

Read Letter from Poor Law Commissioners dated 1st Decr '53
stating that they have had before them the Minutes of the Board on the 18th Ultimo from which it appears that the Commissioners' letter calling attention to certain Omissions which their Medical Inspector, Doctor Dillon, had pointed out at a recent inspection, had been referred by the Board of Guardians to the Committee of Management of the respective Districts - In reference to this proposition the Commissioners trust that the Guardians will see that the Committees of the Districts in question cause the omissions above mentioned to be remedied.

Read letter from Dr H Kelly Esq Honorary Secretary Hillerowm Dispensary stating that the Committee of Management have directed the Dispensary Board to contribute at an expense of £10/- and that the alteration suggested by Dr Dillon would be a matter of very considerable expense - deprive the Doctor of his hot plate for making his decoctions, and the presses of the airing from the Hot Blue which runs mid way between, and also deprive the committee of a room to meet in and where the Doctor can also see any patients in cases requiring privacy, The Committee of Management have therefore turned their minds to the subject and beg to suggest an alteration of the door & the setting off an internal porch for which they have a Bill at £4, but they are unwilling to incur such an expenditure for which they do not see the necessity without the sanction of the Board.
