Medical Officer's Report

On the last Board day four cases of fever, admitted from the Country, came under my observation in the Infirmary. Since then, two additional were taken in from the outside. I have carried out the recommendation of the visiting Committee, and made other arrangements; so that I have the entire of the original Infirmary at my disposal should a press of fever or other contagious diseases come upon us. One of the above cases has already been discharged; the others, with the exception of one, are going on satisfactorily. In anticipation of any pressure they might say that I require a few articles of medicines, which I am at present nearly out of, and which I trust you will order.
