Mr. Burke Pore Saw Inspector visited and inspected the house on Saturday last, the services of a mason are required for a few days to reset some of the gables, also of a carpenter to put up slips on the windows to prevent leakage

The quality of the mill altho' not appearing sufficiently bad to be rejected has been complained of by the Medical Officer as of a poor quality, he suggests that the Mill Contractors be required to send up their axes to be drilled at the Workhouse - the Contractor, however object to this course and I merely mention the matter at the Medical Officer's suggestion

The Master was directed to have the necessary mason or Carpenter work done, the wardens made no order on the Medical Officer's suggestion but directed the Master to be careful as to the quality of the mill he takes from the Contractor

Mr. Scoble calls attention to the amount of duty devolved upon the Matron by giving her charge

of the school together with her other duties which he describes is more than she can be expected to perform efficiently and the Commissioners suggest for the Guardians consideration the appointment of a schoolmistress in accordance with article 25 of general regulations

The Guardians observe with satisfaction that the condition of the house has been generally approved of but they were entirely unprepared for the Commissioners recommendation regarding the appointment of a schoolmistress which the present circumstances of the house by no means require, they may remark that Mr. Scoble while bringing the matter under the notice of the Commissioners himself bears testimony to the progress of the children in the school the most convincing proof that can be offered of due

attention being paid them, - as regards the attention required in teaching seeing the Guardians observe that of the children at present in attendance in school only two girls appear to be above nine years of age and that four between five and nine, all these can be fully & suitably employed under the Matrons immediate superintendance and referring to the extent of the Matrons other duties and their continuous claims upon her time the Guardians are decidedly of opinion that with so small a number of inmates as are generally in this house they are so comparatively light as easily to admit of her attention to the school with equal and full advantage to both departments, and their experience of existing arrangements fully satisfies them that such is practically true,

The Guardians having already after full consideration expressed their decided opinion as to the Claims of the Medical Officers to increased remuneration cannot observe in the statement put forward by these officers any reasons whatever for leading them to different conclusions which they again submit for the Commissioners consideration by reference to their resolution adopted on 24th ult. The Guardians however while firmly entertaining these opinions would be willing solely in deference to the views of the Commissioners to make some concession to the Dispensary Medical Men of the Union and accordingly propose an increase of £10 in the Annual salary of each which they hope the Comrs. acting in the same spirit will deem sufficient and thus dispose finally of the matter

The Commissioners apprehensions as to the school being impracticably of the school being properly attended to by the person filling the office of Matron is in the Guardians opinion fully disposed of by the fact of the school being found in a progressive state as well as the general arrangements of the house satisfactory after ^{a fair} and sufficient trial of the existing arrangements - Referring to the number of boys and girls in attendance in the school, the Guardians observe that 18 of these children are under 5 years of age and that only 13 boys and 6 girls exceed 5 years, and having learned from the Matron that the number of hours devoted to teaching is the same as heretofore, after which the boys can be usefully employed on the farm in charge of the Matron, while the other children, more infants, are taken charge of during the remainder of the day by pauper nurses, and exercised as often as necessary on the extensive grounds in connexion with the Workhouse, the Guardians must continue to think that the appointment which the Commissioners suggest, is unnecessary

As regards the reference to the numbers at present in the house, the Guardians may remark that the present time of year has been usually heretofore found to be the period at which the numbers relieved in the Workhouse reach their highest point and may be expected to decrease rapidly immediately on the opening of the Spring work when of course the numbers in the school will also diminish including amongst the earliest discharges, those children, male and female, whose ages render them most capable of deriving advantage from school instruction

The Guardians, having been summoned pursuant to the Commissioners request contained in their letter N^o 44874 of date 27th ultimo to further consider their recommendation regarding the appointment of Schoolmistress this day proceeded to give the subject their fullest consideration, and regret they are still compelled to dissent from the Commissioners views as to the advisability of such an appointment

