On the whole I consider that the Male Department is making fair progress, and that a slight improvement is apparent in the female department also."

Gentlemen,
I respectfully beg leave to report for the information of your Board, that on week in W. 13 Townland of Liss in the Electoral Division of Abbey East, on the 1st instant, and made a seizure of Cattle for the Rates due on that W., and whilst driving them away, a party came before me and forcibly rescued them. This party I have summoned to the Petty Sessions Court of Down at the 7th instant, and after producing my Warrant and proving on Oath the Seizure and Rescue, and pointing out to the Presiding Magistrate Acts of Parliament empowering me as Collector of Poor Rates to make such Seizures, he thought fit to dismiss the case without prejudice as he says, and that I might bring the it before the Assistant Barrister if I choiced - By this decision I am put out of pocket 12- in law-costs alone, a sum which your Board will consider too much for me to see, whilst acting up to the very letter of instructions as conveyed to me through the Manual you put into my hands for my guidance. I have further to add that I find myself by this decision deprived of the greatest power invested in me for the collection of the Rates, namely the power of distress, and that I have found parties to tell me that they would not allow their Cattle to be driven away for the Rates in consequence of this decision - I attend at your Board to day to answer any questions you may think proper to ask me and await your instructions -

James Tunny from the Bakehouse was talking to Mr Gannon, he Mr Gannon told the Master to remove Ellen Waldron from the place she stood, so as to give him an opportunity of speaking to the other inmates, the Master removed Ellen Waldron over the yard, Mr Gannon then told the Master to remain, and he having a pencil and paper in his hand, the Master told him he could not remain, as the bread was to be removed, from the Bakehouse to the Bread store, and the store open, and that he considered it was not a fit place to hold or settle discussions among paupers, he then threatened me, he would tell Dr Brooke, in presence of paupers, when the Master returned into the Dining hall, there were a number of men collected in the Dining hall as the doors were left open for the school boys who were carrying turf to the different wards, the Master asked Peter

The following Orders, from the Poor Law Commissioners and others, were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, in the following effect, (or Orders made on them respectively, as follows):

Brunnus who was the leader of the men, what he wanted, he said he wanted to speak to Mr Gannon, the Master told Mr Gannon there were a number of men in the hall wanting to speak to him, Mr Gannon said he did not want to speak to them, the Master then removed them out of the hall, and told them if they had any complaint to make, they could state their case to the Board or Visiting Committee Brunnus said they did not want to speak to the Board, but to Mr Gannon. The Master then went into the Bakehouse, and told James Tunny to fill all the bread on the trays, and take all the bread into the store, by the three assistants, while I was present, James Tunny totally refused, that he should follow Mr Gannon, he left the Bakehouse although he had full liberty previous to speak to Mr Gannon in the female yard, and also in the Bakehouse, The Master on the following morning removed James Tunny from the Bakehouse for his disobedience to the Master, and sent another person in his place. The Master trusts the Board will protect the Master, and that all questions of discussions of the above will be settled by the Board or Visiting Committee. It will not be in the power of the Master to keep proper order in the house while the Board will allow, one Guardian to settle the affairs of the house. There were three Guardians came to the house for the last few days, and not one pauper came to them to make any

any complaint to them whatever, but the moment Mr Gannon makes his appearance in the house, a row begins among the paupers, one party for Mr Gannon and another party against him. With regard to the Matrons complaint against the Master for not punishing Ellen Waldron for speaking against Mr Gannon. Now as the Matron opened the case, before the Chairman and Gentlemen who were present in the Boardroom, the whole cause of such confusion in the house, the Master feels it his duty to repeat the Matrons words, that Ellen Waldron said of Mr Gannon that Ellen Waldron publicly stated in the Dining hall, that Wilhelmina Gannon Poor Law Guardian, took with him bread, soap &c. from the Swan Union Workhouse, the property of the Guardians for his own use, and that she would never cease until she would bring every Rebel from the Workhouse. This statement the Master will prove for Mr Gannon at a sworn investigation or in the Petty Sessions Court if necessary, that Ellen Waldron used the above language against Mr Gannon. I trust this statement will prove to the Board that the Master is not afraid of Ellen Waldron, or any other inmate of the house. As the Matron stated before the Gentlemen, that the Master seemed afraid. The case is fully explained over, and will be seen who is afraid to have it properly explained into. When the Matron was asked was she offended by any other inmate during the last few days, she said no, the Master then asked her did Thomas Giblin in the Infirmary under Medical treatment give her any offence, she said yes, and instead of reporting him to the Master, the Matron told Giblin she would give him six pence but not to say any more about her Uncle, when Giblin was speaking of. By this act of the Matron, she has in a great degree deprived herself of having proper control over the inmates of the house, as it was an encouragement to the other inmates, to follow the example of Thomas Giblin, in order to get money from the Matrons. The Master was forced into the above discussion he did not intend to have anything to do whatever with the case.

