"In accordance with the suggestion contained in the Poor Law Commissioners letter of the 11<sup>th</sup> instant I have read over the Reports of Doctor Jacob and Dr. Wilde on Ophthalmia both of which I beg to lay before you. The predisposing causes assigned by those "Eminent oculists" are such as fully to entitle them to consideration. Ophthalmia like all other epidemics is influenced materially by those causes— it marks out for its objects those whose constitutions are debilitated either from causes over which they have no control or from hereditary predispositions thereby rendering them fit recipients for epidemic disease.

I have marked upon the margin those passages which claim most your attention, in doing so however I feel bound to say that I consider the

 dietary of this Hospital to be liberal and excellent in its quality.

So the precautionary or preventive means recommended by Doctors Jacob and Wilde I have little to add merely that during this wet season the dormitorys should not be washed out oftener than once a week—the cleanliness during the intervening days to be secured by a system of dry scrubbing, and that some copperas be mixed thro' the lime wash (so as to take away the glaring white appearance of the walls which I believe to be very unkindly to the eye) when using in the school rooms, Day Rooms &c.

I am happy to say that but two cases occurred since my last report."
