She left the House on the 14th Inst, taking the children (aged respectively $3\frac{3}{4}$ & 1 year) at the same time with her; it appears that she deserted them on Thursday last, and left them in a house in Loughrea, the owner of which brought them to the Workhouse.

The Guardians wish to be informed whether their chargeability should be to the Ballinacorney Division in accordance with the proviso to the 1st Section of the late Amended Poor Law Act - twelve months not having elapsed since they last ceased to receive relief or must the case now be considered according to the children's own previous residence, in as much as that they have been admitted, without the person legally liable to maintain them.

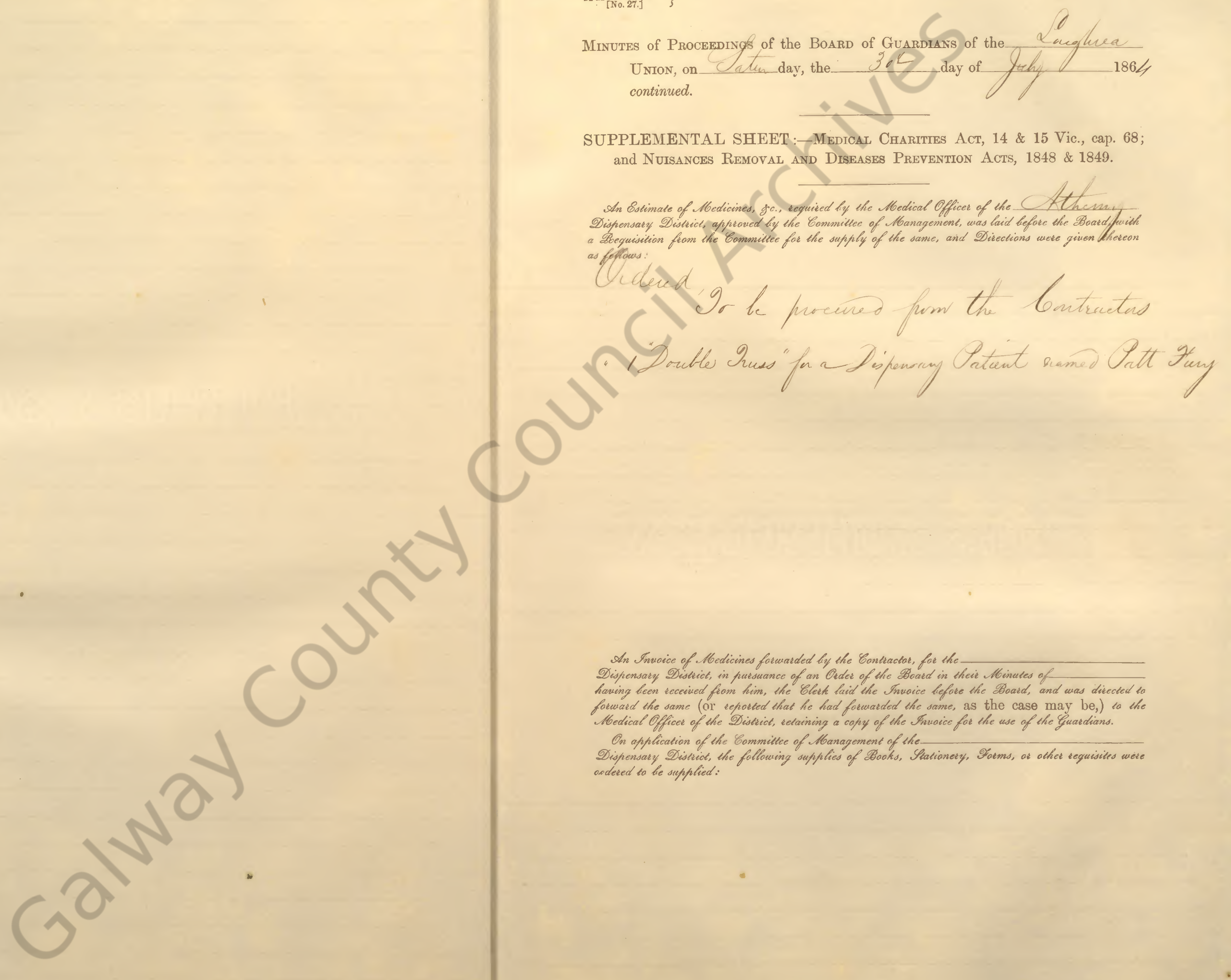

on the Workhouse School - The course of instruction is rather limited, none of the Pupils being in a higher Class than Second. The proficiency of the several Classes is fair, with the exception of the lower draft of First Class, which is rather below the standard.

