In reference thereto the Commissioners state that they are informed that the cost of Coir rope is about £17 a ton, and that at this price a bed for two Adults would cost about £1/9 and single beds for the Hospital £1/0 each; and that although the cost may, in the first instance, be somewhat greater than straw, it will be an ultimate saving as Coir is a very durable material.

The Commissioners understand that the loss in Coir by wear and tear, is about 4 per cent per annum,

The Master having obtained since last Board Day, a supply of Straw for present use the consideration of the Commissioners letter is deferred.
