acknowledging the receipt of the Clerk's letter of the 9<sup>th</sup> instant, stating that in the valuation furnished by Mr. Griffith, the Valuation Commissioner all Bogs are valued and set forth in the lists as rateable property, and inquiring whether in the next Rate Bogs are to be exempted as heretofore.

In reference thereto the Commissioners forward for the information of the Board of Guardians a copy of the 12<sup>th</sup> section of the Valuation Act 15 & 16 Vic. Cap 63 which provides that no Turf Bog or Turf Bank used exclusively for making Turf mould, or cutting or saving Turf, shall be rateable unless a rent or other valuable consideration shall be payable for the same,

The

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The Commissioners are not aware of the grounds upon which the Bogs referred to in the Clerk's letter have been included in the valuation sent to the Guardians of the Monk's Well Union, but there are doubtless sufficient reasons for their being so included.

The power of exemption rests with the Commr<sup>s</sup> of Valuations, but not with the Board of Guardians. Boards of Guardians are bound by express enactment to follow the valuation in making the rates.

And in reference thereto the Commissioners have to state that it appears from the Clerk's communication that the female in question could hardly be deemed to be in a destitute condition on her admission into the Workhouse; and the Commissioners suggest to the Board of Guardians the propriety of their again considering the case, which does not seem to be one which can be properly dealt with by the Board of Guardians, under the provisions of the Irish Poor Relief Acts.