The Master also informs the Board that there is ^{of this kind} bad feeling between the Master and Matron to cause the ^{of this kind} to be regulated the Chairman and Gentlemen who remain the Boardroom of Saturday the 16th inst, heard the Matron state that the Master assisted her in every way he possibly could. The only difference between the Master and Matron, is that the Master did not look up Ellen Waldron, when she used the language against Mr Gannon, as is stated in the report. Ellen Waldron threatens

threatens law proceedings against any person who would look

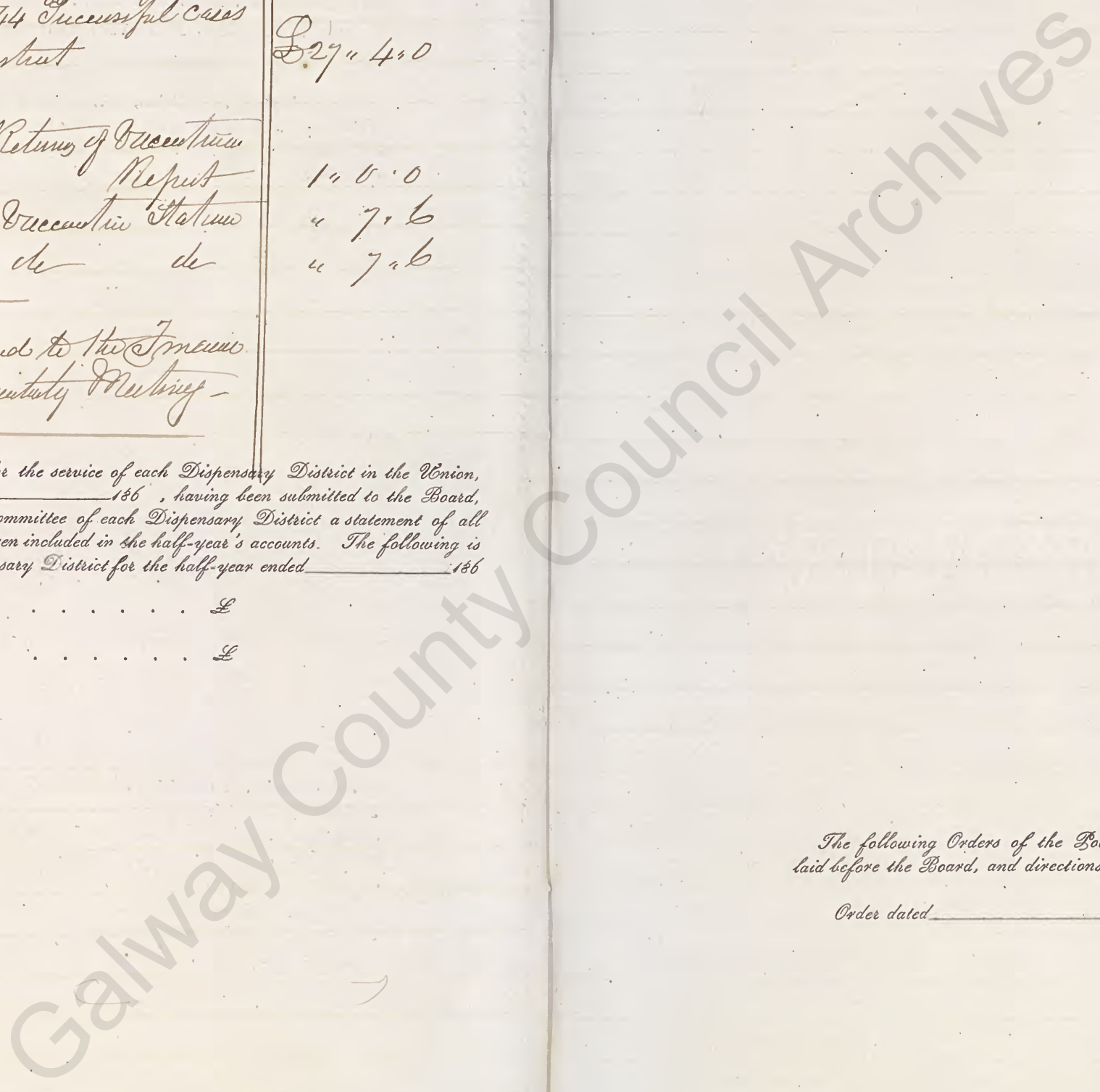

That the floor in the mens dayroom requires to be repaired, that the boys should have only one bedroom, that the partition should be raised. That they were informed boys with lighted candles used to pass over the partition from one bedroom to the other, and throw water from one to the other over

over the partition. That a Nurse with a child ought not to be employed in the Laundry. That the land of the Workhouse is in a very neglected state, and appears not to have been attended to for several months, in any kind of work done by the men in the House. That our pauper ought to get patients in the Infirmary Ward, except such persons as are located there by order of the Medical Officer, and that all other paupers should eat their meals in the Hall at the public table.

The Master's attention having been called to the foregoing report - explained that the floors in School and Dayrooms were in a very bad state, that the Stoves & flues were in a very bad state. That with regard to the land, the weather being so severe for some months past, nothing could be done with it until the last fortnight, and that it was now in course of Cultivation.

Ordered - The Master to carry out the suggestion of the Committee -

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon as follows.

The Medical Officer reported that there were not any deaths during the past week, and that 84 persons remained under treatment.

The following report from the Master was read.

March 6th 1867

The Master informs the Board that it has come to his knowledge that the Matron got her child's clothes washed in the Laundry, with the soap belonging to the Union. The Master requests to be informed by the Board, is she allowed to do so. He would that the Matrons stated to Dr. Brodie, she had no confidence in the Master, as she and every other Officer of the House, are aware that the Master will not allow any person to use the property of the Union for their own use, unless by order of the Board. The Board are also aware that the Matron, in her evidence on the 5th inst, before Dr. Brodie, stated she gave clean linen once a week to all the inmates of the House; Winny Curran states her child did not get clean linen for nearly three weeks. Winny Curran is the woman who gave evidence against Bridget Kelly the former Laundry woman for selling soap the property of the Union.

