Letter from the Secretaries to the Commissioners of National Education dated 20th October 1864 forwarding the following extracts from the District Inspector's Report on the Workhouse School.

The course of instruction is fair - proficiency in arithmetic unsatisfactory, in other Subjects fair.

The School is progressing moderately. The classification of the children is in nearly every case as high as their ages would warrant, with the exception of their proficiency, generally speaking was up to the standard laid down for their respective classes.

The Contractor for painting having applied for payment of the balance due him on account of his Contract. It was Ordered,

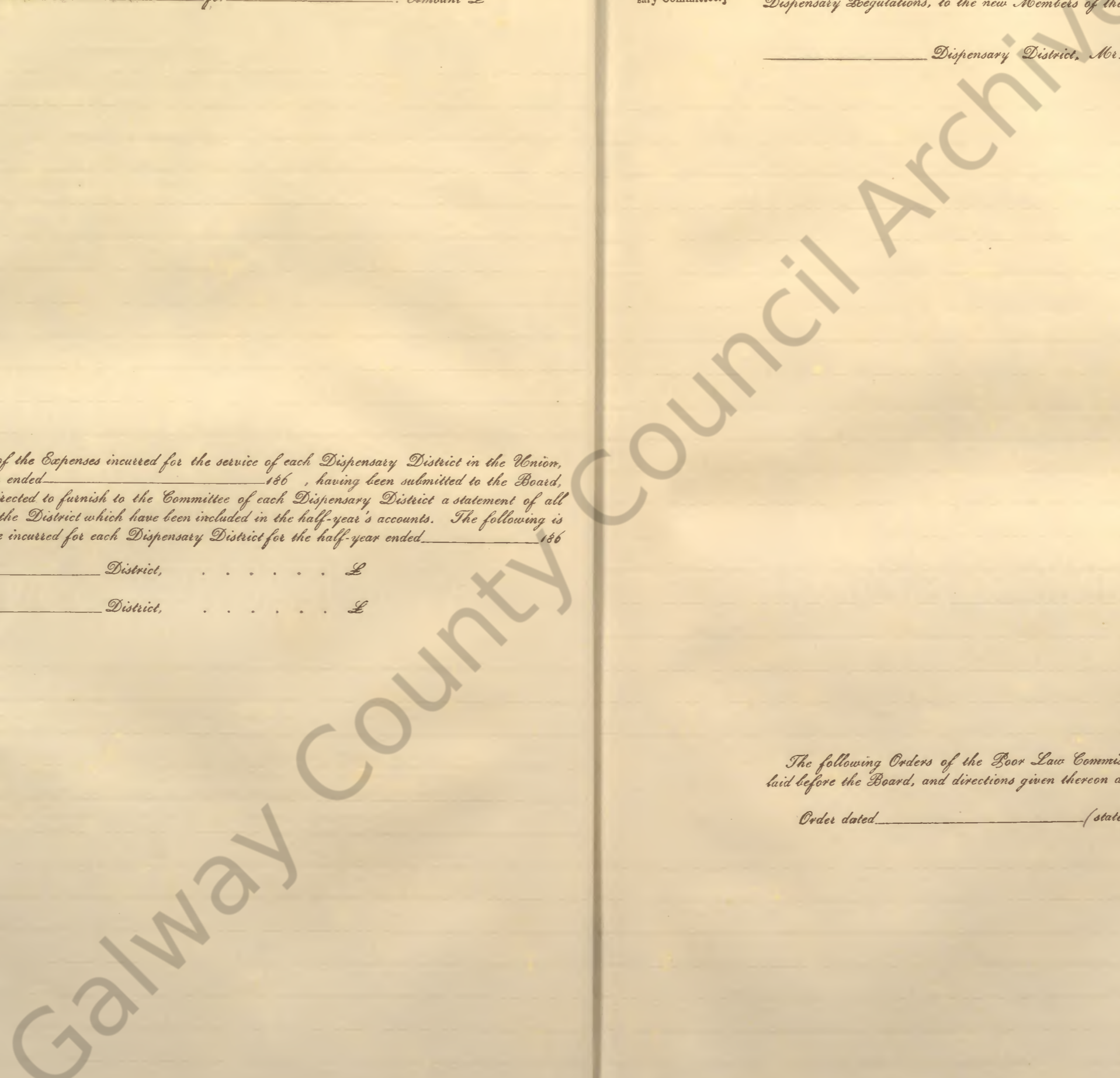

taking stock of the Provisions and Necessaries until Saturday next, as a greater facility for testing the correctness of the quantities on hands of the Master will be then afforded by comparison with the "Provision Check Account Book". Your Committee consider the quality of the Provisions in store - very good.

Your Committee also examined the internal painting of the Warehouse, and consider that the Contractor has executed the work in a satisfactory workmanlike manner - they would recommend that the Entrance Gate, 3 Doors, and the two doors leading from the Yards to the Dining Hall be also painted, the Gate both externally and internally, and the others externally; as a quantity of White lead is on hands the expense of the materials will not be much, and they consider that a sum of £1-10-0 may be allowed for the work alone.