Having already on two previous occasions entered fully into the reasons by which they were actuated in arriving at such conclusion they have only now to refer the Commissioners to their resolutions of the 14th & 21st ultimo which they submit fully justify them in declining to make an appointment which they deem unnecessary

The Commissioners in their last letter on the subject having urged the youth of a large proportion of the children in the school and the fact of their remaining for a great part of the day in charge of pauper Nurses, as a more pressing reason why the appointment should be made, the Guardians must observe that under no circumstances are they aware that it has ever been held necessary that a teacher should remain in constant attendance on the children after the lessons of the day have concluded, - a reasonable supervision of the care they receive is all that is required and such is in no way incompatible with the statutory duties, the young children ^{in this house} have always hitherto been subject to such supervision been taken charge of after school hours by suitable persons and no injury that the

Guardians are aware of has ever resulted to or is likely to befall them

Their experience of the duties of the office of Master and Schoolmistress has long convinced the Board of Guardians that in the ordinary circumstances of this house the requirements of both departments can be efficiently and satisfactorily fulfilled by one officer and the opportunities they have already had of testing the practicability of this arrangement serve but to confirm the correctness of their judgment

Being at all times ready cheerfully to give effect to the Commissioners regulations and to listen on their suggestions their best consideration whenever a difference of opinion may arise as to their due fulfilment, the Guardians of this Union shall not hesitate to give expression to their views founded as in this instance they conceive them to be on sound principles of practical experience and to impress them upon the Commissioners as entitled to their best attention