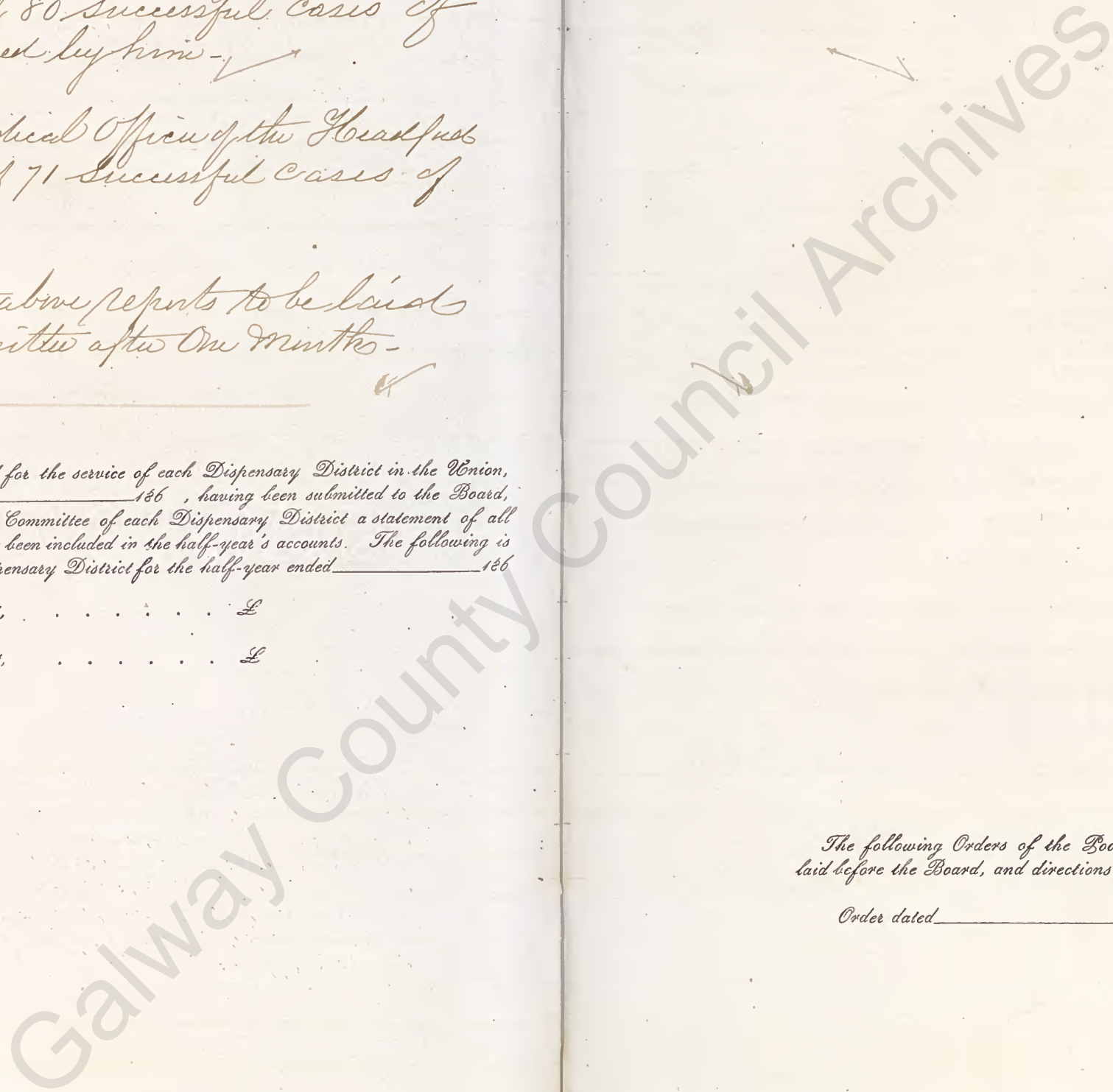

Resolved that having before us the experience of the past 15 years in the working of the Tuam Dispensary during which long period there has not been a single complaint of dereliction of duty on the part of our Medical officers nor of deficiency of the means of obtaining relief on the part of those requiring it which we attribute to the fact of our Medical officers being each individually responsible for the duties of the entire district under an undivided responsibility (which would not be the case were the present suggestion carried out). Being also unwilling to deprive any part of our district of the right ex-officio to the services of a second Medical officer (such as exists at present) when required. personal between the Medical officers and not interfering with the discharge of the duties and the immediate attendance on a ticket (when presented) by either Medical officer and in case of serious illness the Medical officer first seeing the case continuing his attendance if requisite with the addition of the Co-operation of the Second Medical officer. Taking these circumstances into consideration and holding the views we do this Committee hope the Poor Law Commissioners will see fit to allow the district to remain as it has been (undivided) confident that by doing so they will confer an advantage on the poor of the district. The Members of the Committee and the Medical officers and we beg to refer to former Resolutions of the Committee on this subject dated 7th July 1855 and 24th February 1858. Resolution of 7th day of July 1855. Resolved: That the Committee has been and continues of opinion that the Mutual understanding which has hitherto existed between the Medical officers is the best guarantee for the due discharge of the duties of the Institution and presents no opportunity for excuse for the non-performance thereof, they are therefore unwilling the present system as regards the Medical officers should be disturbed. Resolution of 24th February 1858. (12 Members present) and ~~unanimously~~ it was Proposed by Robert Bodkin Esq. and seconded by Thomas Broome Esq. and carried unanimously. That we are clearly of opinion that it would be inexpedient to make any alteration in the arrangements which have hitherto worked so satisfactorily as we are unwilling to deprive any portion of the district of the services of a second Medical officer or to relieve either Medical officer of any portion of the responsibility attached to the discharge of his duties over the entire district.

The following communication from the Schoolmaster was read. Gentlemen, Allow me to explain the Masters report against-

against one as recorded in the "Punishment Book" Report

The Schoolmaster beat Arthur Kelly and then called the Master.

The Schoolmaster beat this boy severely with a short rule.

The Master requested the Schoolmaster not to beat the boy, as he gave him rather too much punishment already.

But he still continued beating him and the boy lying on the ground under him.

Until the boy took the pointer from the Schoolmaster.