I am of opinion that the School has improved since last inspection, but not so much as I anticipated. I believe that this is in some measure due to the fact of some near relatives of the teacher having died in the interval. These afflictions prevented her discharging her duties as efficiently as she would wish.

I beg to recommend that the attention of the Guardians be called to existing deficiencies in the supply of apparatus and books, viz: that there is no Black Board, that the clock is now and has been for a long time useless, that there is no Arithmetic or ball frame, for imparting the elementary ideas of numbers to the younger pupils that the Reading Tablets are so much torn, as to be unavailable for teaching, and that all the second Books in the School are more or less mutilated, no fresh supply having been received for a long time.

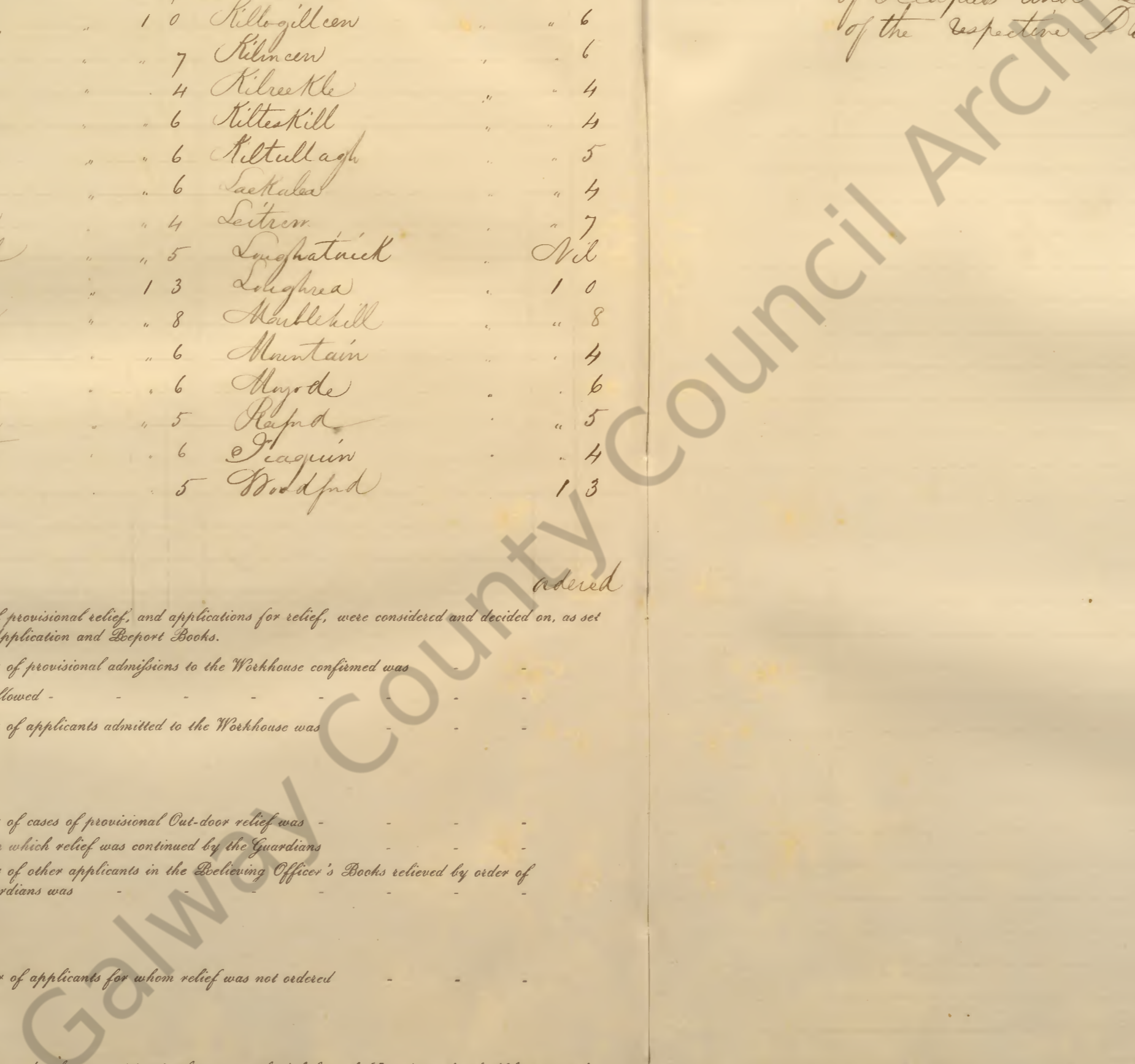

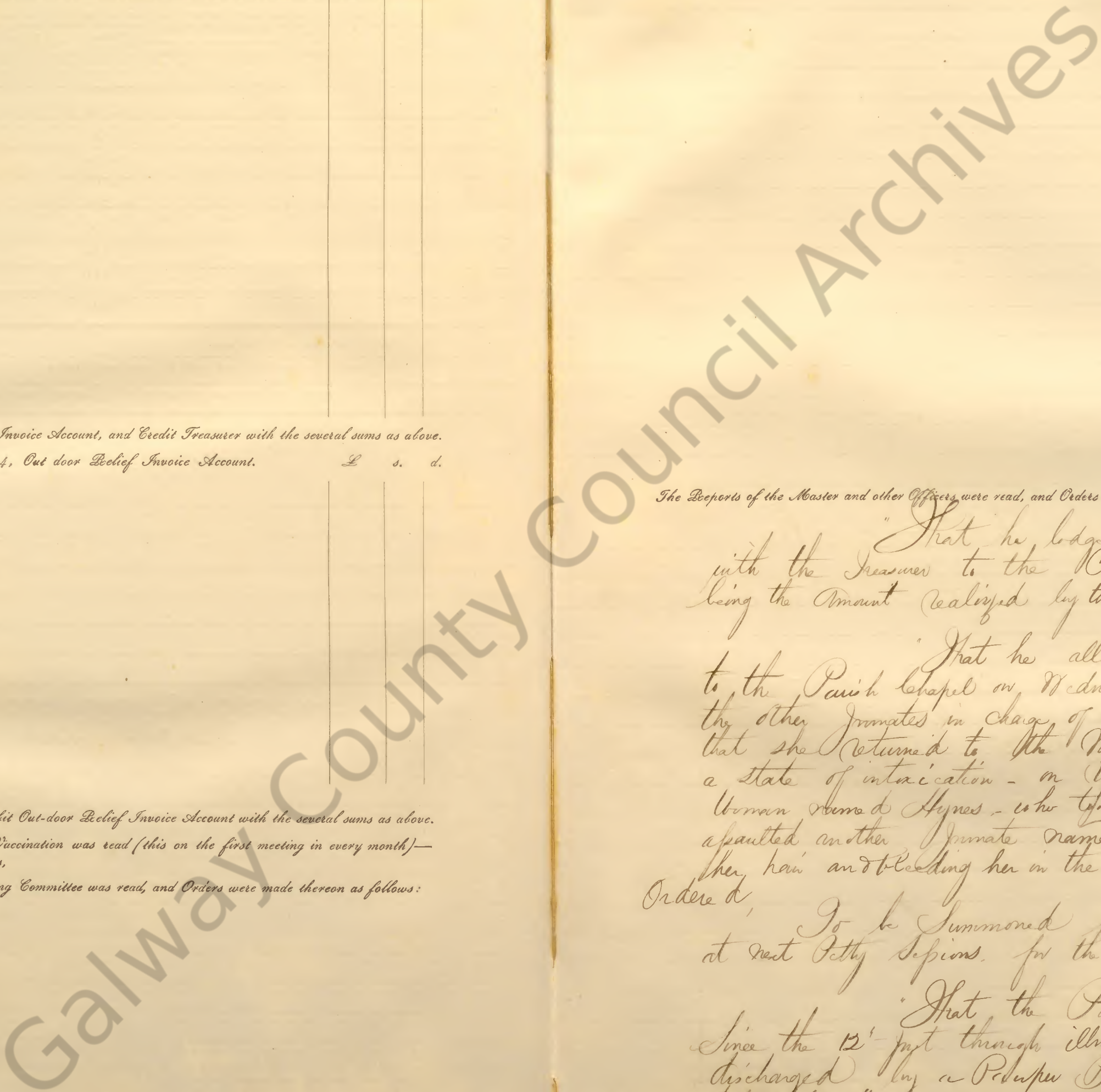

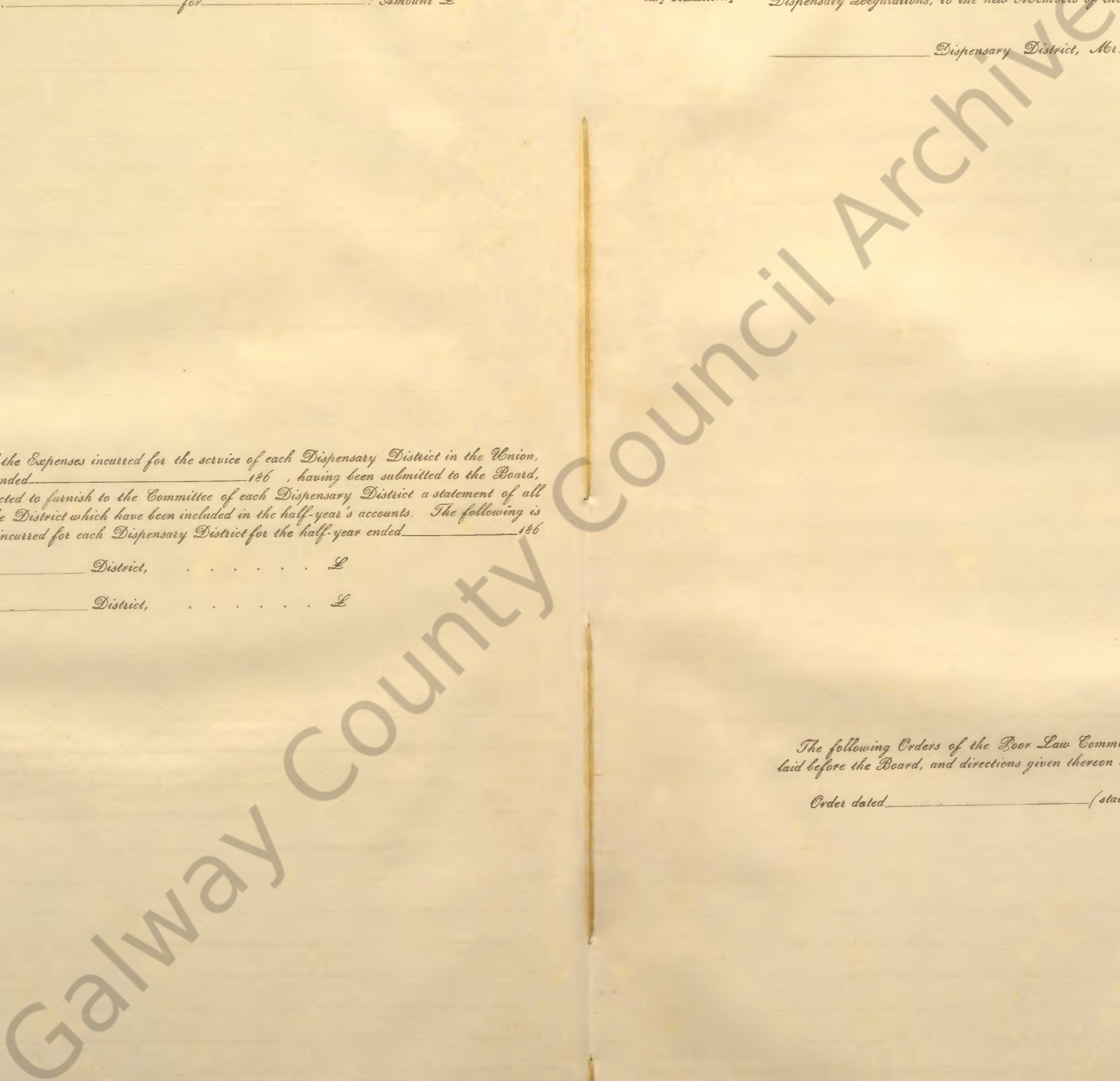