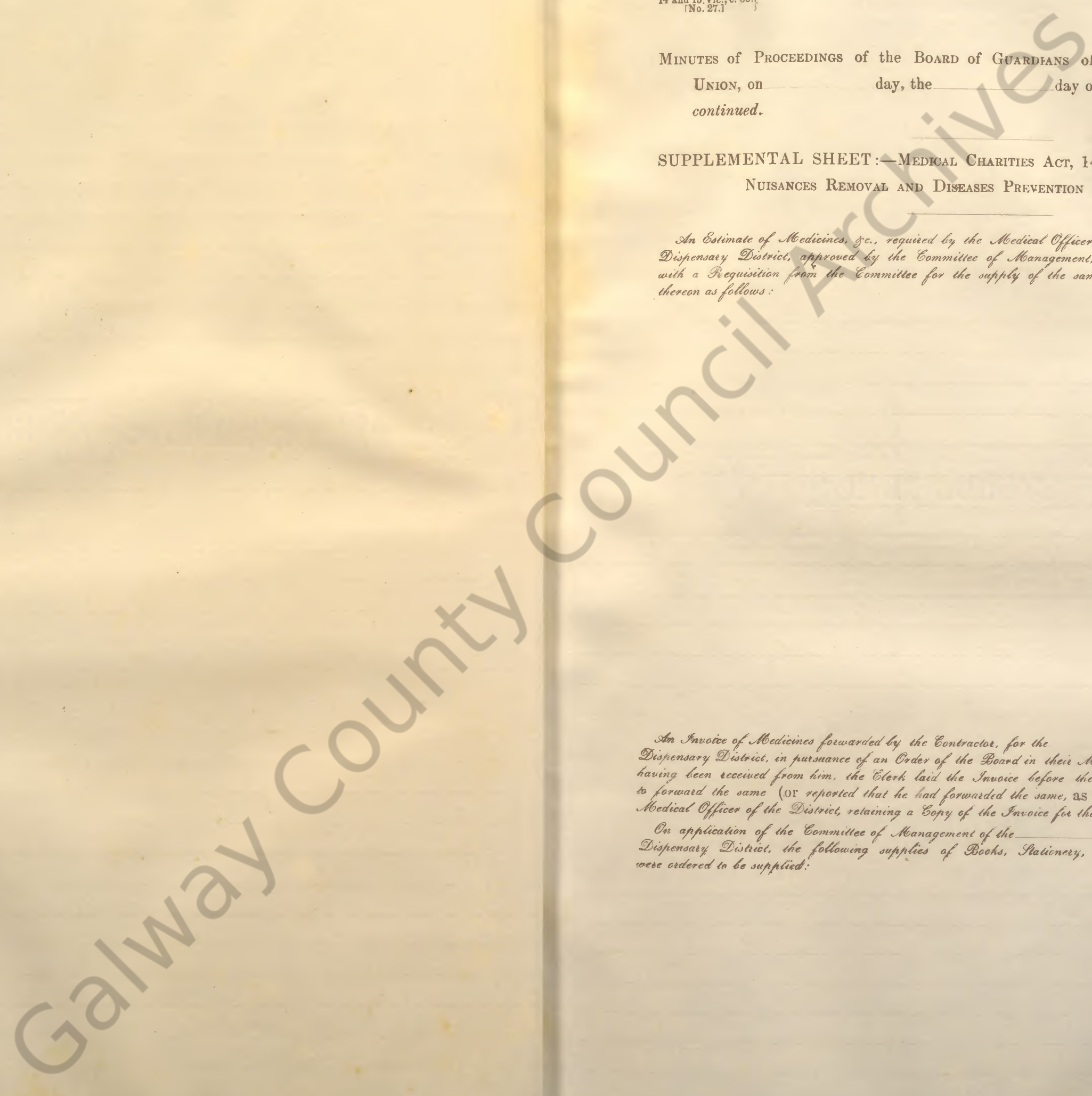

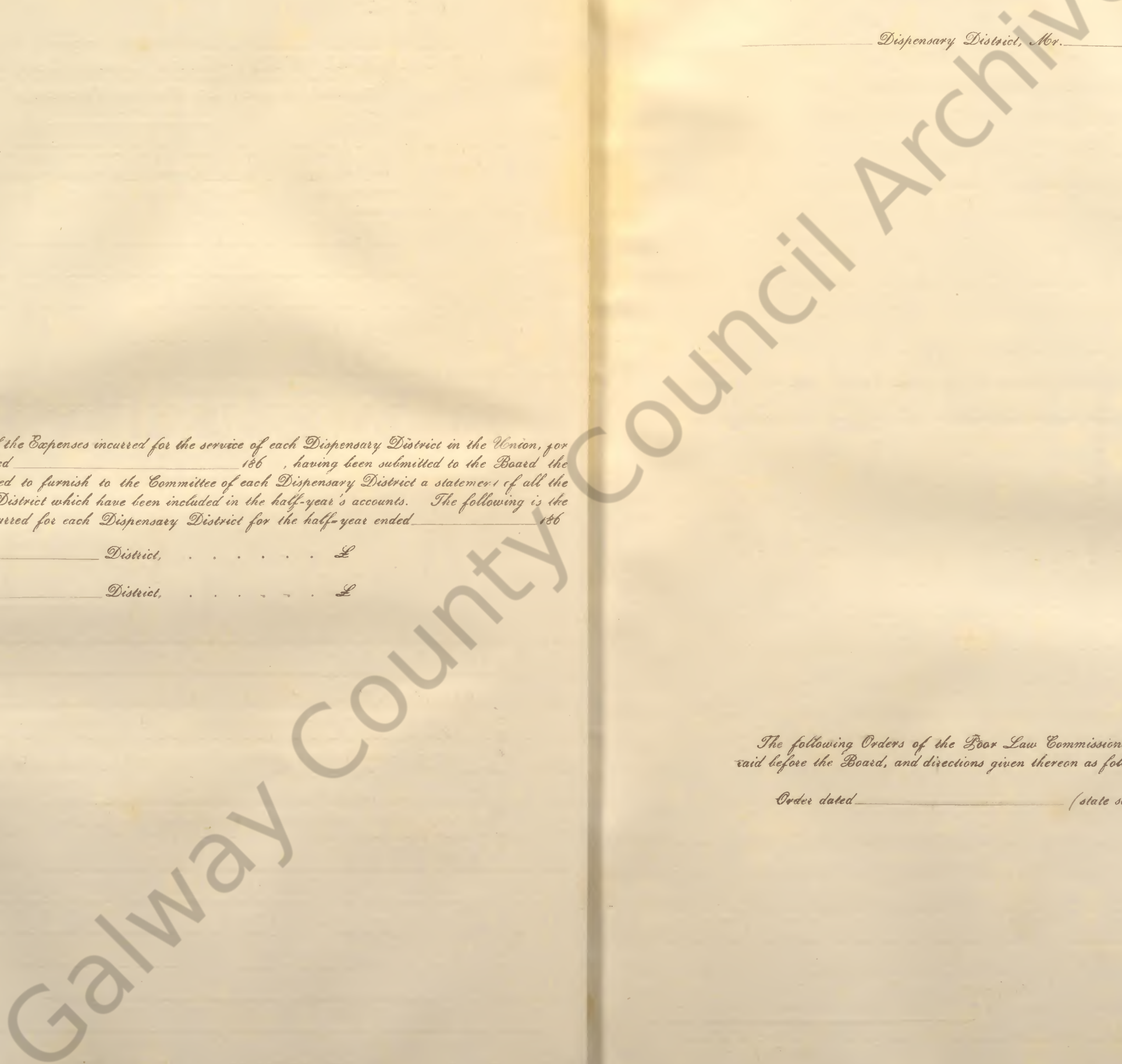

They find the number of children in the School on the 10th April, the date of the Commissioners' letter to have been including infants 33 instead of 49 as stated by the Commissioners, the number above 9 years of age being but 6 boys and 1 girl and between five and nine 7 boys and 3 girls, and they still maintain that a school attended by so small a number of children, many of whom are too young to be susceptible of arrangement in school studies, could have been sufficiently attended to by the Matron without interference with the proper discharge of her other duties, they cannot recognize as correct the principle advanced by the Commissioners that a permanent appointment of Schoolmistress is necessary to provide for the temporary absence from duty of the Matron which has never once taken place since the offices were combined, and must be whenever it may occur of very brief duration and which could be then fully provided for

Having given expression to their views regarding the inexpediency of the course adopted by the Commissioners they will not longer refuse to make the appointment referred to but they must remonstrate against the salary fixed by the Commissioners which is in excess of that for several years previously paid the Schoolmistress of this Workhouse, and they accordingly propose the salary of the Schoolmistress to be in future £12 of annum with apartments and rations as heretofore, when the Commissioners shall have ratified their approval of this arrangement the Guardians will take the necessary steps towards electing a Schoolmistress

As the Matron is now about to be relieved of the duties of attending to the School the Guardians will at their meeting on this day fortnight propose the fixing of the Matron's salary at the original amount at which it stood previous to the amalgamation of the offices of Matron and Schoolmistress viz £20 of annum with apartments and rations