If this be the case the Master intends to pursue with regard to his co-operation in reforming abuses, I think it a very bad plan, as instead of reporting the punishment inflicted truly he gives an untrue and exaggerated statement, in order to have a charge against one. I think this very unfair, and must in self defence, ask to have the matter inquired into, as I did not hear the report read at all last Board day. If the Master thought it wrong to use the rule, why did he not object, instead of holding the boy, to prevent his throwing himself on the floor a second time, again earnestly and respectfully asking for an inquiry, which will I hope prevent such a recurrence.

Reply

I deny that I beat the boy before called the Master. ✓

I deny that I beat the boy severely, as himself and others can testify. ✓

I deny that the Master requested me not to beat the boy, but held the boy by the shoulder while I beat him. ✓

The boy lay on the ground himself, it was not I, nor the effect of the beating that caused him to lie down, but a pretence to avoid being punished. ✓

I asked the boy to take the pointer from me, and show me what I required of him on the Map, and he would not. ✓

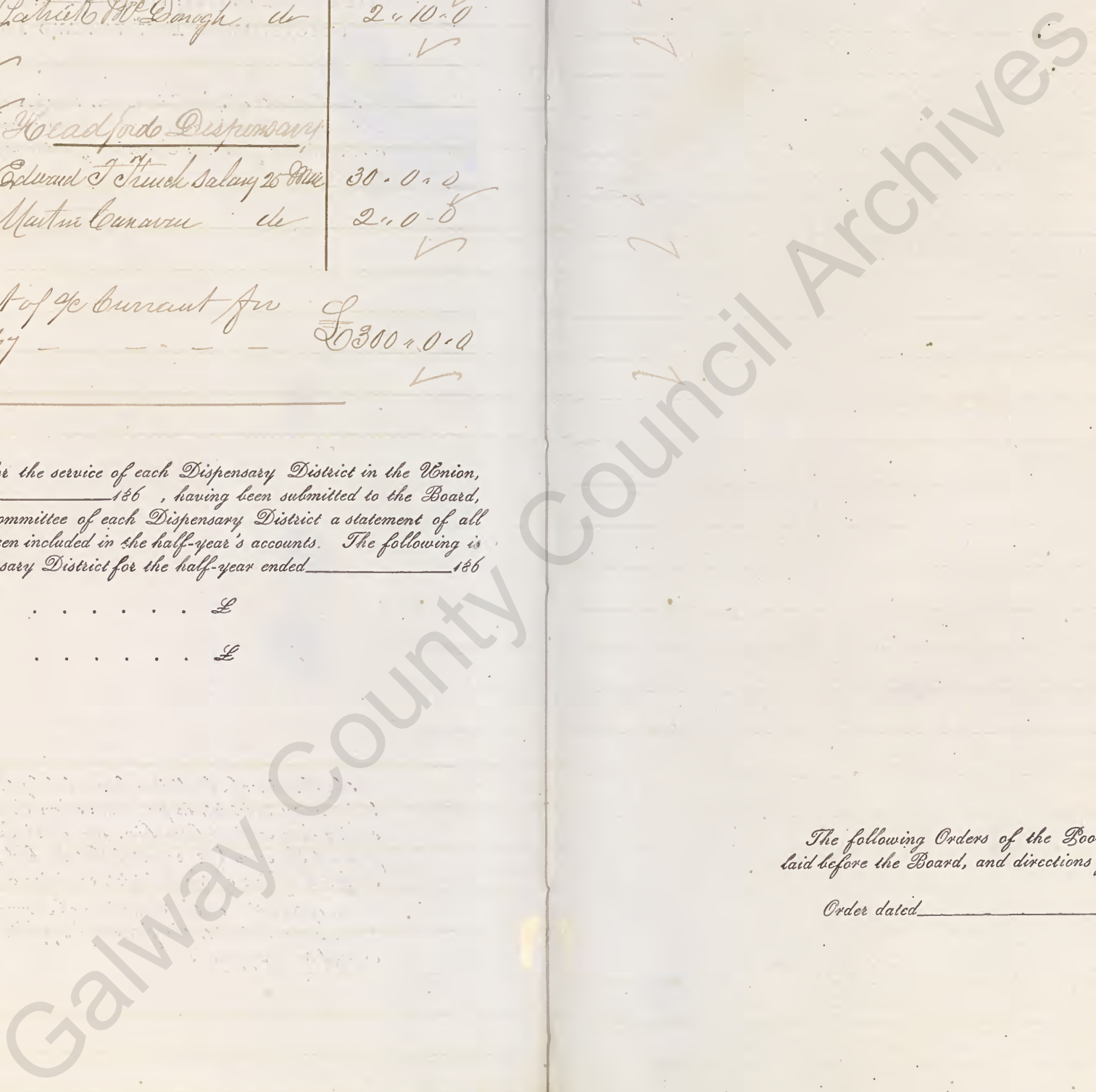

I beg to draw the attention of the Board to the following facts -
On Friday March 29th I visited the Workhouse female school - a Protestant Child Mary Riley who for some time has been an inmate of the Workhouse, being present in her class - I requested the Mistress to let me hear her examine the children in anything she chose - At the suggestion however of the Matron who was in the school she refused in any way to examine the children in my presence or

or for any information, thereby preventing me from forming any estimate as to the character of the instruction the child with whose superintendence, I have been as chaplain intrusted was receiving. So gross a violation of the fundamental rules of the National Board can hardly I believe receive the sanction of the Board of Guardians. I find however to my surprise in the Roman Catholic Chaplain's report book, the following entry dated Feb^{ry} 11. 1867 (at which time the Protestant child above named was attending the school) "I examine children of the female school to day, answering fair and well that of according very good" & Thomas C.C. - The permission here conceded to the Roman Catholic Chaplain, to examine in secular business, while a Protestant child is a pupil in the school, is rather inconsistent with the decision arrived at us regards the Protestant Chaplain. If it be said, which I doubt however, can be said, that the Protestant children expelled the school while the Roman Catholic Chaplain was examining them in secular business, this separation of the children during secular hours amounts simply to denominational instruction and is most injurious to the advancement of the Protestant children in secular business. The Roman Catholic Chaplain may examine an hour every day in the week, and

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon as follows:

In that time each day the Protestant child must be expelled the school and be deprived of the educational advantages provided for her by the National Board. I emphatically protest against a course so inconsistent and injurious and as the only means of preventing such abuse, I request the fundamental principles of the National Board be adhered to, that as the Protestant Chaplain is prevented examining in secular business, the same restriction may hold good in the case of the Roman Catholic Chaplain.

The Medical Officer reported that there were not any deaths during the past week, and that 74 persons remained under treatment.

The Master informs the Board that Dr Brodie Con Law Inspector visited the House on the 6th inst, and examined the Mill; the Master found one barrel of milk bad, and called Dr Brodie's attention to it, when the Master was sending the milk out of the store, he said there was 48 lbs out of water in the milk returned to the Contractor. The Master & Matron went to the Boardroom and a few of the Paupers who were called, in consequence of private letters sent to the Commissioners. The Matron complained of the Master for not punishing Ellen Waldron for language she used to the Matron a few days previous, the Matron did not tell the Master the language Ellen Waldron used until she repeated it before Dr Brodie, and then the Master was preparing to take law proceedings against Ellen Waldron. The Clerk came to the Master and told him to report the case first to the Board of Guardians, that Dr Brodie thought it was the proper course to take. The Visiting Committee came the same day, and the Matron made the same complaint, that the Master would not punish Ellen Waldron, the Committee said the Master had no right to punish Ellen

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon as follows

Waldron, when the Matron did not state the offence. The Master then said to the Committee that a Married man would not bear such language from his wife as the Master bears from Ellen Waldron. The Master asked the Committee was that proper language for the Matron to use to the Master, that she was a double wrong in the words used, the Committee said it was not fit language for the Matron to use to the Master. The Master humbly requests the Board will call on the Matron, and every officer of the House to know if the Master gave any cause whatever by word or deed to the Matron or any officer of the House at any time for such language to be used to the Master. The Master requested the Matron twice in the most civil manner to come up to the House from the Boardroom to the Dining hall, and to assist the Master to prepare the Breakfast for the paupers, the Matron refused the Master in presence of Doctor Brodie. The Matron acted in direct opposition to the Commissioners Rules, Article 65-13. The following is the Matrons complaint against Ellen Waldron - "That Ellen Waldron said that the Matron did not bring it home with her, William Gannon's privateer, who fell down down Miss Brodie's bedchamber with a basket of bottles, to raise a mob to beat her Matron, and if she and her Matron came in here for shelter, they came in without a stain on them, but that she would send the Matron out with handcuffs on her"

The Matron also informed the Board that on the 5th inst, he sent two boys Charles Gilbons & William Cochrane for water for the Bakery, that an old coat they had with them was lost on the road, that he informed the Police of the matter, that the coat has not been seen since.