Having examined two "Arrear Lists" furnished by Collectors Cosgrove and Brislane, Your Committee after carefully inquiring into the particulars of each case recommend that a sum of $10\frac{3}{4}$ out of £4-13-8p due upon waste and dilapidated Houses in the Town of Sarsfield be declared irrecoverable - the remainder Your Committee do not feel warranted in recommending to be struck off and have therefore referred the matter back to the Board - the Collector (Cosgrove) has been directed to attend before you and give the necessary information thereon. Your Committee recommend that a sum of £1.3.7 $\frac{1}{2}$ (arross in calculating the Rate) in Collector Brislane's District be struck off.

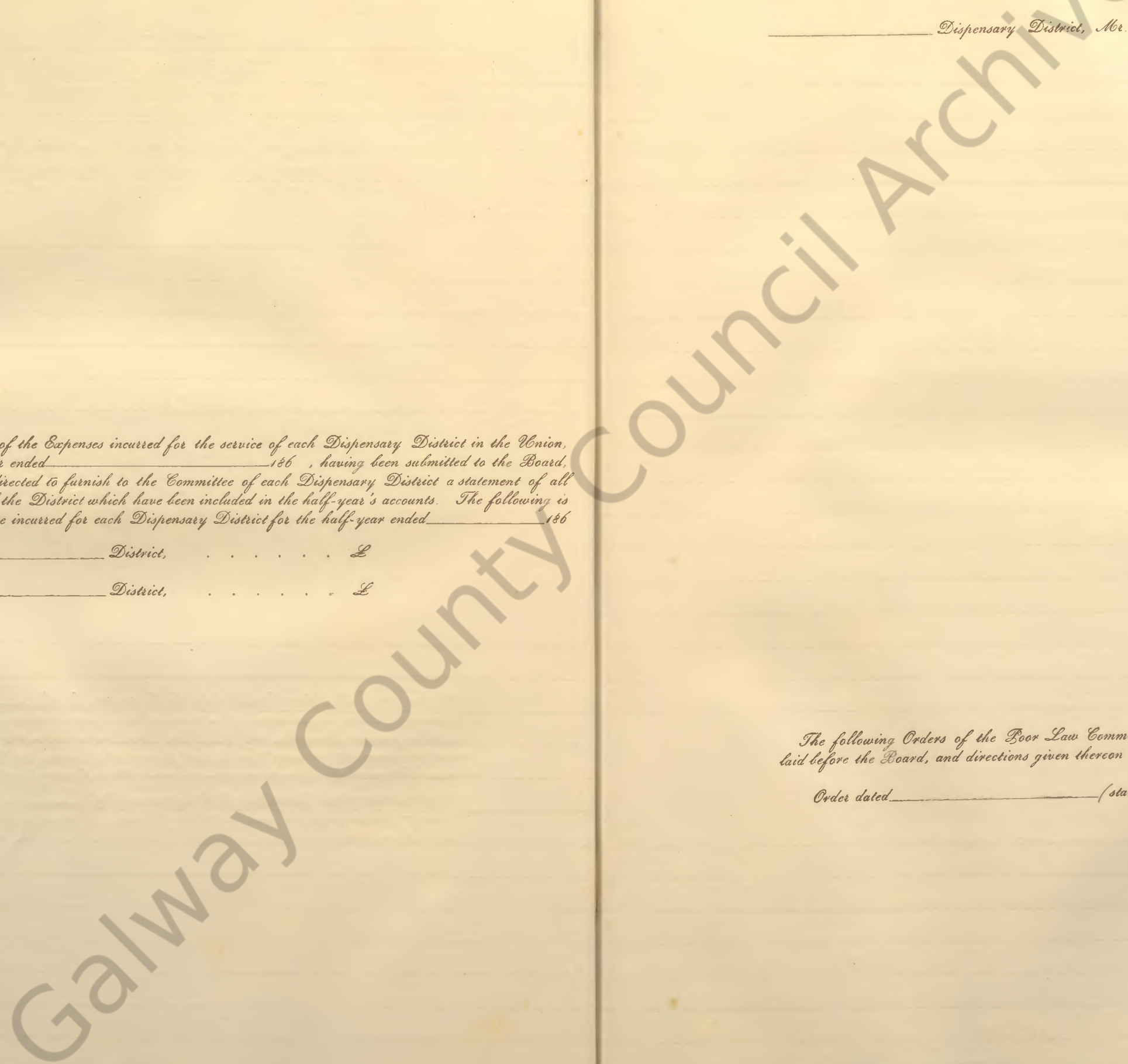

With reference to the foregoing letter from the Poor Law Commissioners

The Board of Guardians of Loughrea Union having investigated the Charges brought by this inmate Doherty against Mr. Fahy the Hospital Nurse beg to inform the Commissioners in Reply that they consider them unfounded, for the following reasons.

It appears that an inmate named Honor Joyce had been employed for sixteen or seventeen years as assistant Nurse in the Hospital and upon her dismissal some short time since by the Doctor, a feeling of jealousy arose against Mr. Fahy; and as no doubt Mr. Fahy did send Honor Joyce the Cape in question when allowed out of the Workhouse upon pass, and had it appears
nine

nine shillings belonging to this woman in her possession, the Charge was got up by Doherty who is a very violently disposed pauper and not to be believed. The Board consider that those Charges have been made for the purpose of annoying the Medical Officer and Apothecary Officers who are most attentive to their duties, and in whom the Guardians have the greatest Confidence and satisfaction and as they conceive that this inmate is the "tool" of other parties outside the Workhouse, the Board deem it right to request that the Commissioners will be pleased to send down for their inspection the original letter written by Doherty.
