The Master of the Ballinasloe House attended before the Board and gave his explanations of the clothes sent with the Paupers (this own clothes) at the time of their transmission. In most instances it is manifest from the time the Boys have been in the House that the clothes they brought in could be of no manner of use. And it would be desirable that such of them as wish to go out should be furnished with such clothes as could be made up for them. The clothes appear to have given to the Paupers themselves and sent to the offices of Mount Belles Union and hence the Confiners and Masters away with them.


