Clerk reported the matter and thus forestalled the possibility of an innocent act on my part being explained and regulated by myself to the Board - In conclusion I beg to call the Guardians attention to the whole facts as purely consistent with my innocence and such as any man may inadvertently commit, knowing as I did that I had still the power in my own hands of saving myself and the Guardians from the payment of a penny in error

The error of 5th cwt of Oat and Indian meal is a clerical one of usual occurrence perhaps in all unions and one generally corrected on the following week when checked and discovered by the Master or Clerk and was committed on making out the percentage of increase of weight acquired by meal in being converted into bread

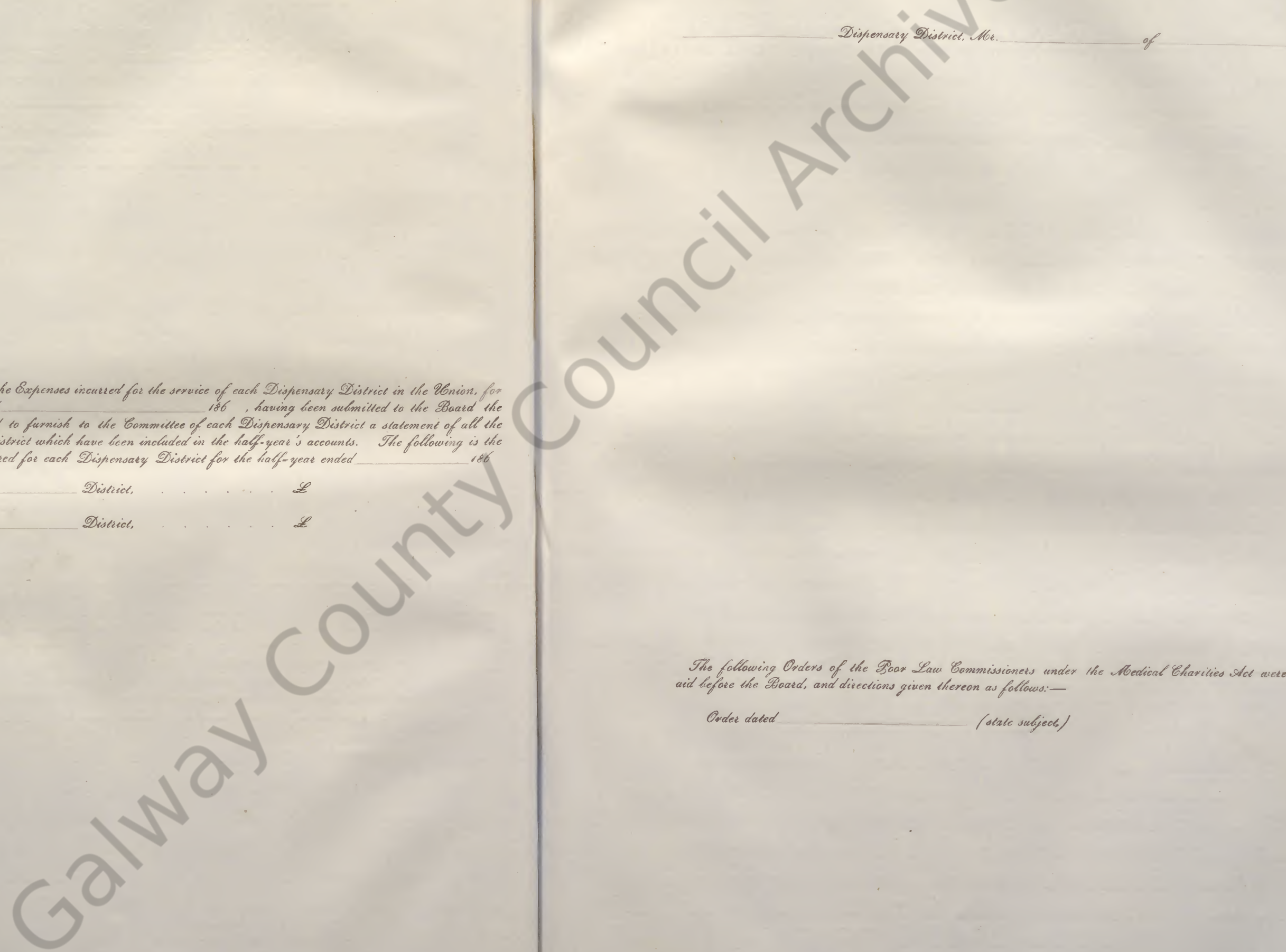

But the quantity handed over by the late Master was 2¹/₄^l.