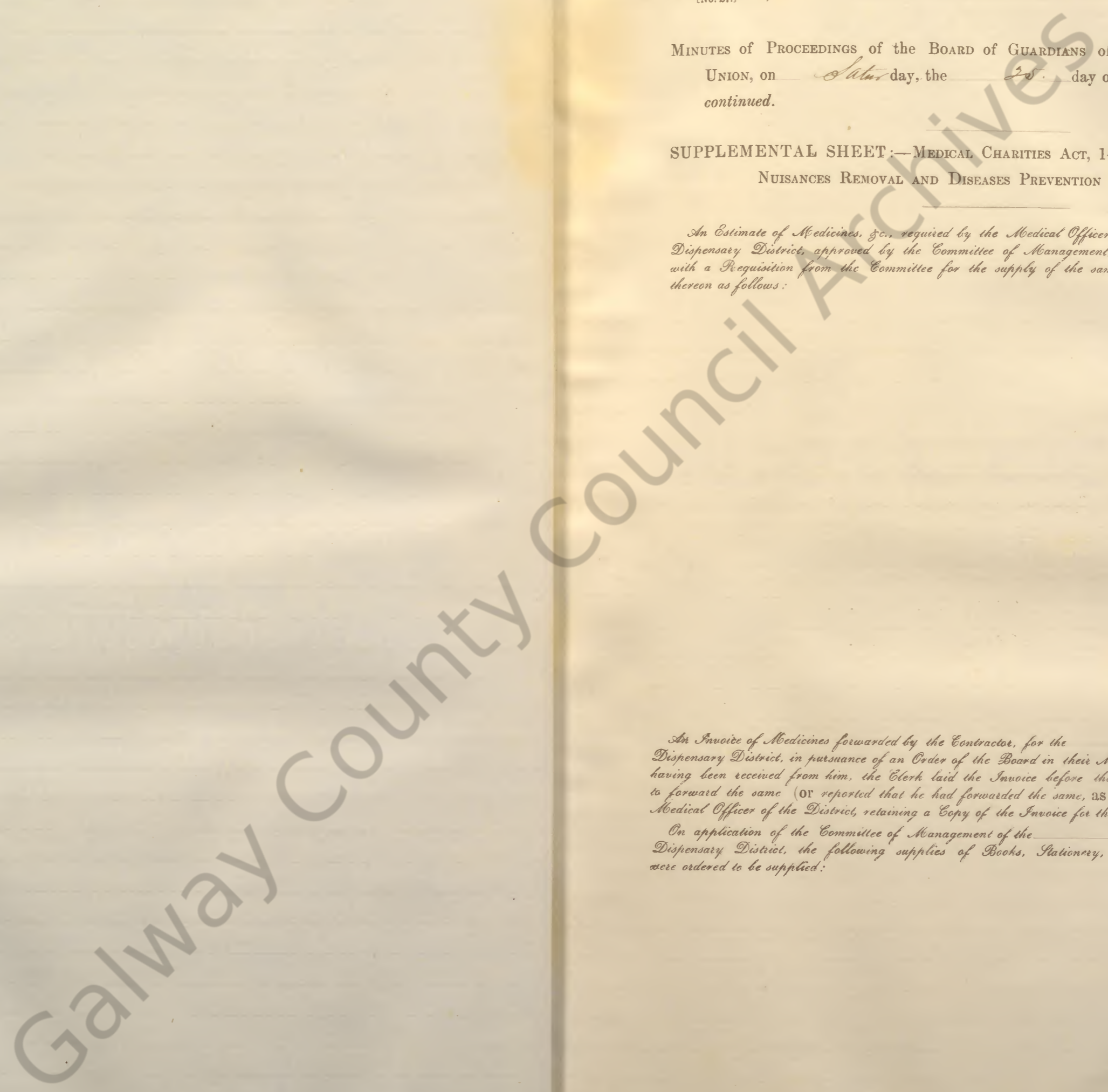

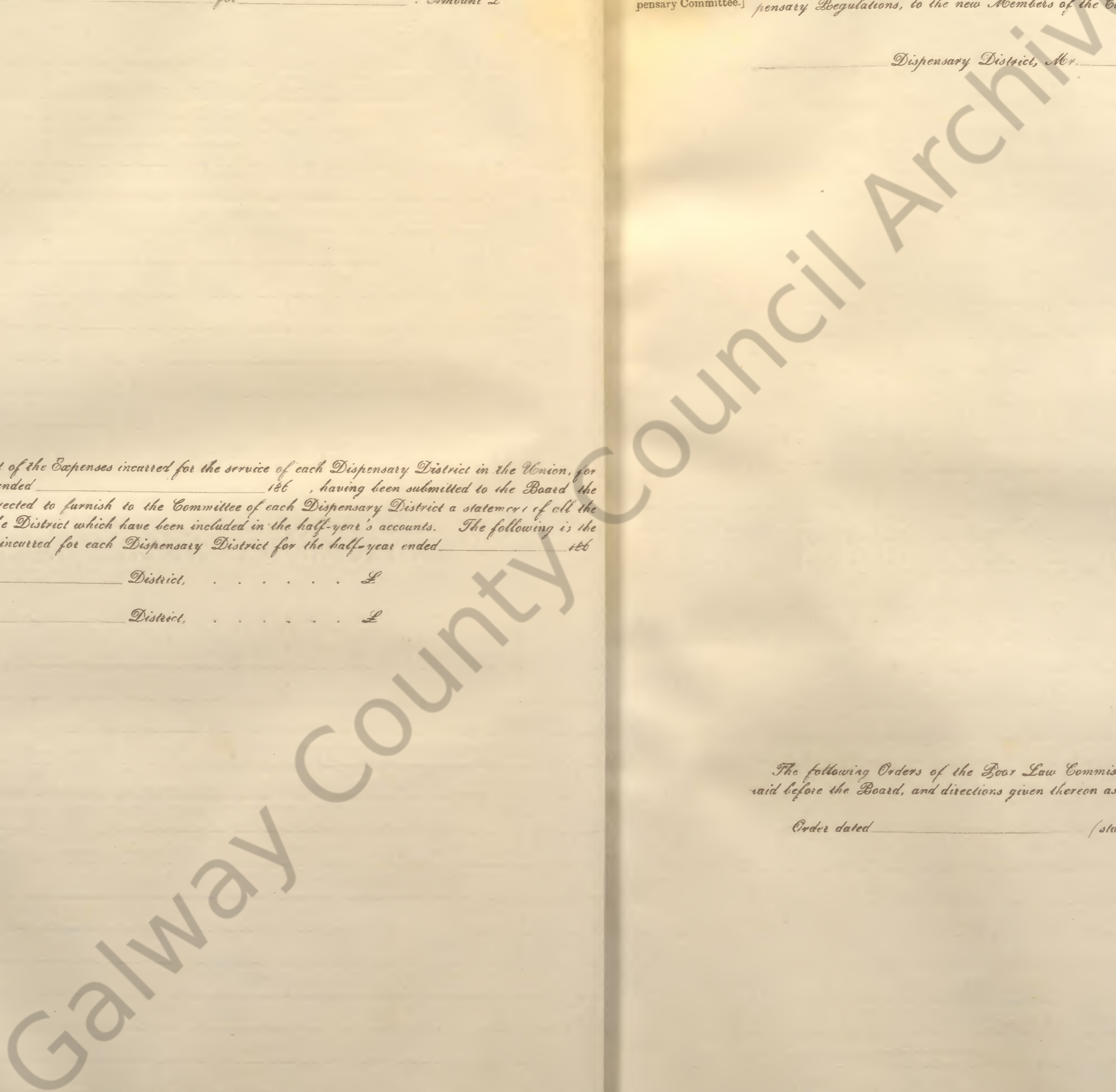

John Delany arrived on the 28th inst. Accompanied by an officer of the Stepney Union who delivered him at the Workhouse.

The particulars required by the Commissioners letter of 16th Nov^r 1861 so far as they can be gathered from the pauper are forwarded in an accompanying document.

Delany having been before the Board the Guardians ascertain from his statement as well as from that of the Police Officers of the Woodford district that this boy was born and lived in the townland of Gorteeney which is in the Portman and not in the Stepney Union.

The Guardians desire to direct the Commissioners particular attention to this fact as by the issue of the Warrant in question the Authorities of Stepney Union have caused to be conveyed to this Workhouse a pauper who appears to be idiotic and helpless and who thus becomes chargeable upon the rates of this Union altho' having no claim thereon by birth or otherwise, and the Guardians request the Commissioners will be good enough to inform them whether under the existing state of the law any redress is open to them, or whether by this improper act of the Stepney Guardians the rates of this Union are to become burdened with the maintenance of a man illegally conveyed here by a body who should be responsible for the consequences. A Committee consisting of Messrs J. J. Stenhouse, Robert Gentle and Benjamin Taylor was appointed to meet on Wednesday and report upon the number of cases of women with illegitimate children at present in the house, whose putative fathers may be made amenable for their support.

