


The following Orders of the Poor Law Commissioners were laid before the Board, and directions given thereon, as follows:

Sealed Order to the Clerk and Returning Officer of the Union directing that the proceedings for the Election of a Board of Guardians should cease, and that the said Officers appointed to act as a Board of Guardians should be continued to 1st November next.

Read a proposal from Mr John Daly to set 40 sq feet on his ground at the rear of the Workhouse for the purpose of making a Manure pit for the sum of £5000 per annum or for the manure that may accumulate in it.

The Minutes of last Meeting were read and Signed. The Workhouse Register was produced, examined, and authenticated, from No. 4502 to No. 4880, both inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman, and countersignature of the Clerk.

The Out-door Relief Register was produced, examined, and authenticated from No. 4864 to No. 5254, inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman and countersignature of the Clerk.

The Clerk's Report on the execution of Orders previously made by the Board was read, to the following effect:

The Clerk reported that he had attended the petty sessions, in the matter of Pat. Roche late Rate Collector for the Upr of Donapatrik and that the Magistrates adjourned the hearing of the case to the 11th April at the request of the defendant Pat. Roche.