Mr. James Flucke pursuant to notice moved and Mr. John Slade seconded that the salaries of all the Dispensary doctors be raised from £70 to £90 in as much as that after deducting the actual expense of keeping a horse and home rent which are indispensable the Medical attendant only receives the paltry sum of about £22 for his own services, a remuneration unprecedented in any other Union in this County even the poorest

Amendment proposed by Mr. John Slade & seconded by Mr. John Slade

That on the occasion of the re-arrangement of the Dispensary Districts of the Union the Board of Guardians bestowed great pains and consideration on the question of the Medical Officers salaries which were then increased by the Guardians to meet the Commissioners views, that these salaries have been since further considerably increased by the introduction of the Vaccination Act entitling Medical Officers to fees on successful cases of vaccination, that their respective districts present good opportunities for private practice which their public appointments serve rather to increase than otherwise interfere with, and that this Board having regard to the wisdom and justice of existing arrangements are of opinion they should not be disturbed

The Amendment having been put and the Guardians dividing there voted for the amendment 11 against it 8

The original motion being then put and a poll requested by Mr. Flucke the vote appeared for the motion 8, against it 11

The motion was declared lost, and the amendment carried by a majority of three

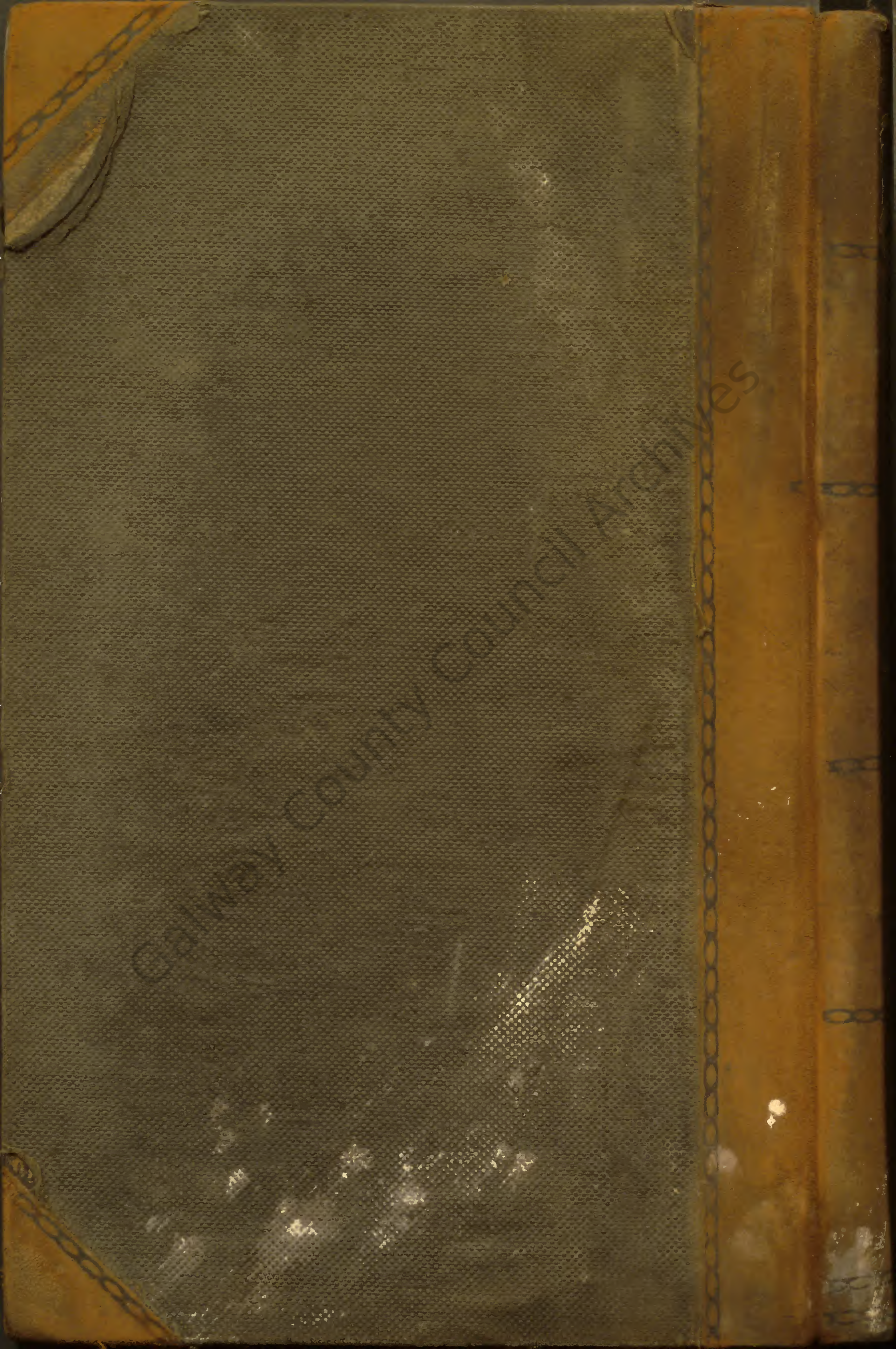