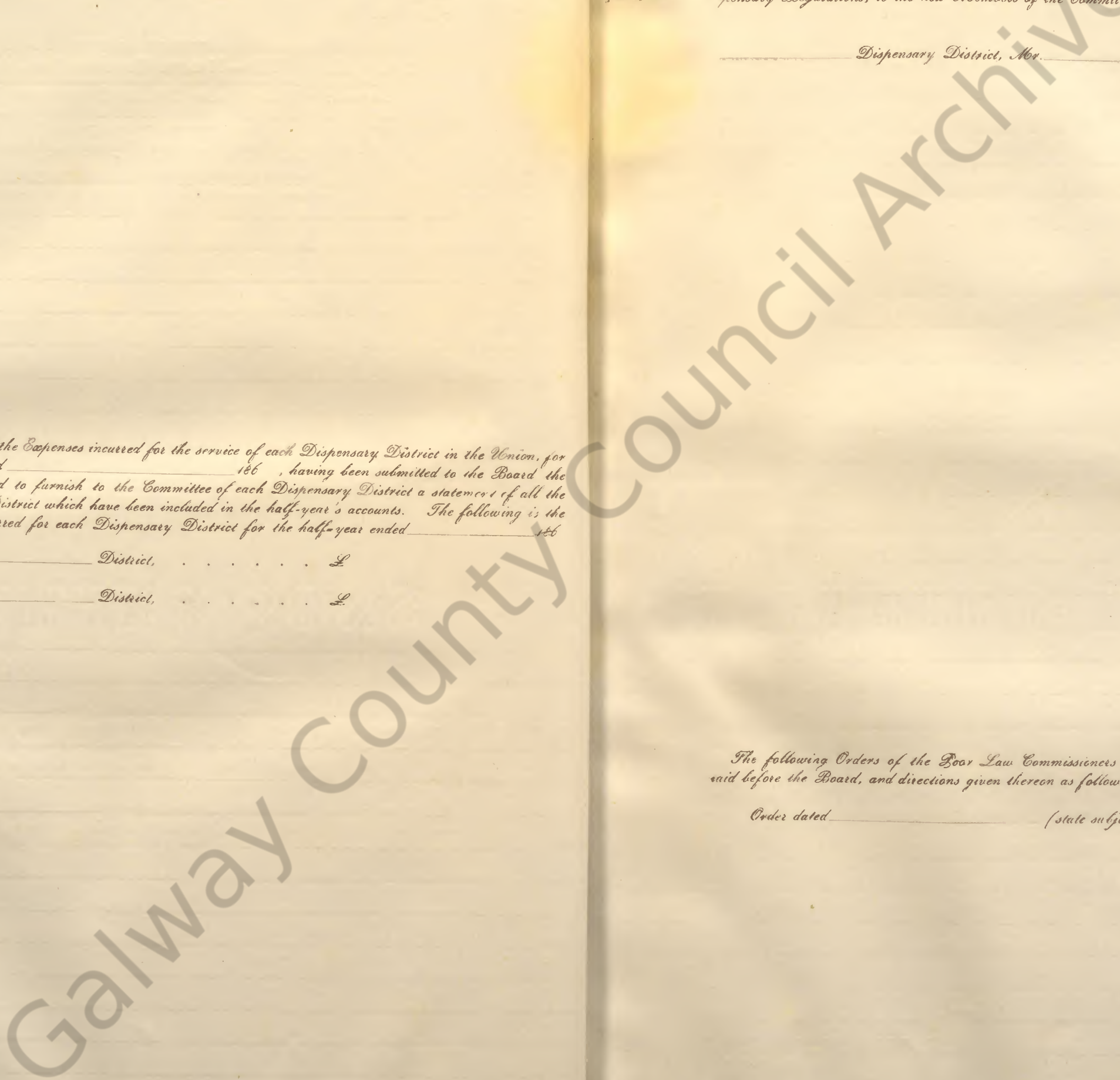