The Master and Matron were then called before the Board, and cautioned as to the disagreement which appears to exist between them, and to the insubordinate state of the inmates of the House, and informed that if there be not a marked improvement in the general management and order of the House within one month both should resign their respective offices

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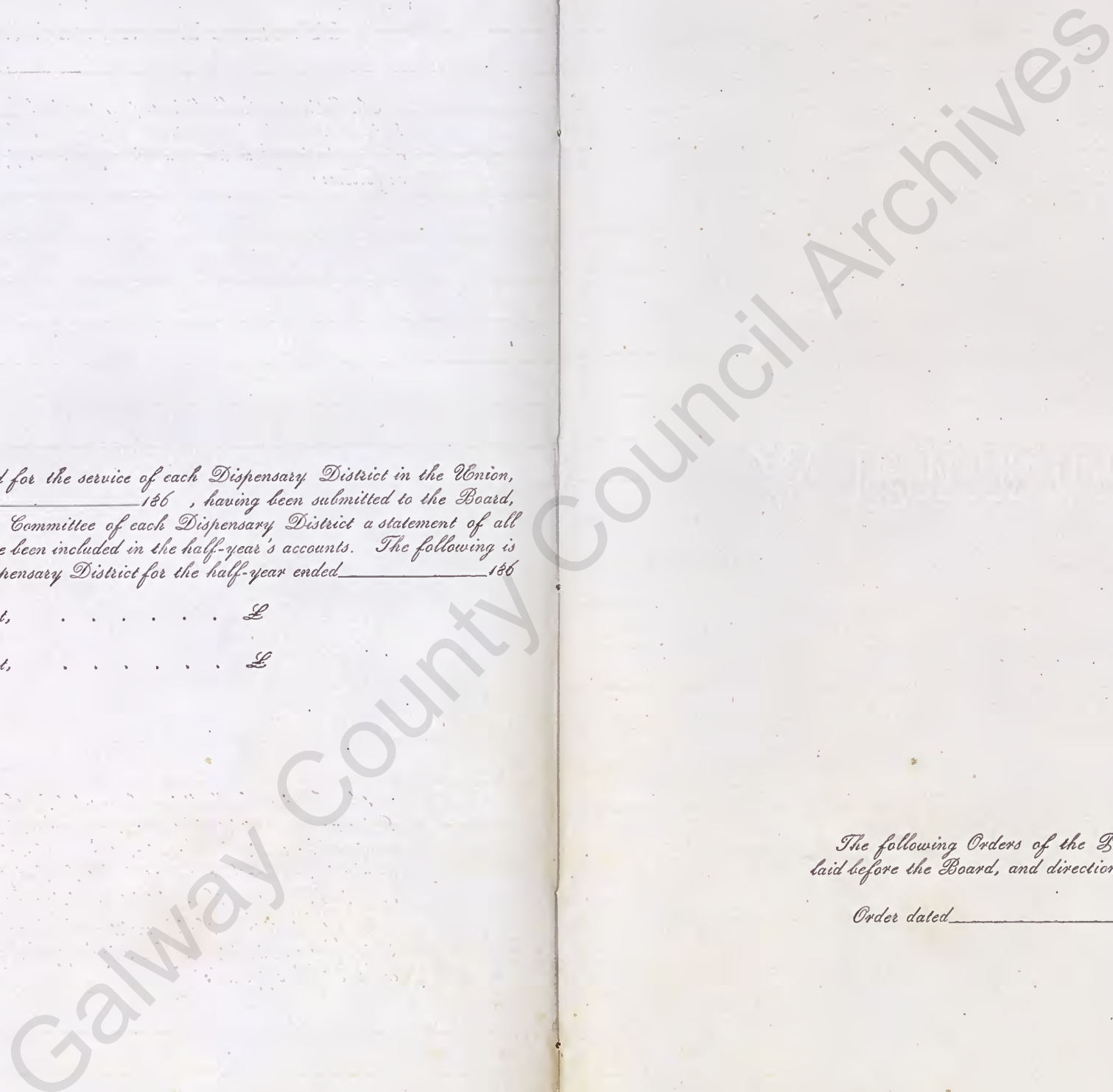
